THE NEW ENGLAND HISTORIC GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY 1979 NATIONAL SEMINAR PROGRAM ON FAMILY AND LOCAL HISTORY RESEARCH

MARCH 14 1979 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. SANTA BARBARA BILTMORE HOTEL

The New England Historic Genealogical Society is a nonprofit institution founded in 1845 for the purpose of collecting, studying and preserving New England family and local history. As the oldest and largest society of its kind, it maintains a research library of nearly 300,000 books, pamphlets and family papers.

Each year more than 15,000 persons from throughout the United States and abroad use these collections to research their family heritage. In searching for ancestors and tracing the routes they followed from one generation to the next, members have found fulfillment in discovering a personal link with the past. Members of the Society enjoy unlimited access to the Library, its printed books, pamphlets and rare book and manuscript collections. A circulating library of duplicate copies is also available to members. SBDOS has listings and rules applicable to the circulating library.

Membership in the Society includes a subscription to the quarterly, NERG REGISTER, the oldest continuously issued journal of its kind. The REGISTER prints articles and book reviews relating to New England family and local history. In addition, the Society has published many genealogies, local histories and compilations of vital records, any of which still in print a member may purchase at a ten percent discount.

SBCGS is indeed greatly privileged to honor the NEHGS and its representatives on the occasion of the second Western Tour, and the first Western Tour Seminar to be held in Santa Barbara.

DAVID W. DUMAS lectures on Census Records and Military Records. Dr. Dumas is a graduate of Brown University and University of Virginia Law School, and is a practicing attorney in Providence, R.I. He has lectured at NEHGS summer seminars and is an authority on the use of legal terms in genealogical research.

The Society will provide a coffee break at each seminar. A 75minute midday break will allow participants time for lunch according to their own choices and at their own expense.

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FAMILY HISTORY SYMPOSIUM REVIEW

Alex Heley was featured as special guest speaker at the symposium on "The Family and the Community", held January 26-27,1979 at UCSB. The event was co-sponsored by the Department of History, UCSB, and the National Archives, and was an effort to describe the available resources for research in family history, so intensely stimulated by the T.V. dramatization of "Roots".

The Friday program was a seminar workshop especially for the librarian, archivist and historian. The morning session was headed by J. Carlyla Parker of California State, Stanislaus, as a mini-course on Reference Services. The afternoon workshop, chaired by G. Wesley Johnson, Dept. of Ristory, UCSB, was concerned with Public History and the Community Historian.

The Saturday program began with registration at 8 A.M.for those attending the 8130 9:45 session, which was divided into two events: "Family History on the Ground", chaired by Wilbur Jacobs, of UCSB, and addressed by Arlene Bakle of Salt Lake City, and "The Family and the Community through Oral History", chaired by Thomas Tuller, UCSB, and addressed by Rebecca Conrad, Iowa State Historical Society, Ingrid W. Scobie, UC San Diego, and Stephen Payne, Ph.S. Fellow, UC Santa Cruz.

A co-welcome from the sponsors was given in Campbell Hall 10-11AM with speakers - Robert O. Collins, UCSB, Joseph Williams, GSA, and James B. Rhoads, Archivist of the United States.

The second session was broken into three parts running concurrently "Getting Started in Family History", chaired by Richard E.Oglesby, UCSB, who introduced the speakers, Ben Bloxham, Brigham Young U., Marge C. Fahy, So. Cal. Gen.Soc., and Carlton H.Smith, a former president GBCGS

"Writing Family History and Biography", chaired by C. Wesley Johnwon, who introduced as speakers, David Kyvig,U.of Akron, Yaffa Draznin, author, and Ted Hinckley, Cal State, San Jose.

"Sources for Family and Community History" was chaired by JoAnn Williamson of National Archives and had as speakers, J. Carlyle Parker, Cal State,Stanislaus, Kenneth Rossman, National Archives, and Raymond Wright, Genealogy Society of Utah.

The third session held from 2-3:15 PM was also broken into three selections - "New Perspectives on Family and Community History", introduced by Patricia Cohen' UCSB, and addressed by Alan Feldman, Lower Friends School, Pa., Dean May, U. Utah, and Richard Bushman. U. Delaware.

"Impact of Immigration on Family and Community" was introduced by Bogna Lorence-Kot,UC Berkeley,with speakers - Frederick Luebke,U.Nebr., Donald T.Nata,Cal State Dominguez Hills,Nadine Nata,El Camino College, and Phyllis Martinelli, Phoenix History Project.

"Sources for Family and Community", with Carl W. Harris, UCSB, as chairman and speakers George Simons, Inter Media Foundation,Santa Monica, Marie Northrop, and Anita Check Milner, authors.

