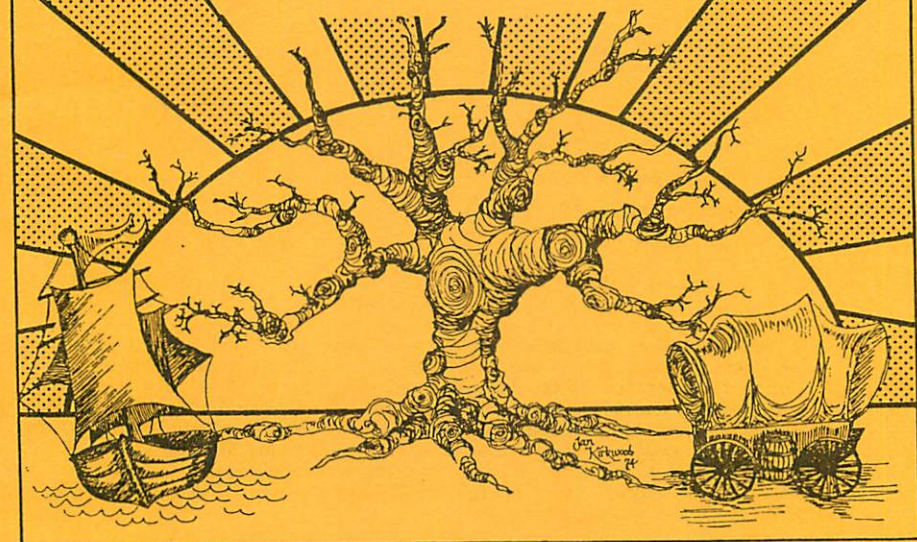

WELDEN -(van)Welde(n) - WELDON

Armand Vanwelde, editor, member of the "Service Central d'entr'aide pour la recherche genealogique et demographique de Belgique", has contributed to the Society Library a copy of a typed monograph, in French, 45 pages. His address is 3,rue J-B Denys, 1070 Anderlecht-Brussels, Belgium. He states he is engaged in doing genealogical research on the surname "WELDEN" and on all who have the surname Welden or Welde in their name, such as (von) Welden, (van) Welden, Vanwelde, Van Welde or De Welde, a family which originated in Welden, Swabia, Germany (Bavaria), situated about 24 km. from Augsburg, and also lived in Laupheim, south of Ulm (Wurttemberg), with branches later in Belgium, France and the United States. Surmising that WELDON, a spelling in the United States and Canada might be a variation or anglicized form of WELDEN, he inquires whether those names have the same meaning or are very different.

The monograph contains sections on Les Seigneurs de Welden, Les Chevaliers de WELDEN, Les (v) Welde(n) aux U. S. A. (pp 18-28), Les van Welde en Belgique, Les (van) Welde(n) en Belgique et ailleurs en Europe, with a Bibliography of Sources and documental proofs consulted (p. 45).

His letter led the editor of ANCESTORS WEST to inquire as to the origin of the Santa Barbara WELDON family, the fourth generation of which is now represented by contractor, Douglas Weldon. Phillips, History of Santa Barbara County, Vol. 2 (1927) pp. 258-259, contains an article on his father, Hugh J. Weldon, then a trust officer of the First National Bank, who later practiced law individually and as a member of Weldon & Hass, and for many years served as a director and officer of the Santa Barbara Historical Society. Hugh J. Weldon, born 25 June 1890 Ventura County, California, was son of W. R. H. and Grace E. Griswold Weldon. The article states W.R.H.Weldon organized the Channel Commercial Company of Santa Barbara, conducted business in Santa Barbara for 21 years, then moved to Los Angeles and in 1927 was executive head of the firm which owned and operated the Safeway grocery stores, then the largest business of its kind on the Pacific coast. The grandfather, Solomon Reigs H.L. Weldon, was a minister of the Congregational Church and about 1872 brought his family, consisting of his wife, Helen Lorraine (b. 1828 Vermont, d. 30 March 1920), son W. H. R. and daughter Jane, settled on the mesa, and lived there until his death in 1897.

The Weldon name in the United States appears to derive from two possible sources. In the New England states, probably from the English Weld (Weald) meaning "wood" and Weldon meaning "son of" Weld, originating probably in Anglo-Saxon eastern counties prior to the Norman conquest. Early records show that Rev. Thomas Weld, of Terling, county Essex, with his wife, Margaret and four sons, John, Thomas, Samuel and Edmund, left London 9 March 1632 on the WILLIAM AND FRANCIS, arriving Boston 5 June 1632. A Genealogical Register of the First Settlers of New England, John Farmer, originally published 1829, states he was one of the first ministers of Roxbury and returned to England with Rev. Hugh Peter in 1641. His brothers Daniel and Joseph also were Roxbury residents. A Robert Welden or Weldon came with the 1630 Winthrop Fleet and d. 16 Feb. 1631, Charlestown. Christopher Welden, sen. d. at Charlestown 29 Apr. 1668. James Welden, resident Newport, R. I. 1648. A Directory of the Ancestral Heads of New England Families, 1520-1700 (Holmes), originally published 1923, gives separate listings and shows the derivation of the name WELD, WELDE as "A wood, sometimes written weald, the woody part of a country," and WELDEN, "A place name from a hamlet in the parish of Hardwicke, county of Bucks; also a parish near Daventry, county of Northampton, bears the name Welden. The name is also derived from weald, Woody, a wood, and den, a valley." Pioneers of Massachusetts, Charles Henry Pope, originally published 1900, states that Rev. Thomas Weld was ordained pastor at Roxbury, with John Eliot as teacher, in Nov. 1632 and that jointly with Richard Mather and John Eliot wrote The Bay Psalm Book.

