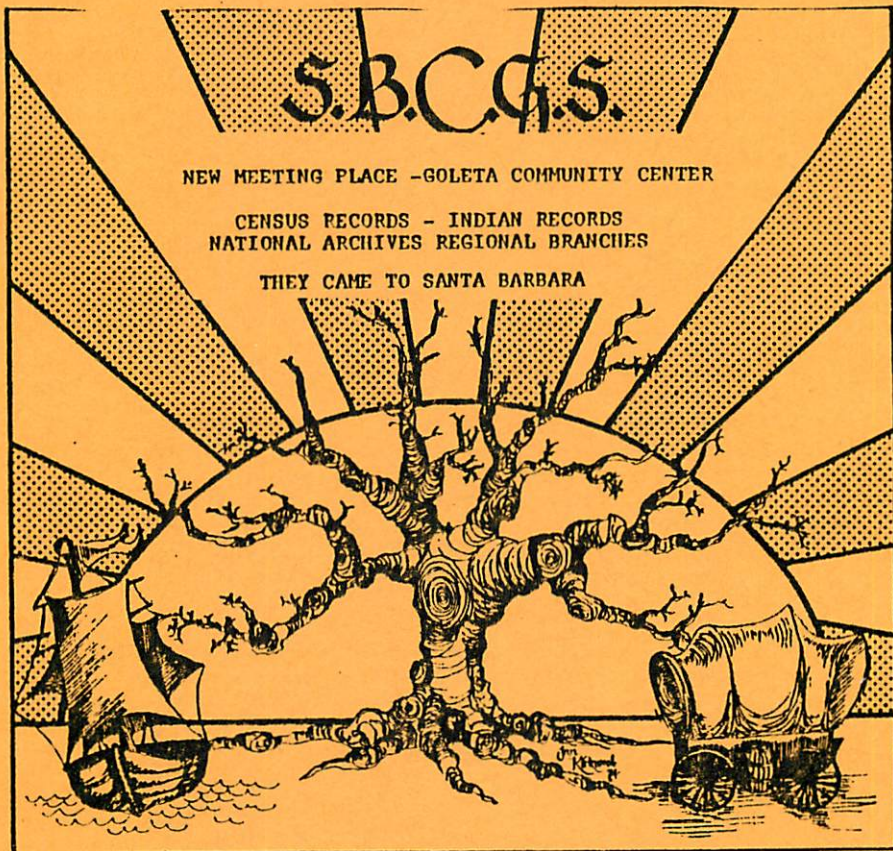

FIRST MEETING - GOLETA COMMUNITY CENTER

On Saturday, May 5, 1979, Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society met for the first time in Room 1, Goleta Community Center, 5689 Hollister Avenue, Goleta, with 45 members and 2 guests in attendance, filling the three long tables lengthwise of the room. Two other tables provided accommodations for the librarian and her staff, backed by book shelving and closet space the width and depth of the room.

There is still much to be done to facilitate use of library materials. Thus far the 90-odd volume Hazard Collection of family history, donated by past president Carlton N. Smith, has been arranged alphabetically by families and indexed. The librarian is in the process of card cataloging library materials, including periodicals, and has instituted a card index of historical-genealogical societies, with addresses. A half-dozen members volunteered to spend a half-hour each shelving materials, so that all could be safely closeted and locked until arrangements can be made for use of the room between meetings and for volunteer staffing.

Francis J. Forster, M. D., of Santa Barbara, born in County Tipperary, Ireland, told of his accomplishments in six months of Society membership in finding his "roots", including a trip to Ireland and England. A fascinating story, spiced with Irish wit. Knowing that his grandfather, John Burke Forster, was a doctor who died in Liverpool in 1904, led him to inquire of the British Medical Association. A directory showed the home residence to be in County Clare, within sixty miles of his own birthplace. He found the lineage set out in an 1866 newspaper and that of a collateral branch of the family in "The Irish Chieftans or A Struggle for the Crown, by Charles French Blake Forster, Dublin, 1872, thereby tracing his own ancestry to Baldwin I, Count of Flanders and Artois who died in 879. He is in the process of compiling a Story of the Forster Family and already has an impressive collection of photograph, of persons, paintings and places, of gravestones and manor houses, and much essay material, and an avocation for life.

