

Membership: Annual membership begins from 1 January and continues through the ensuing calendar year to 31 December. Annual subscription is \$6.00 for four quarterly issues appearing in September, December, March, and June and are designated as Fall, Winter, Spring (beginning with Volume I, Number 2, Larch 1975), and Summer. 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"Romance of Family History"

Aspects of Family History

There are two main divisions in the study of family history:
1) studying the family as a social group. This professional orientation belongs to our sociologists, anthropologists, and social historians. 2) studying the family biographies, histories, and heritages. These are of interest to our own particular type of research. The difference between the two is the subject area which characterizes the first discipline. Most of us have well—shaped ideas of our study orientation, but it would be interesting to review what the social historians see. The family as a social institution is quite suggestive of what is going on today.

Social Institution. What is the "nuclear" family? How does the "noulear" family relate to the "extended" family? The "nuclear" family belongs to the group of mother, father, and children while the "extended" includes aunts, uncles, cousins, and grandparents. For instance, in Africa, it is the "extended" family which may be more impostant than the "nuclear" or limited family. This is something which also sometimes characterizes some facets of society in the United States and in Europe. In the old days, especially when people lived in a village or a small town, they very often had this dose kind of connection with the "extended" family. As we becar to move around and pull up roots, this close connection tended to change so that the "extended" family is not nearly as important as the small "nuclear" family in our country today. It is in this distinction that researchers are concentrating on very interesting work. Other related areas which concern the researchers are in the study of husband-wife relations, parent-child relations, and grandparent-grandchild relations. An especially fascinating study taking place is of the latter relationship. In most societies there is a noticeably special relation between the grandparent and the grandchild. Very often it is that when children become interested in something of the past, it isn't necessarily in what their parents were doing or the times in which their parents had lived, but more (not always, but often) in the times when their grandparents were doing things. There is also a very close relationship, in many societies, between the interests of a the grandparents and grandchildren. In many parts of the world; the grandparents are given the prime assignment, in the family context, of educating the children. This, of course, we don't often think of in the now or today because we have transferred

so much or he responsibility over to our schools. The grade school has been given the task of almost becoming surrogate mother or father in many instances. However, it used to be that it really was the responsibility of the grandparents to fulfill this kind of didactic of educational function for the children. This was true here as it many sections of the world. You may say that this is all very interesting but, what does this have to do with family history? It's very central, really, because how were the traditions of the family handed down? The lore or the stories or the anecdotes which really gave the family its identity and meaning, how were these transmitted? They were usually passed along between grandparent and grandchild. And, if we have a society where we no longer have this intimate relationship between grandparents and grandchildren or the relationship is somewhat altered, then we have great difficulty in having some of these family heritages shared along the generations. This is one reason why we do find that some of our students do not know anything at all about their families.

Some of the other areas in which the social historian is concentrating are: the size and fertility of the family. Today we have complier families, and the child-rearing practices are different than before. There is a Professor Dimos at Brandeis University who has done some very excellent work on the way in which people reared their children in the Plymouth Colony in Massachusetts Lack in the 17th century. It would be fascinating to follow how our child rearing practices have changed. Along the same lines is the mistory of adolescence. It's interesting to realize that the idea of an adolescent in the family is of very recent origin. The historians have been working on this, and they see that, for example, back 300-500 years ago in Europe when young people were ten to twelve years old or so, they were considered adults and immediately pushed into the adult world. There was no interval, no kind of "stage" of adolescence. This is still very true of many world cultures of today. For example, it is still so in In Western society during the past 100-150 years or so, we have created this whole world of adolescence. Of course, it is continuing even more today with the presence of television and the subculture of adolescence. Still within the family context is the role of the woman, and social historians have been focusing on the history of women and the changes that have taken place in relationship to their roles within the household.

Another fascinating area is how the family has been treated by the law, that is, the rights of husbands and wives within the law. This area is of interest to genealogy because of the many

The second of th important focuments which have come to us as a result of legislation. In other words, it's the law for a child to have a birth certificate to have a child declared. It's the law to file in probate court. It's the law that if we want to get married, we must record it. A host of things where the family comes in contact with the law or legal procedure is quite apparent. The genealogist, of course, knows this better than the historian who is just beginning to investigate this area. The impression is, then, that the genealogist is leading the way in this particular area of study.

