

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- 1. Do your "homework" thoroughly. List as many dates and places as possible and as much data as you have available about occupation(s) of your immigrant ancestor or person for whom you are searching. It is unbelievable the number of persons with identical names one finds in British records. To be sure you find THE one for whom you are looking you need as many reference points as you can accumulate.
- 2. Study the map showing the counties as they existed in the early day then locate the town or village within the county. Frequently countistories will reveal data you do not have. These county histories are more often available in the smaller libraries of a given area than in London libraries.
- 3. Good maps indicating percentage of records before 1813 that have be recorded by the Genalogical Society of Latter Day Saints are available through the Society in Salt Lake City. A study of the maps an records available will save much "backtracking".
- 4. Excellent maps showing every hamlet are available in the Atlas pub- by the Automobile Club of Britain. ----Ask for the address of the club and price of Atlas from the British Tourist Authority.
- 5. A list of the ships with their dates and names of your ancestors known to have arrived on them will speed research and avoid duplicate copying, much of which has to be done by hand.
- 6. A 3x5 card headed by name of a county with listing of relevant data of your ancestor from that county helps to save time and confusion.

### HALT! Who Goes There!

The above command in a security system requires that you establish your identity without a doubt. Identity is the desired goal in genealogy, too the basis of all presumptions of family relationships. How fine it would have been if this principle could have been applied to the people in the old box of family photographs with its collection of babies, youths and elders, too often nameless. Vague memories are little help, and "Mother" talogued or "At Uncle Jim's place" are only tantalizing.

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The living elders in our families hold the key to many facts no one else can know. You approach them with notebook and tape recorder to get information that flows from memories of real times and people. You can do more factual recording too if with your pen you gently and carefully write on the back of portraits as you talk about them, who the subject was and whatever other information can be gleaned. Who was this young man? Where did he live? What did he do for a living? Where does he fit in family r lationships? When was this photo taken?

This brings us to a pertinent present. We can get so preoccupied with olden, illusive times and places that we forget we are ourselves making history which someone one day may want to know. Are you clearly identify ing current photographs with names, place, date? Once photographs were rare treasures. Now they come back from the developers by the dozens, on prints, on slides and even movie film. We are snowed with numbers, but t quantity will not help future researchers unless we face the fact that ealogist! while taking pictures can be instant fun, making them truly valuable requires they be accurately identified at the time that all facts are immed ately and unquestionably available. Identify your current photographs wi who, where and when, for yourself, your children and future searchers who may want to know what life was like back in the good old days of the 70's At family reunions, gently nudge relatives, young and old, with the value of backing up photographs with facts.

> Identification applies to another field of research too. In the course of collecting, searchers accumulate notebooks and files of information pain-stakingly collected. These are carried to libraries, meetings and t friends for sharing and further research. Some material could unmistakably reveal the life of John Jones in 1700 in Salem, but your best friend may not recognize that it belongs to you. If it is forgotten on a librar table, the finder will know that it is a treasure to its owner but may no be able to discover who the owner is. The wise researcher will put his name, address, phone number (and for himself, date) in each notebook as h begins it as a matter of routine so that if it strays, it gets back to the one for whom it has true value.

> Small inexpensive adhesive address slips advertised for sale in magazines are a quick and effective way to identify your papers. One of thes can be applied to each paper you send to another. This may reward you in the future when your friend discovers an important new fact, and your nam appearing conveniently with the old information reminds him that the new fact will be important to you also.

> In family history search, every clue is weighed and pondered, and every indisputable fact uncovered is cause for satisfaction. How fine it would be if we could as easily discover "Halt! 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## A 1848 INCIDENT IN SANTA BARBARA

The unexpected taste of military lash and fire that the Californians had delivered to the American conquerors as a kind of gallant last salute to the Province of Alta California as she passed on to her destiny as an American State, cost the Barbarenos \$500 during the aftermath of the revolution.

Late in the winter of 1847, the American brig Elizabeth was wrecked on the coast at Santa Barbara. Long after all other property had been salvaged and carried away there remained on the beach a certain cannon, which, being without a carriage, was quite useless to anyone. Then one time early in May it disappeared.

