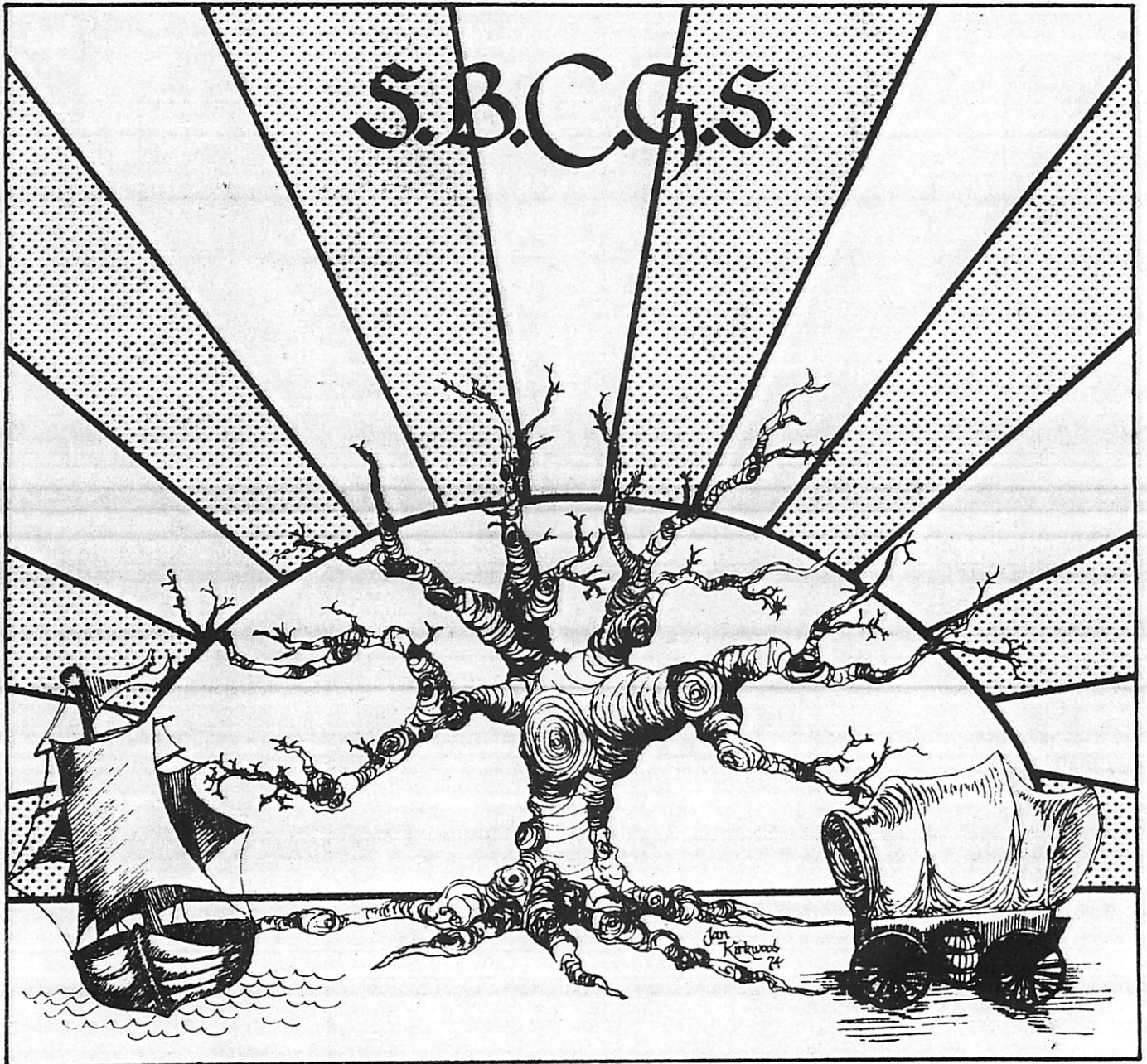

Membership Information

Membership: Annual membership begins from 1 January and continues through the ensuing calendar year to 31 December. Active membership is \$5.00 per year; sustaining, \$10.00 per year; associate (with restrictions), \$2.50 per year. Life membership is a single fee of \$100.00. There are also special considerations for honorary and honorary life membership. The membership privileges include the quarterly, the news bulletin, beginner classes in genealogy, special services, unlimited free queries, use of the Society library, free entry in the surname file and SURNAME REGISTRY.