Lastly, another area of interest to the social historian is that of the life cycle. We are taking inspiration more from psychologists such as Professor Erickson, retired, of Harvard University. Here the emphasis is to look at the participation of the family in terms of the life cycle. That is, we look at the different stages of man-his birth, childhood, adolescence, maturity. We look as the person grows older and at his years as a "senior" citizen" and try to understand that a person may be different, have different needs and different interests during different periods of his life. An excellent example is the biography of Sir Winston Churchill. In tracing his life cycle we can see a definite distinction between the character of the young Churchill as compared to that of the elder Vinston Churchill.

III. Vital, Church, and Cemetery Records

- Marriage records are the earliest available vital records and often date from the organization of the county.
- 1. Originals remain in the respective counties or in the State Library and the GS has microfilmed the records to about 1860-80.

- 2. Records for many counties are incomplete or are missing and abstracts for several counties have been compiled by Knorr, Fleet, Bell, et. al.
- B. Many counties have birth and death records dating between 1853-1896 but they are incomplete.
 - 1. Originals are at the State Library in Richmond, Virginia.
- 2. Existing records have been filmed by the GS and are at SLC.
- C. State registration of vital statistics began 12 June 1912 and copies may be obtained from "Bureau of Vital Records, James Madison Building, P. O. Box 1000, Richmond, Virginia 23208 for \$2.00 each."
- 1. Seven cities kept vital statistics prior to state registration: including Roanoke (1891), Norfolk (1892), Newport News (1896), Portsmouth (1900), Richmond (1900), Lynchburg (1901), and Petersburg (1910).
 - 2. Elizabeth City County kept its own records from 1900.

2. "New Ways":

As an American city Santa Barbara began its legal existence on April 9, 1850, incorporated by an act of the first California Legislature five months before there actually was any State of California in the American Union, and during that tense season when Congress wrangled over its destiny before Admission Day dawned on September 9, 1850.

The news of its new status traveled slowly yo Santa Barbara and in that leisurely time there was no rush to institute the new American Scheme. The old Ayuntamiento (municipal government) had served well enough the needs of old Santa Barbara, so with one thing and another, the new city government did not begin to function until August 26, 1850, when the first Common Council convened.

Election of this august body presumably had taken place in the meantime, and Francisco De la Guerra had been chosen as the first Mayor. At the final meeting of Santa Barbara's Ayuntamiento had sat in dignified convocation Don Joaquin De la Guerra, the last Alcalde (mayor), with Don Batéban Ortega and Don Juan Ayala as his Regidores (aldermen or councilmen), Don Anastásio Carrillo as the Señor Sindico, or treasurer, and Don Joaquin Carrillo, El Señor Prefecto del Distrito (district prefect), presiding over their deliberations.

Civil government had been achieved for the hitherto military presidio of Santa Barbara back in December, 1826, after republican Mexico had succeeded monarchical Spain. By order of Governor Echeandia, its first Ayuntamiento Ylustre was elected. It was a dignified, but not very active body. In those halcyon pastoral days, before the birth of "civic consciousness," office seeking was at a minimum, and after one had an office there was little to do with it.

In the newly incorporated city of 1850 there was everything to do. With American occupation of California the ancient Hispanic institutions fell off the country like rusted, broken armor. Deprived of its accustomed protection, Old California stood shivering and bewildered in a new world. Eleven days after incorporating the town of Santa Barbara, the California State Legislature passed an act repealing every Spanish law but one. That provided for the Juez de Campo—Judge of the Plains, essential to the ranchos, but leaving the venerable municipalities without a straw of custom to which to cling. Before the new City Clerk lay a clean book without a mark in it beyond the handwritten title,—"Acts of the Common Council of the City of Santa Barbara." Before the Council lay the task of filling that book from the first page with acts of wisdom and discretion.

3. "Lompoc's Centennial Families" by Myra Manfrina

A former Indian scout and fighter with the U.S. Infantry, and a proficient carpenter was John Sanor HENNING. In 1872 he came with a party of men to Lompoc to look over the land for colonization. Liking what he saw he later brought his wife down to pick out a home site so he would know wxactly what to buy at the November 1874 land sale. His 30 acres at Central and A Street cost him \$22 per acre. At first there was a temporary shelter of rough boards to house the family. Then he built a barn of logs and added to the house.

Finding water further down A Street he built a large tank house in 1891 and started construction of the large Victorian home which

is still, with the tank house, standing there, now the property of the BELLUZ family. It was probably completed in 1899.