Captain Lippett, the officer in command of the Post, who was a nervous and fidgety man at best, pondered the mysterious disappearance of the cannon and reached the conclusion that the sea-washed, carriageless gun had been stolen by the Californians with sinister intentions. He convinced himself that intrigue against the garrison was afoot. Remembering the flight of Talbot from Santa Barbara, remembering the tales of California Talbot from Santa Barbara, remembering the tales of California lances and their dreadful work at San Pascal, Captain Lippett apparently pictured himself as beleaguered by those smiling heroes with the Elizabeth's old shipwrecked gun.

Either from real fear of an attack, or to exhibit his watchfulness and zeal in the performance of duty, without notifying his superior officer, Colonel Stevenson, then stationed at Los Angeles, he sent a courier post haste to Colonel Richard B.M. Mason, military governor at Monterey, and at a cost of \$400 gave his version of the loss of the gun, magnifying its importance and the danger of his situation.

Colonel Mason naturally took him seriously, and by return messenger came Military Order No. 36, laying the town of Santa Barbara under a contribution of \$500, and directing Colonel J. D. Stevenson, as commander of the district, to direct the assessment of this contribution, which should be levied upon the people if the missing gun were not produced before the first day of July.

Astonished and embarrassed by these orders, Stevenson felt as though he had been presented with a bomb and instructions to throw it into the midst of a quiet and inoffensive people, who were now upon the most friendly terms with the American authorities of the District. Since there was nothing to do about it but obey, he went to Santa Barbara, reaching there June 23.

-from Santa Barbara, Tierra Adorada, pub. by Security-First National Bank, 1930. Colonel Stevenson presented himself immediately at the house of Don Pablo De la Guerra. Before him the embarrassed officer laid forth the ridiculous situation, expressing his regret. At first indignant, that influential citizen finally consented to aid the Colonel in securing a peaceable settlement of the affair. As they were parting, he said, significantly, "Colonel, since you are likely to be here some time, cannot you make this your headquarters and order your band up here?" adding that he knew of nothing that would afford the Barbarenos equal pleasure. Santa Barbara was promptly made regimental headquarters. The band was ordered to arrive on the third of July.

Of all American customs the old-fashioned Fourth of July celebration had the greatest appeal for the Californian. His patriotic spirit stirred in response to its varied glories; he genuine love of liberty was fired by its meaning; the display of color, the brave glitter of flags and uniforms, the ebullient blaring of the bands, the joyful fulminations both of cannon and of orators of the day struck a truly responsive chord in his soul...here was one thing Gringo to which he could respond. And in California he added to these celebrations the finishing touch . . . the barbecue and feats of the rodeo.

To the Fourth of July of 1848 at Santa Barbara was added the glorious tootling of Stevenson's full Regimental Band and Governor Mason's proclamation anent the lost Cannon.

Promptly at 3 P.M. the band reached Carpinteria, July 3. Entering the outskirts of Santa Barbara Just at dusk, they marched up the rutted path that delinested the course of State Street, cut off across lots to the open square we know today as Plaza De la Guerra, and before the doors of the historic adobe house of Captain Don Pablo De la Guerra, they assembled and poured out upon the quiet air the dulcet, longing strains of a famous Spanish melody. At the first note of the serenade the citizens rushed to the streets...and a more enraptured people never were beheld. In the midst of the serenade Colonel Stevenson called on Don Pablo, and tears filled the eyes of the handsome Californian as he thanked the Colonel for this compliment and for the beloved Spanish songs while sharing his emotion the people wept, too, in their joy.

The morning of the Fourth was ushered in by the band, with the citizenry assembled even more eagerly, if possible, than they had been the night before. Payment of the per capita contribution levied in punishment for the disappearance of the famous cannon was scheduled for 10 O'clock. Under the mellifluous spell of music a critical situation, which had given Stevenson cause for real fear, was turned into a jolly celebration. In a dignified manner the Barbarenos acknowledged the humor of the affair, and never was there a Californian of those days who wouldn't willingly pay a paltry five hundred dollars to be amused. While the payments were being made, Colonel Stevenson was requested to deliver an oration, which he did with the greatest success, his speech losing mothing by the translation into Spanish by his friend, Stephen C. Foster, first american Mayor of the neighboring town of Los Angeles, who had come up with the band for the occasion.

