EMILY PERRY THIES PROFILE, President

EMILY PERRY THIES, the older of two children, was born to Arthur and Janette Curtiss Perry on a farm in Hillsdale County, Michigan. When she was three the family moved to Hartford where the parents operated a grocery store until her father's failing health prompted a move to East Lansing so she could enter Michigan Agricultural College (now MSU). Five days after graduation from the School of Home Economics as a major in Nutrition she married Wilbur H. Thies of Traverse City whom she had met as a freshman as her instructor in The year before marriage Bill had taken a position as Ex-Physics. tension Horticulturist at Massachusetts Agricultural College in Amherst. Within five years they were the parents of three sons, all of whom are married and have presented Emily and Bill Thies with seven granddaughters and two grandsons.

Home, family and community activities occupied Emily until WW II when she was asked to help out in the recently opened Laboratory Nursery School at Massachusetts State College (now University of The professor teaching Child Development, using the Massachusetts). lab, had been an acquaintance in college and knew that Emily had spent a term as an undergraduate at Merrill Palmer Institute in De-After a brief time "on the job" Emily knew she would like troit. to continue but felt the need for more training. To that end she attended summer sessions at Cornell University for five years to earn her M.A. in Child Development and Family Relationships. remained at the University for fifteen years as Director of the Nur-sery School and teacher of Child Development to University junior and senior students.

She retired to join Bill overseas when he was serving as Consultant in Horticulture for the Food and Agriculture Organization of the He served in Yugoslavia and Syria, a total of United Nations. These overseas assignments initiated the more than five years. Thies into travel, which they continued to enjoy and which has included a nine-month trip around the world during which they visited twenty four countries.

Three of these trips involved genealogical research in England. For some years Emily was a member of the Society of Genealogists in

London and engaged in research in its collections.

In 1972 they sold the home in Amherst, Massachusetts, which they had built thirty five years earlier and came to Santa Barbara to be near the oldest son and family. It was about a week after arrival, before they had found a place to live, that Emily attended the first meeting of the group that became the Santa Barbara County Gene-alogical Society. She had been searching ancestors for several years so brought some experience and library materials to the group.

Other interests in Santa Barbara have included active membership in the First Congregational Church, classes at the Botanic Garden and serving as a volunteer at the Garden Guild Shop, working in the office of the local United Nations Chapter, and as a member of the

O.K. Chapter of PEO.

LILIAN MANN FISH, Director and Editor of ANCESTORS WEST Born Mothuen, Massachusetts, a town separated in 1726 from Haverhill, in many respects resembling Montecito; raised in the adjoining town of Pelham, New Hampshire, 36 miles north of Boston, where her mother's Hobbs family had lived for generations since the Reverend James Hobbs (Harvard 1748) married Elizabeth Batchelder, descendant of the Reverend Stephen Bachilor, who came to New England with three grandsons at age 73, remained over 20 years, and then returned to England and died near London in his 100th year in 1660. Lilian came to Santa Barbara in 1949 and for over 22 years was an associate attorney in the oldest law firm in the city, having had the privilege of being associated with Mr. Francis Price, Sr. in many interesting matters, including the contract for reconstruction of the Old Mission quadrangle, a license for use of Mission rooms by the Santa Barbara Historical Society (which went to the Curia in Rome for approval), the Max Flaischmann estate which donated funds for the Mission many other civic enterprises, the William Zimdin estate with widespread interests in California and abroad, (The William Zimdin Foundation was the predecessor of Direct Relief Foundation which has given services and medical supplies in the millions for relief of stricken areas), working with the Attorney General's office in San Francisco on the appeal of the Ivanhoe cases from San Joaquin Valley involving the 160-acre limitation on use of water from federal reclamation projects, the Biltmore Hotel zoning appeal, the San Ysidro Ranch case. Lilian received her law degree (J. D. magna cum laude) from Southwestern University in Los Angeles, attending night sessions while working in the office of the City Prosecutor and in a local law office, specializing in admiralty and farm and corporate bankruptcy matters. In 1970 she had the privilege of being a member of a D.A.R. sponsored trip to England, Scotland and Wales. Some research was done at the Society of Genealogists in London and she still maintains membership in that society and corresponds with several members of the DAR group. Offices held include President National Business and Professional Women, Los Angeles; Women Lawyers' Club, Los Angeles; Santa Barbara Trust for Historic Preservation; Vice-President, Young Republicans, Los Angeles; Secretary, Santa Barbara Historical Society for a number of years and presently member of the Board and Library Committee chair. A member of Phi Delta Delta, Alpha Chapter USC, and Los Angeles Alumnae and Santa Barbara-Ventura Chapter, which hosted the International Convention at the Miramar during her term as president. She also has a green thumb, perhaps from the diluted gones of Burpee and Burbank ancestors. Another interest is designing and constructing clothing. Raising fruit, figs, loguats, peaches, plums, apricots, grapes, eugenia berries, lemons is a pleasure. Her first earned money was from picking strawberries for her father, later high-bush blueberries, and helping her mother make evergreen wreathes for Memorial Day decorating of Revolutionary and Civil War soldiers and helping Grandfather Hobbs place flags on veterans' graves in a number of cemeteries in Pelham. At age 73 Rev. Stephen Bachiler came to New England with 3 grandsons John and William Sanborn and Nathaniel Batchelder (spelling Bachiler, Bachilor, Batchelder). After 20 years he returned to England with grandson Stephen Sanborn and died at Hackney, Middlesex, near London, in his 100th year.