WALKER FAMILY - "AMERICAN TRAILBLAZERS"

Patricia L. White

The Walkers were American trailblazers. In succeeding generations Walkers were the first to explore the opening of the West from the Tidewater to the California coast. They not only explored but brought settlers.

From Virginia's Eastern Shore, Vols 1 and 2, (Northampton County and Accomac County) by Ralph T. Whitelaw, we find:

There are several Walkers mentioned who purchased acreage or plantations on the Eastern Shore, some prior to 1642. Capt. Peter Walker, wife Alice Traveller widow, a London merchant, whose father was Andrew Walker, Citizen and Tallow Chandler of London, owned several properties. There is also another Captain - James Walker - who also owned a plantation.

There are other Walkers mentioned, several of the name John with different middle initials, Daniel, Thomas, William, Joseph, Henry, and Andrew. They seem to be related since they sold property to each other at times. Capt. James Walker's wife was Sally. William Banfield Walker's wife was Sarah Taylor. His son Hugh's wife was Ann Bryan.

There is a Joseph Walker here who may be the ancestor of the Joseph Walker who came to California in 1833. A Joseph Walker bought a tract of land in Accomac in 1721. In 1736 he sold it to Joseph Walker, Jr. (wife Grace) who then sold the home place to Thomas Riley in 1757. There seems to be no further mention of this Joseph Walker in Accomac and he could have disposed of his property to take land from Dr. Thomas Walker's Loyal Land Company.

The Loyal Land Company of 1751 had 800,000 acres, parts of which were in noncontiguous parcels in southwest Virginia and northern Tennessee.

The ancestry of Dr. Thomas Walker of the Loyal Land Company follows:

A. Sir Thomas Walker represented Exeter in Parliament in the time of Charles I.

I. CAPT. THOMAS WALKER, born England 1625, came from Staffordshire to Virginia 1650. In 1665 returned to England and brought 45 settlers to Gloucester County, Virginia, the first settlement in that County. Member of Assembly 1663-1666. Issue:

II. COL. THOMAS WALKER, Rye Field (Walkerton), King and Queen County, Virginia, married Mary Peach Gilmer of Williamsburg at St. Clements. 12 children, among them:

(1) Mary Walker

(2) Dr. John Walker d. 9-23-1778. Married Eliz. Baylor of Essex County. (Their daughter Mary married Richard Everard Meade, my ancestors, of Virginia and Kentucky.)

(3) DR. THOMAS WALKER (1715-1794) married Mildred Thornton Meriwether (widow of Lewis Meriwether). Guardian of Thomas Jefferson at 14. Issue and marriages:

(a) Mary - Nicholas Lewis
 (b) John - Eliz. Moore dau. of Bernard Moore, ggson of Gov. Spotswood. Aide to Washington, resided Belvoir, home of Robt. Meriwether Walker 1817. Descendants still hold deed from Lord Dunmore 1772.
 (c) Susan - Henry Fry
 (d) Thomas - mar. (1) Margaret Hoops (2) Anne White, dau. Joseph White of Princess Anne County, Va. 12-26-1789. Capt. 9th Va. Reg. Died 1798 at Plantation Indian Fields.
 (e) Lucy - Dr. G. O. Gilber
 (f) Mildred - Joseph Harnsby of Shelby Co., Ky.
 (g) Sarah - Reuben Lindsay
 (h) Martha - George Divers of Farmingdale, designed by Thomas Jefferson, now a country club. Descended to his niece, Mrs. Isaac White.

(i) Reuben
 (j) Peachy - Joshua Fry
 (k) Francis - Jane Byrd, dau. Gen. Hugh Nelson. Col. 88 Reg. of Va. Succeeded to Castle Hill, Dr. Thomas Walker's home in Albemarle, Va. after his marriage to Mildred Meriwether. (This information from various sources in Los Angeles libraries.)

JOSEPH WALKER - from Joseph Reddeford Walker by Daniel Ellis Conner, U. of Oklahoma Press:

Born in Rowan County, eastern Tennessee on December 13, 1798. He moved with his family to the vicinity of Fort Osage on the Missouri frontier around 1818. Only two of the five Walker brothers, Joseph and Joel, lived out their natural lives. John died at the Alamo, Issac was killed in a battle with the Mormons, and Samuel failed to survive a plains crossing in 1849.