One of the eight HENNING children was Susan, who married Vinton VAN CLIEF. She had a nursing home in Lompoc from 1918 to 1943, called the Van Clief Sanitorium and Maternity Home. Probably upwards of 700 babies were ushered into the world under her care. Another HENNING daughter was Charlotte, who married William NEGUS, also a carpenter.

Dewitt Clinton HENNING, a miller, originally from Missouri, arrived from Santa Clara on the first day of October, 1874, a member of the Lompoc Valley Land Company organizers. In June, 1875, he and Wright H. PECK were sent by the company to San Francisco to purchase a grist and flour mill and accessories. The mill was set up in the old adobe—the only building in the valley when the settlers arrived, northwest corner of J and Locust. The company spent \$3,000 on this most important item to their survival. HENNING was hired as miller at \$75 per month.

Until there were halls built in town big enough to hold meetings, all the gatherings were held in this old adobe and the Land Company headquarters were there and the first meetings of the Odd Fellows lodge. DeNitt sent for his family in 1876—he and his wife, Adelaide BENSON, had 12 children and two of them, sons Hollis and Clinton, are represented in Lompoc today.

4. Kristelig Kalender

A superb example of how material finds its way from its original home to the West lays amid the pages of a small book purchased at a local garage sale. Entitled KRISTELIG KALENDER, it was first thought to be a German "birthday book" or Danish from the small town of Danish Solvang in Santa Barbara County. However, upon further investigation, KRISTELIG KALENDER is found to be Norwegian. It is divided into calendar format for each month of the year with three or four days represented on each page. On the left there is scripture; on the right are "blank" areas reserved for the different handwritings which appear. Similar to autographs, names and years have been written which correspond to a daily scripture for that month. Of course, the alignment of name and day is not always even, so some entries could have a day's error. At the beginning of the book is a listing of the deaths (not included here), a type of "in memorium". The book is about $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ " in size and contains approximately 122 pages. It is bound, and the pages are in good condition; however, they are coming loose from the spine.

While compiling the material, Mrs. Roth became curious and checked the local phone directory. Because of the unusual name, OVERAA, as opposed to NELSON, she dialed a Mr. Overaa and asked if he were familiar with the book. He did not know it existed but recognized some of the names, especially those of his parents. He also has a sister whose name does not appear in the KALENDER. Mr. Overaa was born in San Francisco and moved to Norway with his parents when he was five; he returned to the U.S. when he was twenty. Both of his parents remained and died in Norway. The information he supplied Mrs. Toth is:

The book has been donated to the SBCGS by member, Joseph Whalen, the original purchaser, and it remains in our Society library. If anyone is researching this family line or any name which appears in the ensuing lists, please feel free to contact the Society or Mrs. Roth.

The names have been rearranged alphabetically with the accompanying date of birth; the date of death appears when known. Some names have been omitted because they are impossible to decipher. There are over 153 entries in all.

As in the case of Mr. Cveraa, it must not be automatically assumed that the place of birth was Santa Barbara. As far as we know, the birthplaces are unknown. However, a referral to our birth indexes would help confirm or deny. Obviously whis little book has unlimited possibilities for the imaginative.

THE BOOK BROWSER

ARMORIAL FAMILIES: A Directory of Gentlemen of Coat-Armour. 2 vols. Compiled and edited by Arthur Charles Fox-Davies. Rutland, Vermont: Charles E. Tuttle, (1895, 1929) 1970.

This is one of the most authoritative and monumental works in the field of Armorial history. Although heraldry is not an American institution, many Americans can rightfully display coats of arms—George Washington even used one.

Included are 2,901 heraldic designs including sixty-seven in full color. Mr. Fox-Davies has followed the arrangement of De Brett's PEERAGE with no attempt to include the deceased members of a family. Those who are entitled to bear arms and were alive around 1895 (when the book was first published) are arranged in the strict order of their seniority in which they would succeed to a hereditary title. Their names are followed by the usual details of birth, marriage, issue, and so forth. Dating of the arms is difficult; thus, only when a reasonable claim has been made, did the author date the arms. There are no Welsh, Scottish, or Irish families included.

This is a most welcome reprint of the 1929 edition, first published in 1895, of a fascinating work of heraldry. It is an excellent source for identifying a family coat of arms with additional biographical information from the mid-nineteenth to the early twentieth century.