In fact, never did a Fourth of July pass more delightfully, terminating in a grand ball in the evening, with more speeches, and a continuance of the music that had enlivened the town all day. It is said that the only persons in the entire city who did not thoroughly enjoy the celebration were a group of popular young men, who bore such good names as Cota, Lugo, De la Guerra, and Garcia, and who paled or looked at each other large-eyed when mention was made of "El Canon Perdido".

Ten years later, in December, 1858, when a fierce southeaster lashed at both land and sea, and the Estero cut a new channel near the beach, they found the Lost Cannon sticking its rusty corroded muzzle out of the caved-in bank. Hilariously it was hauled out and mounted upon a carreta. In triumphal procession it was dragged through the soggy streets to the center of town, where no amount of mud could dampen the spirit of the impromptu festivities celebrated in its honor, or impede the flow of oratory that it inspired.

But alas, alas, "this gallant, misunderstood and maligned lost cannon came finally to a molten end in a San Francisco brass foundry"...closing its eventful career, so to speak, in a genuine blaze of glory.

It was characteristic of the whimsical temperament of the old-time Barbarenos that the famous affair of the five hundred dollars should have captured their imagination and interest more than did the more serious events of the contest for a Province.

When, a year or two after the cannon was lost, Don Antonio Maria De la Guerra, Don Joaquin Carrillo, and Eugene Lies named the new streets of Santa Barbara, they gave to one of the major cross streets that then, as now marked the approximate center of the charming town, the intriguing name Canon Perdido. The payment of the five hundred dollars was commemorated in the name of Quinientos Street, while the single Santa Barbara Street bearing the name of a Governor of Celifornia in office since the Mexican period is Mason Street, recalling the man who imposed the \$500 fine, but, who after the signing of peace with Mexico gave it back again.

And when the first Council of the new city adopted an official city seal, the design comprised a circular disc with Ciudad de Santa Barbara lettered on the border, in the center a cannon upright, and on the top the inscription "Vale 500 P" This meant "Worth Five Hundred Dollars" but certain wags were wont to interpret the Vale as translated "Goodbye \$500"

That would have been appropriate, too. In the period when Mason returned the \$500 for the erection of a jail, then the city's most urgent need, there was not a bank in existence in California. The funds were held by one city official and then another, and for eleven years successive City Councils were occupied with efforts to determine who had the historic sum. In January 1860 the City Council lifted its voice for the last time over the quinientos pesos, and finally financed the jail by other means.


The society library has exchange periodicals from many states, purchases new books, and circulates member books for temporary loan during the workshops. Members, besides bringing in their own books to share, also donate books and quarterlies they no longer use.


Our volunteers staff the library, Our storage space is limited but we have solved this problem by placing the materials in a modular labeled boxing system. By this method our members become responsible for the contents of the box they have selected to hold for any given month. We have found that this system is so popular, volunteer holders are not scarce.

To help our library grow, we do ask for that special touch that only you can give. There are many ways to do this. Search all used book stores, auctions, estate, garage, yard, basement, attic sales and the like. Another way of helping to build resources would be to photocopy the indexes and bibliographies of the books you own or borrow through library or interlibrary loans. This type of sharing can help save each of us precious time tracking down information on a book of particular interest. Also, our exchange editor, Alma Lauritsen, buslly seeks new areas for exchange publications, and it would be in your beinterest to inform her of your geographical area of research.

We are in the planning stage to offer other ways to share family names and lines. The basic idea is to submit five generations beginning wit an immigrant ancestor, This does not necessarily limit the scope to our own ancestors but to those we find belonging to others. This shou help expand our genealogy section and aid each other's work on certain elusive surnames. We are entertaining the idea of the name "Five G (generation) Collection".