Application: Any individual or institution interested in promoting the objectives of genealogical research and of the Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society may apply for membership by writing to the Society Council. Upon acceptance, a registration and the first year's full dues must accompany the application.

Subscription: The price for individual copies of ANCESTORS WEST is \$1.50 to non-members. Annual subscription is \$6.00 for four quarterly issues appearing in September, December, March, and June and are designated as Fall, Winter, Spring (beginning with Volume I, Number 2, March 1975), and Summer. Special rates are available to libraries at \$4.00 per year. Exchange arrangements for publications between societies is welcome.

Other Publications: The former quarterly newsletter, Issues 2 through 5 may be ordered for 50¢ per copy. Issue Number 1 (October 1973) appeared as the SURNAME INDEX and is available at \$1.00 per copy. The SURNAME REGISTRY which was designated for the Fall 1975 will be delayed until further notice; however, when published, it will be for sale at a higher rate. NEWS CUES which is a continuation of the former newsletter is numbered 6 on and is available for 75¢ per copy.

Queries: Members of the SBCGS are entitled to unlimited free queries. Non-members may submit queries at the rate of \$1.00 per query of twenty words or less; additional words are 5¢ each. For format, consult the query section of AW I:2. All entries must be made to the Query Editor one month prior to the publication of the quarterly issue in which you wish to appear.

Regular Meetings: The Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society meets the first Saturday of each month excluding July and August from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for an all-day workshop which includes the business meeting and the use of the Society library. Speakers are invited for special, separate sessions. The meetings are held at the Goleta Public Library, 500 Fairview Avenue, Goleta, California. Refreshments are also made available.

A GENEALOGIST'S GUIDE TO THE SANTA BARBARA COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Are you one of "those" genealogist who has researched in many localities across the United States and even overseas - yet you have only vague knowledge of the how and where of your own record-keeping institutions? One of those institutions is the County Courthouse. It is the main source of public records.

Santa Barbara County provides this from the most unique and famous setting-our Spanish styled County Courthouse occupies a full city block bound by Figueroa, Santa Barbara, Anapamu, and Anacapa Streets. If you begin research at any of the offices within this Courthouse you must "mind your work schedule" for the atmosphere and architectural singularity will easily lead you astray.

However, the very floor plan of the courthouse, despit its impression of complexity, groups the function almost into separate buildings. The Hall of Records (Recorder) is located at the corner of Anapamu and Anacapa Streets. As of 6 January 1975 the Recorder's functions were consolidated with those of the County Clerk to become the County Clerk-Recorder Office. Much updating and revision of methods has been made and is still in process. Physically the records are still located in the same general area as before the combination.

The entrance to the Hall of Records is through huge doors of hammered copper plates depicting the history of California. The first office is devoted exclusively to the business of receiving and preserving documents and official records. But by going through this office and up the stairs at the rear, you will find permanent land and other related records housed on rows of shelves in a mezzanine area. The records of the Recorder began in 1850 when the county was formed. The earliest land records were indexed into a combined Grantor-Grantee Book. By 1921 separate Grantee-Grantor Books were used and even later another system, LMNRT, was introduced. Today all documents are recorded through data processing. Therefore, in using these various forms of indexing, it would be advisable to ask for help from the personnel. Depending on the age of the record book, complete indexing instructions are given in the front of each book. For instance, a common name like MILLER has a separate section in the "M" grantee or grantor book.

A cabinet containing very early maps is also located in this area. The maps are identified as 1-A through 28-A and date from as early as 1871. They depict such places as the Santa Barbara Pueblo Lands, Ranchos, Towns & Cities, Cemeteries and other historical land uses.

That other group of records, vital statistics, which genealogists find so valuable is located two flights downstairs at the basement level. A recent inventory of the older vitals revealed:

Birth records began in 1843 and continued through 1952 in various groupings of dates and books covering the County in general, the City of Santa Barbara, Santa Maria, and Lompoc. Books A through J cover the dates of 1873-1918. From 1918 to the present the Books are referred to as "Regular Birth Books." Present day indexing is by the Soundex system and some records have been microfilmed.

Marriage records began in 1850 as required by State Proclamation. Very

early 1850-1888 marriage records are found in separate Books labeled "Women", "Men". However, there is also a separate groups of Books 1 through 4 entitled Index to Marriages of Men and Women 1850-1931.

Death records are available from 1878. Books A through K cover the period of 1878 through 1921. Books #1 - 112 beginning in 1918 to the present are also referred to as "Regular Death Books". Death certificates and some burial permits are included in Books 1 through 3 for the years 1888-1895.