In 1820 Joseph Walker joined an American trading company in Santa Fe and in 1824 was one of the surveyors mapping the route through New Mexico which became the Santa Fe Trail.

In 1833 he organized a trip to California, traveling west through what is now western Arizona he entered the region well south of the Sierras, at Walker's Pass, east of Bakersfield. He at last reached the crest between the Tuolumne and Merced Rivers and was the first white man to see Yosemite Valley.

Walker visited Monterey, California in 1833, but the expedition remained near San Juan Bautista. One of the party, George Nidever remained there. Walker led his men out of California traversing Walker's Pass¹ for the first time.

After various adventures, Walker spent several years in Missouri with his relatives and returned to California in 1848 where he and a nephew, James T. Walker supplied beef to the mining camps.² He spent three years in the vicinity of John Gilroy's

ranch in California and later acquired a ranch there, but still led expeditions at 63. He died October 27, 1876 at the home of his nephew, James Walker and was buried at Alhambra, California. Another reference says that he died at the home of a nephew in Contra Costa County (Gilroy?).

WALKERS IN OREGON from *History Of Oregon*, Vol. 1, 1834-1848 by Hubert Howe Bancroft, San Francisco, The History Company, Publishers 1886, p. 240 et seq

JOEL P. WALKER (manuscript at Bancroft Library). This is a brother of JOSEPH WALKER the Trailblazer. Joel was born at Goochland County, Virginia 1797. Moved first to Tennessee, then to Missouri. At 17 he enlisted with Jackson to fight Indians in Alabama and in the Seminole War in Florida. In 1822 was with Stephen Cooper engaged in trade with the Mexicans in Santa Fe.

He first went to Oregon in 1840 with his wife and five children, and Herman Ehrenberg. (Ehrenberg then went on to Hawaii, then returned to Arizona and founded the town of Ehrenberg in Yuma County locating silver and gold mines.) Joel's manuscript says little of Oregon except that his daughter Louisa was born at Salem January 14, 1841. Joel with his wife, a sister, three sons and two daughters arrived in California with Emmons and Wilkes' expedition on an overland exploring tour of California in 1841 with a company of 18 settlers and officers.

Joel returned to Oregon from California with a large herd of cattle and remained there several years. He was made a judge of Yamhill County, Oregon and then returned to California and settled in Sonoma County, California.

There is another Walker who took a party to Baja California and hoped to claim Baja for the United States.

Notes - ¹George Nidever is included in the 1852 census of Santa Barbara County as Neidever George, born Tennessee, prior residence Arkansas, age 48, occupation Ranchero (see *Ancestors West*, Vol. III, No. 1, p. 3) wife Maria 40 and five children (ages 11 months - 10). See also *The Life and Adventures of George Nidever* (1802-1883). The life story of a remarkable California pioneer told in his own words and none wasted. Acting no payment down he turned over the firm's name and goodwill to two "poor but honest" brothers, John J. and B. Frank Harville from San Francisco. His only stipulation was that as the stock on hand was sold he was to be paid the wholesale price he had invested in the items. Note that no street address was then needed on the letterheads.

Within a decade the boys had fulfilled their obligation, liquidated the business and bought the managing partnership in the wholesale grocery business of HUGS, EARLY AND HARVILLE in San Francisco.

HOW DO YOU SPELL YOUR NAME?

Persis Heberd

Many years ago when I first met the name "Heberd", I remember thinking, "He must be mistaken. He must mean Hubbard. Everyone knows 'Old Mother Hubbard', but 'Heberd'!" Then I married the man who went with the name and was soon assuring others that it was spelled HEBBERD.

While living in New York City, I met many of the clan. We also met people named Hibbard. My husband, Wallace, was sure they were not related. He told me that his immigrant ancestor was asked to come to this country as a needed craftsman. One day in California I looked at the Hibbard line in my Stearns' Genealogical and Family History of the State of New Hampshire. There was the immigrant, Robert Hibbard in Salem.

"Wallace, what did you tell me your immigrant ancestor did?"

"He was a saltmaker and a brickmaker. In those early days the settlers were having a hard time getting salt."

"Ezra Stearns gives a Robert Hibbard, who was an emigrant from England to Salem, Massachusetts. He was a saltmaker. Could he possibly be your ancestor?"