Wintringham-Kitchin Update

Recently, we were delighted to hear from a friend overseas. Beryl Crawley, Secretary, Hertfordshire Family and Population History Society, 189 Handside Lane, Welwyn Garden City, Herts ALS 6TE, England, sent new information about the Quaker marriage and family record which appeared in our September 1980 issue, pages 95 and 96.

It seems that the two placenames on the first line of the document should be corrected to Newton Holmpton, and Neldornols Holdernoss. Holdernoss is the flat and fertile district of the E riding....between the North Sea and the estuary of the Humber, and Holmpton is less than five miles north of Essington. In checking available records, Ms. Crawley found a marriage recorded in 1773 for John Wintringham of Holpton in Holderness, son of Robert of the same place, weaver—probably a child of the 1743 marriage.

Harry Titus

The above title simply means "family tree" in Spanish which, based upon the way I envisage genealogy and the way persons and places relating to the Spanish connotation have aided me, I feel the name to be quite appropriate.

My genealogical tree, like everyone's, was quite barren of leaves (ancestors) when I began and I knew that one small leaf (myself) would not be sufficient to keep the tree alive. It had to have water to nourish it and bring forth the foliage and there is only one way a genealogical tree can get water: research.

That's where the Spanish influence comes in. Until my aunt's death, I was not interested in genealogy but with her demise I felt duty-bound to continue what she had started. Since the most information she had was

on a Spanish ancestor, I started with him.

What a lucky beginning! Not only did I learn of a cousin who had the same ancestor, which happened to be on the Titus side. He was also related to the Barnetts, my mother's line. In fact, this was most fortuitus since I knew nothing of my mother's ancestors and this new-found cousin not only supplied me with hitherto unknown facts about the Barnetts and related lines, he introduced me to cousins who, up until then, were not only nameless; they were non-existent. Now, he and they are not just genealogical friends; all are close, personal friends.

With the information given me by my cousin and that I had received from my aunt, I was well on my way to getting my tree growing, providing I could get it into the proper perspective: facts recorded. I knew I needed help and what better place to get genealogical help than from mem-

bers of a genealogical society.

That's why I joined the Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society; an organization formed in a town founded by Spaniards; one which is dedicated to recording the demographics of Santa Barbara and its environs; and

a society which wishes to preserve this area's Spanish heritage.

Once I was given the proper tools to cultivate my tree, I "dug"into the books and pamphlets in the Society's library from which I gathered much valuable information. Of course, it was only a beginning, but it gave me the "water" to start my tree blossoming, a feat which continues; sometimes not as rapdily as I'd like, but when my spirits are down, a fellow member's own success prods me to keep searching, just as he did 'cause it's there - some place, that missing link, be it name, date or place.

Possibly I have led the reader to believe that it has been sheer luck and not hard work that has made me successful. Well, both have played a part, with the latter a major factor. However, Lady Luck was there too in the fact that the Titus name is well-recorded from England to the present and with the clues provided, I have added considerable in the way of leaves to the branches of my tree. Unfortunately, some have only a solitary leaf.

As stated above, there is much written regarding various members of the Titus family but, except for a few publications limited to a single line, there is no all-encompassing book or pamphlet. Therefore, I was going to solve that problem and put out a quarterly listing every Titus I could find. In addition, I was going to establish a new method of re-

cording genealogical data.