Various methods of recording the indexing of birth, marriage, and death records have resulted in books which contain only certificates, only single line entries, or certificates with an index. Since 1905 records of birth and death have also been recorded at the Bureau of Record Vital Statistics, 774 P Street, Sacramento, Ca 95814. Inquiries by mail for information from the Hall of Records and the County Clerk's office should be directed to the County Clerk-Recorder, P.O. Drawer CC, Santa Barbara, CA 93102. The fee for a certified copy of a vital record is two dollars.

Many other older record books are stored in the basement. One volume entitled Torrens Register of Titles is a part of a group of torren records that is often overlooked as a source of genealogical information. Another title, Register of Stallions and Jacks reflects the Rancho history of Santa Barbara County.

Also located in this same basement area is the collection of Recorder's maps. These give a history of land changes in the form of survey, sub-division, and tract maps. Maps in an early chronological index are identified with map numbers. The maps in the cabinet upstairs also appear in this index in the appropriate time sequence. A brief abstracting of the Confirmation of Title to Old Land Grants has been done and includes references to map numbers. Book A contains maps of the cemetery districts located throughout the county. A reproduction of a map can be obtained most easily by first identifying it by number and then presenting a request to the Surveyors Office upstairs. There in an indexed notebook is a listing of the maps available and the cost per copy. Not all of the older maps are listed - hence the map number in the indexes.

Returning to the street level, we are now at what is considered the main entrance to the Courthouse - the beautiful Anacapa Archway. Inside at one end of the galleria is a large relief map of forty miles of Pacific coastline which faces east and west. As a genealogist it will give you a clear picture of Santa Barbara County in relationship to the rest of its California neighbors. From here you can take the elevator or climb the tiled staircase to the second floor and arrive outside the Mural Room. It is here that the atmosphere and architectural singularity mentioned before will no doubt take over even the most dedicated genealogist. Allow time to pause and enjoy it fully.

Down the hall to the right is the office of the County Clerk. Here all the records of criminal and civil functions of the Superior Court are documented. The genealogist's interest lies primarily in the probate records but also available are those records resulting from divorce, naturalization, marriage applications, passports. Juvenile records are not open to the public. As a result of the reorganization, a new area, three doors to the left of the Clerk's Office, has been provided for obtaining information on documents.

Documents are in the form of "hard copy" or microfilm. Microfilming began in the 1960's and is continuing on a block by block basis as finances become available. Older records that are already filmed date from 1853. Marriage applications start in 1873. (Remember that Spanish was the official language for public records for several years during the early Santa Barbara years, but in many instances these records are now in the form of translations.) Copies of instruments found on the microfilm is set at fifty cents per page. Certification of a copy is one dollar plus the copying charge.

ANCESTORS WEST has been publishing records from the Courthouse on a continuing basis since Volume I, Number 1. Using the index number provided in one of these series, I was able to easily locate a complete probate record dated in 1888. Indexes to probate records began in 1880 and are available at the counter in the Clerk's office.

We have long since outgrown this beautiful courthouse. Other record keeping services have been moved to offices in nearby buildings: the Assessor and Tax Collector are located in the Administrative Building across Anapamu Street, the Municipal Court is located in the opposite direction across Figueroa Street. The District Court is also in this same complex.

If you wish to enjoy a pleasant tour of the Courthouse and at the same time learn the how and where of a most important local record-keeping institution, I would suggest that first you join a guided tour. This is offered to the public by a group of dedicated women called the "Docents". It begins each Friday morning at 10:00 AM. When you have learned about the historical background of our remarkable Courthouse you can then return and do some serious research. The personnel in each and all of the offices will be able to help you most if you have taken the time to pinpoint the major factors of genealogy: locality, date, and as full a name as possible.

1. "Lompoc's Centennial Families"* by Myra Manfrina

HUYCK

ANDREW L. AND WALTER SCOTT HUYCK, brothers from So. Westerlo, N.Y., came to Lompoc in 1875 from San Jose. For a home Andrew chose a little valley near Surf, which until 1942 when it was absorbed into the military reservation, was known as Huyckville. Scott, as he was called, bought Lynden District property and 80 acres on the northeast corner of Floradale and Ocean, besides other acreage. In 1875 newspaper reports "Mr. Scott Huyck is putting rustic siding on the schoolhouse and painting it"--that would be the little shanty that was the first Lynden School over the hill west of the present South Vandenberg gate. That same year Scott was selling Thanksgiving turkeys at \$1.25 each. Scott and family left Lompoc about 1877 for Minnesota, returning a few years later and building on the Floradale property for a home. It is still in the family hands, owned by grandchildren Mrs. Bill (Addie Huyck) Leu and Earl and Howard Huyck, children of Frank and Jessie (Forbes) Huyck. There were three other sons of Scott--Scott, Jr, Herbert and Clyde. Scott, Jr., has descendants in the valley.