I borrowed from a library in Boston a history of early Salem. There he was - Robert Hibbard. On a single page there were ten variant spellings of the name. There was interesting data. One line went gradually up through Vermont, then south into New Hampshire. That trail ended with a judge in Laconia. But I did not find a line headed toward New York. Several years later I learned that the New England Historic Genealogical Library had a Hibbard genealogy and promptly sent for it.

Robert Hibbard was the immigrant. His wife, Joan, was mentioned and the children were listed. The name Robert was handed down several generations.

This time I found a branch of the family which over the years migrated down across Massachusetts into Connecticut, then on into New York.

The name underwent many changes as it travelled to different areas, north, south, west. Then at the end of the trail was William Wallace Heberd and his sons, one of whom was Charles Edgar, my husband's father.

In all the many variations of the name, it has never been "Hubbard". That is a different family.

Yesterday my husband's friend, John Kiernan, told him: "People have trouble spelling your name. Why don't you change it?"

PROSPECTUS.

This is the first paper ever published in California, and though issued upon a small sheet, is intended it shall contain matter that will be read with interest. The principles which will govern us in conducting it, can be set forth in a few words.

We shall maintain an entire and utter severance of all political connection with Mexico. We renounce at once forever all fealty to her laws, all obedience to her mandates, we shall advocate an abolition of all past political offenses and allow every man the privilege of entering this new era of events unembarrassed by any past he may have taken in previous revolutions.

We shall maintain freedom of speech and the press, and those great principles of religious toleration, which allow every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience.

We shall advocate such a system of public instruction as will bring the means of a good practical education to every child in California.

We shall urge the immediate establishment of a well-organized government and a universal obedience to its laws. We shall encourage immigration, and take special pains to point out to agricultural immigrants those sections of uncultivated lands, where the fertility of the soil will most amply repay the labors of the husbandmen.

We shall encourage domestic manufactures and the mechanic arts as sources of private wealth, individual comfort and indispensable to the public prosperity.

We shall urge the organization of interior defenses sufficient to protect the property of citizens from the depredations of the wild Indians.

We shall advocate a territorial relation of California to the United States, till the number of her inhabitants is such that she can be admitted a member of that glorious confederacy.

We shall support the present measures of the commander-in-chief of the American squadron on our coast, so far as they conduce to the public tranquility, the organization of a free representative government and our alliance with the United States.

We shall advocate the lowest rate of duties on foreign imports, and favor an exemption of the necessities of life, even from these duties.

We shall go for California—for all her interests, social and religious—encouraging every thing that promotes these, resisting every thing that can do them harm.

This press shall be free and independent; unswayed by power and untrammelled by party. The use of its columns shall be denied to none, who have suggestions to make, promotive of the public weal.

We shall by before our readers the freshest domestic intelligence and the earliest foreign news.

We announce our publication upon a very small sheet but its dimensions shall be enlarged as soon as the requisite material can be obtained.

FAITH THE UNITED STATES AND MEXICO.

The U. S. stop of war, Warren, Capt. Hull, arrived on Wednesday 12th, brings us the act of Congress and the proclamation of the President, declaring Mexico and U. S. at war. We give them below.

Act of Congress, approved May 15th 1914.

Sec. 1. In consideration, that by an act of the Republic of Mexico, there exists a state of war, between that govern-

ment and that of the U. States. It is resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Congress assembled, that with a view to provide the government of the U. States with the means of procuring for said war a speedy and favorable termination. The President be authorized, as he is by these presents to employ the military and naval forces of the U. States, and to require and accept the services of any number of volunteers not exceeding 50,000 men who may offer, both Cavalry, Artillery and Riflemen, to serve 12 months from the time they shall have arrived at the place designated, or until the termination of the war, unless sooner discharged; according to the time for which they may have enlisted; and the sum of 10,000,000 of dollars of money at present in the Treasury or such as may be hereafter received, not already appropriated for other objects, be appropriated as, it is by these presents to carry into effect the provisions of this Act.

Sec. 2. And it is further enacted, that the Militia, when called into the service of the United States, in virtue of the present Act, or any other, may, if in the opinion of the President (the exigencies of the public service require it,) be compelled to serve for a period not exceeding six months in any one year from the date of their arrival at the appointed place, unless sooner discharged.

Sections 3, 4, 5, 6 & 7. That of the organization of the volunteers into Companies, Battalions and Regiments, and of chosen officers, and other circumstances relative to their equipment and subjection to the military code of Laws.