In Campbell Hall was the coming together of all groups in attendance to hear Alex Haley, presented by Robert A. Huttenback, Chancellor UCSB. Mr. Raley's address was good-humored and of great interest as he spoke of the trials of the BLACK MAN in search of his family history and touched on some of the tribulations of becoming famous. He spoke well and without notes, as he lounged against the podium, and gave straight-forward answers to the many questions from the audience. Mr. Haley has created a small foundation to help those seeking to promote family reunions as evidence of his interest and support of others trying to discover and preserve their individual family histories.

NOTES ON JARVIS AND WALKER FAMILIES from Patricia L. White

It is interesting to note the Walkers probably came with Sir Edmond Plowden before going to New Jersey. People don't realize that there were 350 residents in Jamestown, Virginia in 1618 and 24 families on the Eastern Shore at the time when Grace O'Neill (an Irish ancestor of mine) arrived in June, 1618 on the "Diana" more than a year before the "Mayflower". Probably many more first came to Jamestown and settled temporarily on the Eastern Shore before scattering to Maryland, Delaware, and New Jersey. Massachusetts was pretty well isolated at this early period and New York in the hends of the Dutch.

The publishing business has always been concentrated in the Northeast, hence Virginia's early history has been largely ignored. The Civil War destroyed many southern records in the South and economic survival became more important than publishing what remained. These two books on the Eastern Shore are unique: <u>County Records</u>¹ and <u>Virginia's Eastern Shore</u>², I am so glad I could get a copy. There may not be many more left. As far as I know the only copies obtainable are from the Shore Savings & Loan Company in Accomec, Virginia.

JARVAS FAMILY (Also spelled JARVIS and JARVICE)

With few exceptions, all the residents of Northampton County took part in the first tax revolt in the American Colonies - 1651. This was more than 100 years before the Boston Tea Party. Among those who revolted were members of the Jarvis family. It is interesting to note that three centuries later, another Jarvis led the tax revolt in California in 1978.

From County Records supra:

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Christopher Jarvis on 7-6-1640 owes Anthony Hodgkins 1588 pounds of Tobacco. Debt still owed in May 1645. (Tobacco fell in price to less than 1 cent a pound. Much poverty throughout Virginia).

Francis Jarvis, p. 209, petitions for status as a freeman as having served his indenture to Matthew Patt for full time plus 14 days. Contested, p. 226. Seems to have been a scrapper even then.

From <u>Virginia's Eastern Shore</u> supra. There are a number of references to this family, but a quick scan of the references do not show wives' names, but occasionally a son. Christopher Jarvis bought land in Northampton in 1632 and this eventually became known as "Eyre Hall", one of the famous estates on the Shore that is open during Garden Week. Others mentioned as purchasing land are: George Jarvis, Henry, Amble, Jesse, John, Robert, Thomas and many references to William Jarvas. (Sometimes different spelling.)

There is little written about the gradual and determined westward movement within the boundaries of Virginis before the mountains are reached. This covered a long span of time - from the settlement of Jamestown in 1607 to 1750 and the opening of Kentucky. Rowever, by 1670, there were settlers, such as Samuel Stalmaker on the Holston. He and Dr. Thomas Walker, physician, surveyor, speculator in western lands, and for some years the legal guardian of Thomas Jefferson, explored Kentucky before Daniel Boone looking for an 800,000 acre grant given him by the King of England. Tidewater colonists pushed west, first to Gloucester, then New Kent, King and Queen, King William, Essex, Hanover, Caroline, Goochland, Louisa, Orange, Albemarle and Augusta. The westernmost counties were again divided into smaller counties.

Walkers appear in Northampton County records prior to 1642 and others came with Sir Edmond Plowden who then went to New Jersey. This would account for Walkers appearing in Maryland and New Jersey. They were evidently related to the Capt. Thomas Walker who came in 1650, the ancestor of Dr. Thomas Walker, since Tidewater Walkers settled on land of the Loyal Land Company in Southwest Virginia and Tennessee.

What interests me most in this family is that succeeding generations were the first to explore the opening of the West from the Tidewater to the California coast - not only explored, but brought settlers.

Also from Virginia's Eastern Shore supra:

P. 29. "March 30 1641. Wee whose names are underwritten this days made choyce of by the Inhabitants of Northampton Countie in Virginia to give Informacons and Instruccons to the gent Ellected Burgesses for this present Grand Assemblie. . . And for the Redresse of those agreevances wch (at present) wee are capable & sensible of in our Countie of Northampton.