On toth counts, I succeeded with the quarterly, "THE TITUS TRAIL," an appropriate title, I thought. From the response given by readers, the program was a much-needed venture. For me, it was an adventure, but as adventures go it become time-consuming, expensive and was not fulfilling one of my purposes: locating collateral ancestors. Consequently, I am shelving the project until I can grow some more leaves.

In the above paragraph I spoke of the project being time-consuming and expensive as well as not providing the wanted information. Does that sound familiar? I'll bet it does, because I know of the hours, boresome, fruitless hours spent by all of us in our searches and of the money expended on leads that lead nowhere. I call this, an on "", "the agony of defeat."

I also know the joy derived when a "missing" ancestor is found; the discovery of a date that will "prove" the connection desired and the satisfaction of watching my tree grow. That's the "thrill of victory."

I have stressed the satisfaction in achieving my goals but I have gotten as much out of helping others as I have had from my own personal

accomplishments. That is one of the reasons I am so dedicated to the Society. That is why I have donated my genealogical holdings to it so

that others may be helped in getting their trees growing.

Fortunately, I am not the only one who has done this. Countless others have as well, but some have not and they are the ones I am imploring to donate something; if not a total library, at least a book, a pamphlet, a subscription to a quarterly not now received and copies of pedigree and family group sheets. Those last two are the bare minimum and can contribute so much.

If members, as well as readers in other cities would give, then the Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society could be the well from which thousands could draw the water which would make the foliage on

many an "Afbol Genealógico."

SANTA BARBARA AS AN AMERICAN CITY

As an American city Santa Barbara began its legal existence on April 9, 1850, incorporated by an act of the first California legislature five months before there actually was any State of California in the American Union, and during that tense season when Congress wrangled over its des-

tiny before Admission Day dawned on September 9, 1850.

The news of its new status traveled slowly to Santa Barbara and in that leisurely time there was no rush to institute the new American scheme. The old Ayuntamiento (municipal government) had served well enough the needs of old Santa Barbara, so with one thing and another, the new city government did not begin to function until August 26,1850, when the first Common Council convened. Election of this august body presumably had taken place in the meantime, and Francisco de la Guerra had been chosen as the first Mayor. At the final meeting of Santa Barbara's Ayuntamiento had sat in dignified convocation Don Joaquin de la Guerra, the last Alcalde (Mayor), with Don Estéban Ortega and Don Juan Ayala as his Regidores (aldermen or councilmen), Don Anastásio Carrillo as the Sedor Síndico, or treasurer, and Don Joaquin Carrillo, El Sedor Prefecto del Distrito (district prefect), presiding over their deliberations.

Civil government had been achieved for the hitherto military presidio of Santa Barbara back in December, 1826, after republican Mexico had succeeded monarchical Spain. By order of Governor Echeandia, its first Ayuntamiento Ylustre was elected. It was a dignified, but not very active body. In those halcyon pastoral days, before the birth of "civic consciousness," office seeking was at a minimum, and after one had an office there was little to do with it.

In the newly incorporated city of 1850 there was everything to do. With American occupation of California the ancient Hispanic institutions fell off the country like rusted, broken armor. Deprived of its accustomed protection, Old California stood shivering and bewildered in a new world. Eleven days after incorporating the town of Santa Barbara, the California State Legislature passed an act repealing every Spanish law but one. That provided for the <u>Juez de Campo</u> - Judge of the Plains, essential to the ranchos, but leaving the venerable municipalities without a straw of custom to which to cling. Before the new City Clerk lay a clean book without a mark in it beyond the handwritten title, - "Acts of the Common Council of the City of Santa Barbara." Before the Council lay the task of filling that book from the first page with acts of wisdom and discretion.

The scheduled visit of the King and Queen of Spain on February 11,1981 has been postponed, due to resignation of the Prime Minister. As a part of the Bicentennial Celebration officially to start April 21, 1981 and continue until April 21, 1982, plans had been made for the unveiling by Miss Frederica Dibblee Poett, a de la Guerra descendant, of a statue of King Carlos III in De la Guerra Plaza, a gift of Spain to the City. The making of arrangements for the visit to Los Angeles for its Bicentennial and to Santa Barbara was a long process. Early in the year Miguel de la Quadra Salcedo came from Spain with a television crew to make a documentary film in connection with the forthcoming celebrations, Spending some time in Santa Barbara.

The main sources of information are found in two cities -Columbia and Charleston.