Sec. 8. And it is further enacted, that the President of the United States, he, or he is by these presents, authorized to employ immediately, all the National ships already authorized by law; to purchase or hire, arm, equip and man such merchant ships and steamers, as may be found upon examination, fit for being converted into armed vessels proper for the National service, and in sufficient number for the protection of the coast, and for the general defence of the Country.

Section 9. Arranges that the militia and volunteers shall receive the same pay as the regular army when in actual service.

In pursuance of the above Bill, the President, under date of the 13th May has issued the following

PROCLAMATION:

In consideration that the Congress of the U. States, by virtue of the authority with which it is clothed, has declared by the law of to-day, that through an act of the Republic of Mexico, there exists a state of war between that government and the U. States, therefore I, James K. Polk, President of the U. States by these presents do proclaim the same, and I especially recommend to all persons who hold civil or military employment under the government of the U. S. that they be vigilant and zealous in the discharge of their respective duties. Moreover, I exhort the entire people of the U. S. by their love of country and a sense of the injuries which have obliged them to appeal to the last resort of nations, (and in as much as it consults the means most opportune to abbreviate the calamities) that they would exert themselves to maintain order, to promote re-union, to sustain the authority and efficiency of the laws and to give aid and force to all the measures which may be adopted by the constitutional authorities to obtain an early, just and honorable peace.

In testimony of which, I have placed my hand, and have caused the seal of the United States to be affixed to these presents.

JAMES K. POLK, President U.S.

CALIFORNIA'S FIRST NEWSPAPER

The first newspaper printed in California, called "The Californian", appeared in 1846 in Monterey. It was published by Rev. Walter Colton, who had been an editor, and Dr. Robert Semple, a printer. It consisted of a single sheet, half in English and half in Spanish. It was a weekly with a five dollar a year subscription. It was established in troubled times "to conciliate the natives and unite the foreigners residing in California".

The paper was printed with the help of a wooden, hand operated Ranage press, which had been carried from Mexico City to Monterey by mule. A former Mexican army officer, Augustin Vicente Zamorano, had brought it in 1834 and established California's first printing press in Monterey.

The old press had seen better days by 1846. The new publishers had no rules, no leads and badly worn type. A jackknife was used to cut rules and leads from a sheet of tin. Paper meant for cigarette wrappings on the Pacific Coast was used for printing the new paper.

On May 22, 1847, Semple moved "The Californian" and its old press to San Francisco to compete with the weekly, "California Star", established by Samuel Brannan, a Mormon pioneer.

Both papers missed the biggest news story in the history of the state when they failed to headline the discovery of gold at Coloma. A few weeks later, writers and printers, as well as readers, left for the gold country and the two newspapers were stranded. "The Californian" suspended publication 29 May 1848.

In December, 1848, E. C. Kemble, editor of the "California Star" bought "The Californian" and began publishing "The Star and Californian", which later was named "The Alta Californian". This became one of California's leading newspapers. Bret Harte became editor and Mark Twain was one of its contributors.

THEY CAME TO SANTA BARBARA

ROBERT BRENT ORD born 1827, Washington, D. C., son of James Ord from England. Was an Indian agent in Sault St. Marie, Mich. Married Rebecca Ruth Cresap, of an old Maryland family. Of seven sons and one daughter, one son, Dr. James J. Ord was a practicing physician in Santa Barbara for 40 years. A brother, Judge Robert Ord, in 1849 came to California via the Panama Canal. In Santa Barbara he bought the two blocks of land between De la Fina and Castillo and Canon Perdido and De la Guerra Streets. As police judge and justice of the peace, he was known as Judge Ord. He died in 1889.

J. W. TAGGART born Parkersburg, W. Va., of the Scottish clan McTaggart, he was admitted (James William) to the bar in 1880 and settled in Santa Barbara in 1882, where he became a partner of Judge E. B. Hall. Married Katherine Payne of Pennsylvania.

FERDINAND NIEMANN born Germany 1853, crossed the ocean and came to California by way of Texas, where he began taking cement orders. In Santa Barbara he built the foundation of the United Electric Co's. power plant, besides fulfilling many Los Angeles contracts.