THE PICTORIAL FIELD BOCK OF THE REVOLUTION: Or Illustrations by Pen and Pencil, of the History, Biography, Scenery, Relics, and Traditions of the War for Independence. 2 vols. Benson J. Lossing. Tokyo: Charles F. Tuttle, 1972, 1,555 pages.

Benson J. Lossing, using a method of research that is quite immiliar to today's geneal ogists, set out in 1848 on an 8,000 mile ourney through the thirteen colonies and Canada to record and reserve the events of the Revolutionary War. He did this by interviewing people at "every social and intellectual grade" and supplemented their rememberances with sketches of the people involed and the sites visited. Whenever he borrowed from other sources they are explicitly noted.

The arrangement of the work was designed to record history

in the form of a pilmgrimage, and so events are described in the order of his journeys and not as a chronological history. The original volumes contained 1,100 engravings which Lossing made on wood from his sketches with the help of Mr. Barritt. Truly this was a tremendous accomplishment.

The reprint of this rare book published by the Charles E. Tuttle Company is a close reproduction of the original. The engravings are brought to us intact in the form of illustrations. An original publication was viewed in the Special Collections department of the library at UCSB. It was in two volumes which had been published separately in 1851 and 1852 respectively. Each volume was much larger in size than those of the reprint. A comparison of the two sets however, showed that the text of the reprint remains complete and true to the original. The index form has been very much improved overall. A list of contents, originally in a ponderous early 19th Century style, has been sliminated. This does not detract from the number or quality of index entries. Rather the cummulative index of 10,000 entries enhances their usefulness when you consider the format of the work. It alone is a joy to any genealogist.

Of specific interest to geneal ogists are the many thumbnail pedigrees detailing names, dates, parentage and locality
of individuals as well as some entire families. Footnotes are
used generously to enlarge upon these subjects rather than to
just identify sources. The minutia clothes these names and
illustrations with reality, giving us a forceful picture of
the era of our country's birth.

Benson J. Lossing expressed a strong desire toward "those precious things of our cherished household that they might be preserved for the admiration and reverence of remote posterity." He certainly achieved his desire, and it might be said to be the same desire of today's genealogist.

Soundex. This system is used in many government indexes including some for passenger lists and for the families having children of 10 years of age or under in 1880. The actual name is always written after the code, so it does not matter that Lee and Lowe would both be LOOO or that O'Brien and Opperman would both be 01.65. All but a few of the 200 ways Parmelee is spelled in the records would come out P654.

Because names have been spelled in many different ways, we sometimes fail to find one with an unusual spelling in the ordinary alphabetical index. Therefore, the Soundex System was devised. In addition to its normal use, it should suggest alternative first letters. Thus, Bickel may appear as Pickel because the Germans pronounced B like P; Vreeland sometimes appears as Freeland, and so on. To use Soundex you must first work out the code number for the surname. It will consist of the initial letter plus three numerals.

The letters a, e, i, o, u, w, y, and h are not coded. When two key letters or equivalents appear together, they are coded as one letter. Prefixes such as van, Von, Di, de, le, di, D', dela, or du are sometimes disregarded.

Certification. Have you ever wondered what the initials "C.G.", "C.A.L.S." and "G.R.S." after the names of some genealogists stand for? They are the researchers who have been certified by the Board for Certification of Genealogists. The Board, which is composed of leading genealogists and historians, was incorporated in June 1964 for the purpose of formulating standards of genealogical research and the establishment of a register of persons who are deemed qua-

lified to do this type of work.

Researchers are divided into three categories, namely genealogists (C.G.), American lineage specialists (C.A.I.S.) and genealogical records searchers (G.R.S.). A genealogist is one who not only conducts research among primary sources and studies secondary works, but also constructs genealogies of families based upon his investigation of the sources and careful analysis of the evidence. An American lineage specialist is a genealogist who prepares a lineage (single line of descent) and is competent to determine the authenticity of evidence and acceptability of original source material and compiled and printed material. A genealogical searcher is one who searches original records, but makes no attempt to reconstruct a pedigree or to prepare a family history.

The total fee for Certified Genealogists is \$60.00, for Certified American Lineage Specialists \$40.00, and for Genealogical Record Searchers \$35.00. Certification is for a five year period, at the end of which it may be renewed for another five year period.