Some 300 years of documents from 1670 on are to be found in Columbia at the South Carolina Archives. Everything relating to the government of South Carolina, compiled from each county, with the exception of records destroyed by fire or other calamity, is to be found there. Indices to this material is to be found in the Search Room. There are Records of the Register and the Secretary of the Province, containing miscellaneous material, some originals, some copies, all pertaining to the time of the Lords Proprietors. For the Royal Period there are Legislative records, Treasury records, plats of surveys and land grants and many other documents. For the Revolutionary period there are some 10,000 folders, containing about 15,000 Revolutionary accounts of services rendered, supplies furnished, money loaned. These are used frequently to establish eligibility for membership in patriotic societies. There also is the most complete set of records to be found on Confederate service from South Carolina. In the Search Room there are also old wills, deeds, marriage contracts, census records, and maps, many listed by county. There also is a book containing a list of Loyalist claims and a collection of British Headquarters papers kept by the British commander-in-chief with some 10,000 documents on microfilm.

In Columbia another main source of information is the South Caroliniana Library located on the campus of the University of South Carolina, containing genealogical material not of governmental nature. In the Book Division of the Library is an Index to the early volumes of the S. C. Historical and Genealogical Magazine (1900-1960). Later volumes are self-indexed. Also newspaper files, county and district histories, church histories, parish registers, marriage registers, and registers of birth. In Vol. VII of the Magazine is a list of soldiers from South Carolina given Bounty Land Grants in lieu of money for their services in the Revo-

lutionary War.

In the Manuscript Division of the Library are South Carolina portions of the Draper Collection. The complete Draper Collection is on microfilm at Winthrop College in Rock Hill, S. C. The Manuscript Division also contains personal, business, and institutional papers, including church records, epitaph books with copies of gravestone inscriptions from many town and county cemeteries, unpublished genealogies, family Bible records, genealogical charts, and many private papers donated by prominent South Carolinians. For many other church and cemetery records it will be necessary to go to local sources.

In Charleston, the chief sources of historical information are to be found in the holdings of the Charleston Library Society, the Huguenot Society and the South Carolina Historical Society. The latter has many fine old maps, books and documents in collections of private papers and family genealogies. Family locations may be found on early maps.

Other records of a Federal, as opposed to State, nature will be found at the National Archives in Washington, D. C.

Many helpful suggestions are to be found in the pamphlet "BUNTING YOUR ANCESTORS IN SOUTH CAROLINA", A Guide for Amateur Genealogists, published in 1970 by the South Carolina Tricentennial Commission. A list of fifty published references is supplied in the Appendix. There is also is a ten-page discussion of problems confronting the genealogist. In South Carolina public vital records date from 1911 for marriages and from 1915 for births and deaths. As to changed state and county lines it is stated this situation is found many times, particularly as regards counties, districts, and parishes, so that it is necessary to know the locality and its history thoroughly when searching historic records, and that the Department of Archives in Columbia has these changes well documented in mimeograph form. Reference is also made to A. S. Salley's, Narratives of Early Carolina.

The Atlanta Federal Archives and Records Center, 1557 St. Joseph Ave., East Point, GA 30344 has records for Alabama, Georgia, Florida. Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee.

At the time of the Revolutionary War, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia all claimed territory extending to the MississippiRiver.

GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH - NORTH CAROLINA State 1789 (12th State in the USA)

Capital - RALEIGH

The first permanent settlement was established in 1653 when groups of settlers came south from Virginia to occupy the section north of the Albermarle Sound, The influx of new settlers was so limited that in an 80-year period the population had increased only to about 14,000. During the years 1691 until 1711, the province was called North Carolina but was administered by deputy governors from South Carolina.

In the 1760's many Germans, about 15000, settled in ;orsyth and Guilford Counties. A colony of English Quakers from airginia, Pennsylvania and Nantucket, Massachusetts settled in Rockingham, Guilford and Chatham Counties. Disliking slavery, they later moved to Ohio and Indiana in the 1830's. Some did remain in North Carolina.

For several years before the Revolution, Highland Scotch immigrants were arriving in North Carolina, most of them settling in the southern section. In a few years there were some 20,000. During this period, many Scotch-Irish came from Pennsylvania, down the Shenandoah Valley to settle in Virginia and many continued into North Carolina. Many of these settlers were Protestant, having been banished from Scotland because of their religion, transplanted into northern Ireland, and then to america. These people settled in the western part of the State in Iredell County.

Before the Revolution, the Church of England was in control in North Carolina as in virginia. Only the ordained ministers of that church were permitted to perform marriage ceremonies. Those who wished to marry could have their banns published or announced from the pulpit or they could buy a license. Those married by license had to furnish a fifty-pound bond.