. . But after the 1647, since that tyme wee Conceive & have found that the taxes were very weightie. But in a more especiall manner wee are very sensible of the Taxacon of fforty sixe pounds of tobacco p. poll (this present yeare). And desire that the same bee taken off the charge of the Countie of Northampton furthermore wee alledge that after 1647 wee did understand & suppose our Countie of Northampton to be disioynted & seqestered from the rest of Virginia. Therefore that Llawe wch requireth & inioyneth Taxacons from us to bee Arbitrarye & illegall forasmuch as wee had neither summons for Ellecon of Burgesses nor voyce in their Assemblie (during the time aforesd) but only the Singulur Burgess in September, Ano. 1651. We conceive that wee may Lawfullie ptest agt the preedings in the Act of Assemblie for public Taxacons wch have relacon to Northmton Countie since the year 1647. . . . "

"Witness our hands subscribed the day & year aforesd.

Stephen Charlton	Wm. Whittington
Llevyne Denwood	John Ellis
Jno Nuthall	Steph Horsey"

The Assembly did not act on it until 1653 when it referred to the protest as scandalous and seditious - and "hath caused much disturbance in the peace of the government of the county. . ." The signers were fined Three hundred pounds of tobacco each, and a Capt. Thomas Johnson fined Five hundred pounds of tobacco. (In 1646 he had obtained a patent for 600 acres in Northompton County.)

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MIGRATION PATTERNS FROM 1852 STATE CENSUS Santa Barbara County California

Reprinted from ANCESTORS WEST, Vol. 1, No. 2, Spring 1975

p. 45: A portion of the 1850 Federal Population Census for the County of Santa Barbara was destroyed in a disaster, it is said, as a result of a flood caused by a tidal wave. As with many states, California gathered a state census for 1852. copy of this census was made by A. B. Gledhill in February, 1958 from the "California Census of 1852", Volume IX at the A California State Library, California Division, Sacramento, California and placed in the Gledhill Library of the Santa Barbara Historical Society Museum. Statistics in the report of the Secretary of State were presented to the Legislature of 1853 and are also included with this copy of the 1852 Census of Santa Barbara County. Information covered in the census is name, age, sex, occupation, birthplace, and resident (of). The entry names are not in alphabetical order and have been copied as they appear from the copy of pages 13 through 52 in the book. Some of the abbreviations and translations are MW (male white) FW (female white) MI (male Indian) FI (female Indian) U Cal [UC] Upper California - as opposed to Baja California) Vaquero (cattleman) ranchero (rancher).

A contemporary map of the United States from Bliss^{*} <u>Analysis of Geography.</u> 10th ed., 1855, is reproduced in this issue of ANCESTORS WEST. Note the area then within California.

The diversity of birthplaces and former residences of inhabitants of Santa Barbara County is amazing. Countries not now in existence include New Granada, South America (now Colombia and Panama)- Buenos Ayres, then a separate country - ST which your editor cannot place. In Europe Germany and Prussia 1852 Santa Barbara County Census from California Census of 1852, Vol. IX,pp.18-57 reprinted in ANCESTORS WEST as indicated below

It has an extensive trade with all parts of the world, for which it is finely bituated. <u>Minerals</u>. It has immense deposits of Gold, with quickeilver and other valueble minerals. <u>Overnment</u>. The governor and senate hold office two years, and the representatives one. <u>Religion</u>. The natives are Catholics. There are other sects, but none predomitries, mostly from the other States. <u>Employments</u>. Mining is the principal. Agriculture and trade are fast rising into importance. <u>Exports</u>. These consist of vast quantities of Gold, with Quicksilver, Biddes, etc.





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LIREGTORY OF ARCHIVES AND MANUSCRIPT REPOSITORIES IN THE UNITED STATES 1978. National Historical Publications and Records Commission. National Archives and Record Services. General Services Administration, Washington, D.C.

This Directory is an excellent and extensive research guide to historical and genealogical collections of reference material throughout the United and States and its possessions. The material is arranged by state, then by city and the institutions named within the city. An index of 122 pages further details the text, listing subject matter, locations and names of libraries. Impressive for its volume alone, it is a large book, 8g x 10g with 905 pages.

Each unit is detailed to include name of repository, mailing address, users, fees, and access. This will be a source of further enrichment of collections also, since there is a description of materials solicited for each collection. Inclusive dates, number of volumes included in the holding, and a general description of materials is given.

Impressive in its range of classified sources, it also is capable of vast future expansion. "The data base is capable of expansion to include 1) all archives and manuscript repositories in the United States; 2) all collections or record groups held by those repositories; 3) information down to the series, folder or item level for each of these collections or record groups; and 4) information about the condition of all the records entered in the data base. At present, the Commission is concentrating on 1 and 2 and the series level of number 3 only and on the national level will probably not produce information in greater detail than is represented in those steps".

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As a research tool for individuals, it is a detailed and clearly understood guide for reaching specific information, and it appears to be invaluable in a genealogy library. NEW IN THE LIBRARY