Andrew L. Huyck and his older sons, Edgar, John and Walter, grubbed the Huyckville land, and the family of four more children moved down in 1878. His business interests were widespread: a flour mill on North I Street, a lumber yard, a grain-threshing outfit, farming and horse-raising. He also entered valley politics, serving as Land Company director 1878-1880. Later deeding Huyckville to sons Edgar, John and Walter, and the I Street property to Sherman. He built himself a large home on his Renwick Avenue property. The house stands today on the corner of Cypress and I, moved there in 1911. Of the seven children, descendants of five are here today: Edgar, John, Walter, Eva (Mrs. James Rennie) and Amy (Mrs. Jim Richardson).

Huyck Stadium was named for Laurence Huyck, Andrew's great-grandson--he served many years on the school board and was an avid athletic booster.

Huycks of both Andrew and Scott ancestry probably extend into about 40 different Lompoc families 100 years after the colony land sale.

THE BOOK BROWSER

THE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF WITCHCRAFT AND DEMONOLOGY. Rossell Hope Robbins. New York: Crown Publishers, 1959. 571 pp. Illus. Facs. Select Bibliography. (Doubleday Book Club, Garden City, NY)

Why would any respectable genealogist attempt to review such an ominous title before other genealogists? The treatment of ENCYCLOPEDIA is scholarly and may be a valuable resource in ideas for 1) names and 2) an overview of a phenomenon which scourged western Europe for three centuries, from 1450 to 1750, which includes the chronicles of the populace of that era. Archived records number several millions in the United States alone. The biggest and best collection in the world for the study of witchcraft is at Cornell University and was assembled over a period of 40 years.

Rossell Hope Robbins, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, compares the period of 1450-1750 to another, more recent, stage in history: "...annihilation of ... 15,000,000 human beings in five years by the Nazis, the cruelty and injustice of the witch judges...took 20 years to burn at a conservative estimate, 200,000 witches..."

If we can put aside our preconceived popular ideas of witches and witchcraft, we can readily understand in earnest Robbins' treatment of the subject. By this we are not merely dismissing the idea of witchcraft as "hogwash" but accepting it for what it was—a malady which beset generations of human beings. Their beliefs of Christianity and its various components, however antipodal, created a chain of bizarre reactions which were fostered by religious leaders because "...it was the official policy of the churches, Roman Catholic and Protestant..." Therefore, Robbins does not seek to tantalize the imagination into a sensationalized world of sorcery but instead sets the social context within its historical framework. He refers to the more significant cases as exemplary and arranges them in encyclopedic or dictionary form.

Enlightening to the genealogist is the fact that the manuscripts and treatises on the subject remain extant for very minutely detailed accounts of the procedures were recorded. Indeed, these may be the only sources to names which may not otherwise appear in old church or civil records, and, in many instances, pre-date some. For example, when the accused "witch" was put to torture, he/she was forced to name his/her neighbors, and, if his/her inquisitor held a grudge, he would prompt the accused with a list of his own. At times the minds of the accused were visually led along the streets of a community to "locate" some of its residents.

Robbins' ENCYCLOPEDIA OF WITCHCRAFT...is subject to editorializing throughout—in most instances, probably because of his awe of

the lack of logic in the trials. He does judiciously report events, and, in all cases, cites well-documented source references. By no means totally comprehensive, Robbins states: "...To be inclusive, the history of witchcraft would be the history of European civilization, or rather un-civilization, and one hundred volumes...would be inadequate—and unreadable..." He may be accused of bearing judgment upon an historical past but in so doing, he brings to light an overlooked facet of people and events.

Of special interest to the American genealogist working on Massachusetts lines is Robbins' 19-page treatment of the "Salem Witch Trials" in which he follows the seeds of discontent from 1692 to 1711 and the reasons behind them through the accounts of those accused. He gives names, relationships, dates, and places. Again not comprehensive, Robbins cites as "...still the definitive work on this subject...Charles W. Upham's two-volume SALEM WITCHCRAFT written in 1867." Upham concludes that "'the final cause of Salem witchcraft,...makes it one of the great landmarks in the world's history.'"