The old marriage bonds, many of which are still in the county court houses, are full of genealogical information. In the parish registers kept by the priests were records of births, deaths and marriages. Some of the old parish records are in the office of the State Historical Commission, though some are still in the offices of the County Clerk or the County Register of Deeds.

The North Carolina Dept. of History and Archives, Division of the State Library, 109 East Jones St., Raleigh, NC 27611 has microfilm copies of most of the county records of North Carolina.



GEORGIA

GEORGIA RESEARCH

State 1788 4th State, Capital, Atlanta

From 1540 until early 1700, England and Spain maneuvered for dominance of Georgia. When South Carolina became an English royal province in 1732, the land between the Savannah and St. Mary's rivers was set aside for a new British colony. In England at that time it was the practice to imprison individuals unable to pay their debts. This irked a humanitarian army officer and member of Parliament, James Oglethorpe, who conceived the idea of rehabilitating these poor people by taking them to the New World, giving them tracts of land and assisting and guiding them in establishing homes. He induced King George II to grant to him and twenty other men the English territory south of the Savannah. With 35 families he arrived there in 1733 and established a community at the mouth of the Savannah, named after the river. Halfway between the mouth of that river and the southern border of South Carolina Augusta was established in 1734. In the meantime persecuted Protestants in Europe had been invited to come to the colony. At first Roman Catholics were proscribed. About 1738 Swiss, German, Italian, Scottish Highlanders, Salzburger and Moravian settlers had arrived in Georgia. Two years later Georgia was divided into two counties - north of the Altamaha was Savannah and south of the river Frederica. Many Moravians came from North Caroline to Spring Place and New Echota. Unsuccessful in converting the Indians to their faith, the Moravians later moved from Georgia to Bethlehem and Nazareth, Pennsylvania. Many of the Scottish Highlanders settled in Darien, which they renamed New Inverness. In 1752 a group of Massachusetts Puritans came to Midway. Georgia became a royal province in 1732. The colony claimed all of the land between North Carolina and Florida, and the Atlantic Ocean and the Mississippi River. After the Revolution, conflict between Georgia and the federal government over states' rights led to passage of the 11th Amendment in 1798. Further confusion arose when the legislature fraudulent sold state lands to speculators. Although George set its present boundaries in 1802, Indian claims to much of its territory persisted for years. Today Georgia has 159 counties.

In 1798 the Territory of Mississippi was created from the western

half of Georgia. Later that territory was divided into the states of

Alabama and Mississippi.

Many settlers in Virginia and the carolinas were attracted to Georgia by the early land lotteries. Familes who had lived in the area for at least one year were permitted to draw for acreages as large as 400 acres. The participant lists are now in the office of the Secrey of State. Lotteries were held in 1803, 1806, 1819, 1827 and 1832. Birth and death records since January 1, 1919 are on file in the tary of State.

Division of Vital Statistics, State dept. of Public Health, 1 Hunter St. S. W., Atlanta, Georgia 30303. Atlanta and Savannah city health offices have similar records of earlier dates. The county clerk of the clerk of the Ordinary Court have records of marriages performed in the county. Divorce records are kept by the Superior Court clerk in the county where granted. They also have Civil Court records. Naturalization records are on file in the office of the Superior Court in the county where hearing was held. Such records are also in the office of the clerk of the federal district courts in Atlanta and Savannah. Deeds to lands are recorded in the office of the Court of Ordinary where land is located. For a fee abstracts of land grants are obtainable from the Secretary of State. Wills are recorded in the office of the clerk of the Court of Ordinary in the county where the testator resided.

SBCGS LIBRARY AIDS

There are three guides to the library holdings:

- 1. The book catalog is an alphabetical list of all books contained in the library. Books are listed by a card for author, a card for title and one or more cards for subject matter. The latter may indicate location, surnames, war records and general references. The heading "Family History" is a listing of the surnames for which the library has individual genealogies and includes papers in the surname file as well as books on the shelves.
- 2. "Periodicals in the Library" is a record of the genealogical publications in the library, which are listed by state. Canada and England are also represented. The periodicals are arranged on the shelves alphabe tically by state, with some exceptions. Small issues may be in individual boxes. The series "The Connecticut Nutmegger," "New England Historical Genealogical Register" and "Missouri Historical Review" are in the large corner cupboard. Australia and New Zealand are also represented.
- The Reference Files in cardboard boxes contain pamphlets and reference material that add significantly to the scope of the library resources. The surname file contains small books and pamphlets on individual families, newspaper clippings, and the SBCGS Members ancestral charts. The two boxes of subject file contain information on individual states, including some of the titles of books published about them, guides to state records and a wealth of miscellaneous materials.