## THE BASYE FAMILY IN THE UNITED STATES by Otto Basye

The reason I have chosen the Basye Book to review is not because it is my family, but because it is an exceptional volume, the finest of its kind I have seen. Completly indexed, family lines are easily delineated. The first generation is A-1. second generdation, B-1. etc. which makes simplified searching.

The Author has collected every conceivable source of information, listing all his references in the back of the book under subject matter, Public Records, Tombstone Records, Bible Records etc. Public Records are listed by State & County. The Persons Index is clear & simple. Each name is listed with its letter & number and can be easily found. Many other names besides Basye are included in this index.

The best way to investigate a book is to read its table of . contents. Just a few chapter headings are: Racial stock, Bayses. in England, Reformation and the Huguenots, The Three Brothers, Bayses occupations, townsite developers, soldiers & Biographical sketches.

Many family stories have been disappointing inasmuch as little A right was given about the immigrant ancestor but this book gives the ... 'full story of the earliest Basyes to grace our shores.

the state of Edmund Basye born about 1645 and lived in Northumberland ... County, Virginia is fully documented. Page after page list his indentures, wills & inventories. As the book explains, almost all of the wills & documents are given in full, which makes for illuminative reading.

Not every family can boast of a buccaneer. Alejandro Basey who after going to America with his two brothers joined William Dampier a pirate, fell in love with a daughter of a Malayan prince, lived on the Phillipine island of Samar at the spot which is now called Basey. The above story was told by Mr. C. L. Hooyer, U.S. Consul to Spain who had lived on Samar.

Many of the descendents have given true stories of their ancestors which are published here and make fascinating reading. Early Bayses intermarried with Cordell, Martin & Taylor families of Virginia.

Invaluable to the historian are first chapters on houses, ·log houses, tools, mills, orchards, roads, courts, furniture and much more. This is a history in itself.

The Bayse Family Book is dark blue, hard bound & contains 987 pages, fine paper with excellent print. It may be purchased from the Author's son, Mr. Paul E. Basye, 1427 Floribunda Ave., Burlingame, Calif., 94010. Price \$26.00

ŭ T. THE HANDWRITING OF AMERICAN RECORDS FOR A FERIOD OF 300 YEARS. By E. Kay Kirkham. Published by Everton Fublishers, Inc., Box 368, Logan, Utah 84321. C1973. Illustrated. Appendices. 106 p.

The book is a guide for searching old documents, giving help in interpreting correctly messages written with many variations. Before spelling became standardized, the individual writer chose whatever letter or letters he thought were appropriate for a sound, and variations could occur within a document. Bandwriting varied greatly as well, eccording to the writer's education, age, health and other factors. There was a common use of abbreviations, signs, symbols, shortcuts, and "every flourish of the pen meant something".

There are samples of early American alphabets, abbreviations, contractions and numbers. Appendices show samples of old foreign alphabets and contain a glossary of words, terms, phrases and legal terminology.

It is interesting reading in its own right, and offers valuable help to searchers trying to identify names and other facts in old letters, censuses and other documents.

A HANDY GUIDE TO RECORD-SEARCHING IN THE LARGER CITIES OF THE UNITED STATES, Including a Guide to Their Vital Records And Some Maps With Street Indexes With Other Information of Genealogical Value. By E. Kay Kirkham. Published by Everton Publishers, Inc., Box 368, Logan, Utah 84321. C1974. 137 pages.

The author gives voluminous facts on a partial list of larger cities in every state. Addresses for finding county information is given, including land and probate records. Political wards are identified in the cities, with indexes to streets by wards, helping census searchers. The first Federal Census is identified. City Directories and newspapers are listed. Addresses are given for obtaining state records of Vital Statistics.

The book pinpoints areas of possible research, with extensive and detailed information of record sources.

It discussed use of Salt Lake City Records, with an abstract of its file on Pennsylvania. It lists main research facilities within the state, and gives a list of put lications. There is a Directory of Frofessional Researchers and a Directory of Genealogical and Historical Organizations. It makes possible accurate, effective research that the genealogist will welcome.