HON. P. J. BARBER His family history dates back to 1635 (Peter J.) when Thomas Barber, born in England, crossed the Atlantic and settled in Connecticut. His mother was PERCY MERRILL, born Hartford, Conn. in 1781, whose family settled in Mass. in 1634. The Barber family migrated to Ohio. In 1852, P.J. Barber got California gold fever and made his way to Panama where 9000 people were waiting for boats to take them to California. He got passage on the "Clarrissa Andrews" called "the floating coffin." Many died on the trip of thirst and starvation. The trip took 65 days. He worked in San Francisco as a carpenter, then studied architecture, finally working on plans for the State Capitol. In 1869 the Barbers moved to Santa Barbara, where he was mayor, then postmaster, and member of the Board of Health. He was architect for the court house, Santa Barbara College, the Arlington Hotel, Pres-

byterian Church, First National Bank, the Dibblee mansion, Cottage Hospital, Santa Barbara Public Library, and many large residences.

BUELL, A. W. of English descent. His family first settled in Plymouth and later in Connecticut. He was son of Lynos Buell and Hannah Olin. He came west by rail to St. Louis, by steamer to Rooneville, by stage to Versailles, and by ox-cart to Westport, Missouri. He then worked his way to California by driving cattle, horses and sheep, arriving in 1857. In 1867, he and his brother engaged in dairy and stock raising in Santa Barbara. His home was on 2 1/2 blocks between Milpas and Montecito Streets. He married Mary Carter of Vermont in 1868.

HON. WILLIAM SCOTT DAY Judge of the Superior Court for Santa Barbara County, born 1848 in Tennessee to Henry D. Day and Martha Kearley. The family moved to Illinois where he went to school and served in the State Senate. He came to Santa Barbara in 1888 and practiced law. He married Helen A. Frick, whose family came from Germany to North Carolina.

E. A. RIZOR born 1868 Columbus, Ohio, of French and German descent, to J. S. Rizor and Mable Trindle. In 1891 he came to Santa Barbara, studied law, and was admitted to the bar, in 1894.

BOOK REVIEW

Michigan. Historical Collections. (1892)

Collections and Researches made by the Michigan Pioneer and Historical Society. Lansing, Michigan, Reprint 1912-1913. 775 p. Index.

The Table of Contents indicates this book is the Minutes of the Annual Meeting, 1892, but the scope is far reaching. Twenty-eight counties recorded individual reports of their areas, and each report is remarkably rich in details of life at that time, and filled with biographical material.

There are tales of specific areas, stories of Pere Marquette, Missionary explorer, and armed struggles. The Patriot War of 1837-8 on the Canadian frontier is discussed, with details of specific battles and biographies of many who were involved. The Battle of Prescott in 1838 is described. Twenty-seven pages are given to "Pontiac, or the siege of Detroit", a reprint of an article first published in Harper's Magazine in 1861. A section "Early Commerce of the Upper Lakes", includes a record of early shipping and lists vessels in use in the early 1800's, with the name of the owner.

While not intended directly for genealogists, this book is a treasure of information for searchers of Michigan families, and the comprehensive index makes available information on thousands of individuals.

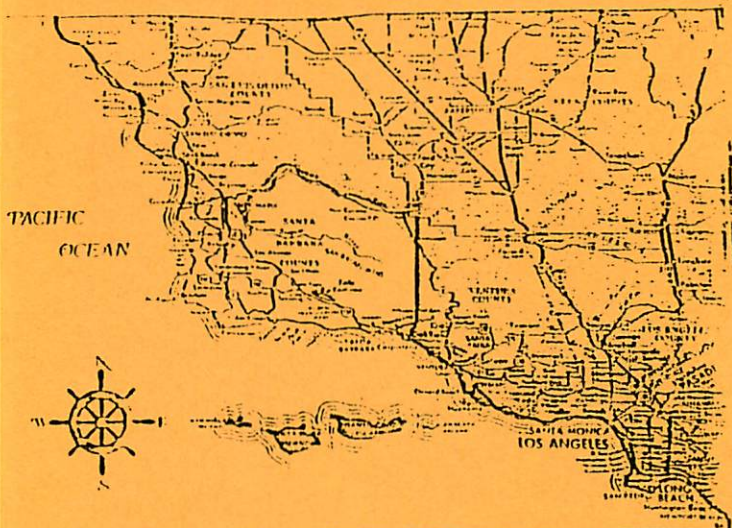