SEARCHING FOR ANCESTRAL NAMES

An early task in genealogical research is to discover whether any information about a specific ancestor may have been published in books or articles. Some of the sources that may be of help are these: Dewey

Kind & respected Cir:


I see in the paper that a man names JOHN SIPES was attacted and et up by a bare came up and stoppet him by eating him in the mts. near your town.

If it is him you will know by his having six toes on his left foot. He also had the spread eagle tattoed on his front chest and an anker on his rite arm which you will know him by if the bare did not et up these sines of it being him.

BOOK REVIEWS

HOW TO TRACE YOUR MINNESOTA ANCESTORS, Robert B. Porter, Porter Publishing Co., P. O. Box 134, Center City, Minnesota 55012 51 pp. 18 x 22 cm. paperback, stapled. Available at \$3.49 per copy from Robert B. Porter at above address.

A copy has been received by the Librarian, SBCGS, from the author, with request for review. His letter states that the booklet is aimed at the beginner and written in simplistic rather than technical terms. The price seems to indicate a small edition. Therefore, it seems the kindest treatment by a reviewer is to point out instances where the product could be improved in future editions, indicating the features which are admirable and of help to even a seasoned researcher.

The chief deficiency to this reviewer appears to be a failure to stress the absolute necessity for a beginner to adopt a methodologyestablish a generally followed numbering system - starting with an individual, given the number 1, showing his or her male parent as 2 and female parent as 3, paternal grandparents as 4 (male) and 5(female), maternal grandparents as 6 (male) and 7 (female) and so on, doubling the number for each generation; the necessity for recording sources of data, making photocopies of printed matter wherever possible, copying the title page of the volume or at the very least endorsing on the back of the photocopy the date and place where copied title and publication information; enclosing SASE (Self-addressed stamped envelope) with any inquiry or request for information; in answering published queries, limit correspondence to the subject of the query and material offered - do not ask questions about names not included; in the text give names or titles of public officials and courts or offices where various records are available; include a map of Minnesota, showing present division into counties and a short history (such

as that included in the 6th ed. The Handy Book for Genealogists).

The author is to be commended for including the location of the 87 county seats (not so designated in the text) with Zip codes. However, a deficiency is the failure to indicate that inquiries are not to be addressed to the County itself, but for certain types of records must be addressed to the Clerk of the District or County Court of the area or, in the case of probate records and wills in Hennepin and Ramsey Counties, to the Probate Court. In all other counties, the probate court is a part of the county court. Deeds are recorded in the office of the county recorder, or registrar of titles if land is registered land, of the county where the land is situated. In Minnesota reports of births and deaths are filed with the local registrar; marriage reports with the clerk of the district court. Birth and death certificates are available from Minnesota Dept. of Health, 717 Delaware St., N.E., Minneapolis, Minnesota 55440. Fee for certified copy of birth, death and marriage certificates \$3 per copy (Martindale Hubbell Law Digest, 1981). The listing (pp. 17-39) of Historical Societies with addresses is a most valuable contribution as is the listing of Minnesota libraries (pp 39-42).

A rather unusual feature for this type of booklet is the illustration (pp.24-25) of township and section maps, with the numbering system used and also the positioning on a two-county map of certain townships, indicating the Range. Naming the Base Line would be of additional assistance in noting the description used in patents, deeds, etc.

Any one attempting to use this booklet as a guide should also have at hand at least some of the Resource Books listed on page 43.

Westin, Jeane Eddy, Finding Your Roots, Ballantine Books, New York 1977, is a handbook to be recommended.

A later edition of Searching for Your Ancestors, by Dr. Gilbert H. Doane and James B. Bell (Director/Librarian, New England Historic Genealogical Society, Boston) is available.



SANTA BARBARA COUNTY

One of California's 27 original counties. While the county was actually created in 1850, the history of the area dates back to 1542. In that year Juan Cabrillo discovered the Santa Barbara channel and later, according to legend, crossed to San Miguel Island, where he died and was buried. A second Spanish explorer, Sebastian Vizcaino, entered the channel on the Feast Day of Saint Barbara in 1602 and named the area accordingly. Father Junipero Serra founded the Santa Barbara mission in 1786. Santa Barbara Royal Presidio, established April 21,1782, was the last of four royal presidios in Alta California - San Diego, Monterey, San Francisco and Santa Barbara.

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