There is also a list of 12 jurors who signed a "Confession of Error by the Jurors..." 14 January 1696 after serving a 1692 trial (quoted in Robert Calef, MORE WONDERS OF THE INVISIBLE WORLD, 1700). The surnames are FISK, BATCHELER, DANE, EVELITH, PERLY, PEBODY, PERKINS, SAYER, ELLIOTT, and HERRICK.

Summing the plight of the individual during such times, in Europe and in Salem, Robbins states: "When the majority of educated men think in such a frame of reference, and the majority of poorly educated men follow them, humanity's chances for survival become dim." All strata of society were affected by the "witch" trials mania—too many humans were blindly and blatantly accused and destroyed as a result. Their records tell their story.

ACORNS TO OAKS

Pedigree Chart Numbering. Are you using pedigree or ancestor charts which show 4 generations per chart? If so, the ancestor at the top of the right hand column on the 1st chart is #8 and the one at the bottom is #15, right? Each one of these ancestors in the right-hand column is continued on another chart. Sometimes it's confusing as to what number should be assigned to the continued charts.

Any chart may be continued by multiplying its number by 8 and subtracting 6 (ch # x 8 - 6 continuation #). The number thus derived is the continued chart number for that individual at the top of the right hand column on the chart you are extending.

It is rather easy to see how ancestor 8 on chart #1 is continued on chart #2 (1x8-6 2), but things get more complicated. For example, on chart #54 we find ancestor #864 at the top of the right hand column. What chart do we skip to in order to find #864 and his antecedents? Answer: #426 (54x8-6 426). Accordingly, ancestor #865 is continued on chart #427, #866 on chart #428, #867 on chart #429, and so forth.

A large thank you to the librarian, Joyce, who was most helpful. She even took time to write to our member a week later to advise of another source document she had found!

Passengers. The book, THE MARY AND JOHN, is written by Maude P. Kuhns and published by the Tuttle Company in 1971. It is devoted to the genealogical background of the passengers of the Ship "Mary and John" which were some of the earliest arrivals in this country. The book may be found locally at UCSB Library under call #CS61 K8 or at the Los Angeles Public Library in Genealogy Reference.

Census. State censuses were taken in most states every 10 years but 5 years later than the 0 Federal Census years; i.e., 1855, 65, 75, etc. (There is also a motion in government currently under way to have the census taken every 5 years.) The state censuses are generally found within each state. To learn of their availability, you should write to the State Library or consult THE UNITED STATES CENSUS COMPENDIUM, copies of which may be found in the SBCGS library or in most local libraries.

Census records for England, Scotland, and Canada are available for the years 1841, 1851, 1861, and 1871 with similar information found in our 1850 Census. These records are available from the Genealogical Society Library in Salt Lake City, but it is a must to know the shire and parish to avoid extensive research.

School Records. You will find school records from many extinct country schools in various state historical societies. They are a valuable source of information to the genealogical researcher. Some school records disclose who visited the school, on what day, and the address of the visitor. This may help pinpoint a family in a certain area at a certain date.

School records are a very important item in our records. Many of them show the child's parents and from where they came. Grade cards of your children should always be kept for record purposes.*

##

Ministers. Some ministers always kept records of all the marriage, baptism, and burial services they performed. Of course, finding the records of a certain minister is another problem but may be solved by a little detective work. Most church archives keep indexes to the names of their ministers during a certain time period.

##

Newspapers. Newspapers are often valuable sources of birth, marriage, and death notices. Most of the older papers did not cover the births or obituaries which are not always accurate in any paper, anyway, but newspapers should be considered a source to consult.

##

Columns. Genealogy columns in the various newspapers are apparently declining in number but are excellent for the exchange of queries, most of which are free. If you are interested, check Anita Creek Milner's NEWSPAPER GENEALOGY COLUMNS. It covers 58 columns in 24 states. IN and TX have the most with 8 each. There are 12 states where there are no known columns published.

There is a genealogical column now running weekly in the Sunday Edition of the "South Bend Indiana Tribune". Free inquiries, news, notices, and listings of surname interests are included. The area covered is northern Indiana and southern Michigan. More than one query may be included in a letter if each is clearly separate from the other. Contact: "Michiana Roots"; SOUTH BEND TRIBUNE; 225 West Colfax; South Bend IN 46601.