Descendants of these New England pioneers moved southward into New Jersey and other areas and westward into the Northwest Territory and beyond.

WELDEN - (van) Welde(n) - WELDON

In the mid-Atlantic states emigration was probably from Germany (the Palatinate) through the Netherlands. In Delaware, in Wilmington and vicinity the surname Weldin and Weldon appears regularly from as far back as 1684, the earliest form being WELDTEN.

In his monograph, Armand Vanwelde comments that generally the Weldens were found to be of Germanic origin and the Weldons of Irish and English origin. In searching the 1850 census he found: In Indiana, 3 Welden and 1 Weldde; Kentucky, 18 Welden, 1 Weldin; Mississippi, 7 Welden; Iowa, Welden; Minnesota, 1860 census 3 Welden, 1870 4 Welden and 8 Welde; Louisiana 1850, 3 Welden; Alabama, Welden.

CORYELL, CORIEL, CORIELL, CORIELE, CORELL, CORREL, CORRELL, COREL, KORIELL, QUERELLE, QUERRELLA. Some Coryells believe the French spelling of the name was Querelle or Querella. Tradition is that the Coryells were French Huguenots and came to America via Corsica about 1663. Foreign Research -3d Floor, LDS Library, suggested: Write in English to Monsieur le Directeur de Service d'Archives Archives Departmentales, Prefecture, Ajaccio, Corse. Ask about immigration about 1663 and later via Corsica: Photocopy Corsica data from one of the Biographical Sketches. Give American names (various spellings) and the French spelling. Ask for names of possible ships on which the immigrants may have come.

HISTORICAL AND IMMIGRATION DATES

- 1607 Founding of Virginia by English colonists, to "fetch treasure" and enjoy "religious and happy government."
- 1619 First shipload of 20 Negro slaves arrives at Jamestown.
- 1620 Voyage of the Mayflower, carrying Pilgrims who welcome opportunity to "advancing the gospel of . . . Christ in those remote parts of the world."
- 1623 Settlement of New Netherland as a trading post by Dutch West India Company.
- 1630 to Puritans migrate to New England to establish a form of government that will allow them to worship as they wish.
- 1640 Lord Baltimore founds Maryland as a refuge for English Catholics.
- 1634
- 1642 Outbreak of English Civil War and decrease in Puritan migration.
- 1649 Passage of Maryland Toleration Act, extending toleration to all bodies professing trinitarian Christianity.
- 1654 First Jewish immigrants to reach North America arrive at New Amsterdam, fleeing Portuguese persecution in Brazil.
- 1660 Emigration from England officially discouraged by government of Charles II, acting on mercantilist doctrine that the wealth of a country depends on number of inhabitants.
- 1670 Settlement of the Carolinas by a group of English courtiers, anxious to promote national self-sufficiency - and their own fortunes.
- 1681 Founding of Pennsylvania by the Quakers, as William Penn's "holy experiment: in universal philanthropy and brotherhood.
- 1683 First German settlers, Mennonites, to reach the New World arrive in Pennsylvania, in a desire to withdraw from the world and live peaceably according to the tenets of their faith.
- 1685 Revocation of Edict of Nantes by Louis XIV, culmination of growth of religious intolerance in France, leads to arrival of small but important group of Huguenots. Most settle in South Carolina.
- 1697 Royal African Company's monopoly of slave trade ends and the business of slavery expands rapidly. New Englanders find it extremely profitable.
- 1707 Act of Union between England and Scotland begins a new era of Scottish migration. Scots settle as merchants and factors in colonial seaports; lowland artisans and laborers leave Glasgow to become indentured servants in tobacco colonies and New York.
- 1709 Exodus from German Palatinate in wake of devastation wreaked by wars of Louis XIV. Palatines settle in Hudson Valley and Pennsylvania.
- 1717 Act of English Parliament legalizes transportation to American colonies as punishment; contractors begin regular shipments from jails, most (of some 30,000) to Virginia and Maryland.
- 1718 Large scale Scotch-Irish immigration begins, sparked by discontent with Old Country land system; absentee landlords, high rents, short leases. Most settle first in New England, then in Maryland and Pennsylvania.
- 1730 Colonization of Virginia valley and Carolina back country by Germans (Pietist and pacifist sectarians) and Scotch-Irish from Pennsylvania.
- 1732 Georgia founded by James Oglethorpe as a buffer against Spanish and French attack, as a producer of raw silk and as a haven for imprisoned debtors. (Silk scheme fails; only a small number of debtors come.)
- 1740 Parliament enacts Naturalization Act conferring British citizenship on alien immigrants to colonies in hope of encouraging Jewish immigration. Jews enjoy a greater degree of political and religious freedom in the American colonies than anywhere in the world.

HISTORICAL AND IMMIGRATION DATES

- 1745 Jacobite rebellion in Scotland to put Stuarts back on throne fails. Some rebels transported to American colonies as punishment.
- 1755 Expulsion of French acadians from Nova Scotia on suspicion of disloyalty. Survivors settle in Louisiana. Some are also found in New England.
- 1762 A number of families of veterans of the Siege of Louisburg migrate from Essex County, Massachusetts to what was then Nova Scotia - later New Brunswick, receiving grants of former Acadian lands.
- 1771-73 Depression in Ulster linen trade and acute agrarian crisis bring new influx of Scotch-Irish, around 10,000 annually.
- 1775 British Government suspends emigration on outbreak of hostilities in America.
- 1783 The War of the Revolution, April 19, 1775 to April 11, 1783
- 1782 - Wyoming Valley disturbances, in Pennsylvania.
- 1787
- 1783 Treaty of Paris ends Revolutionary War. Revival of immigration, most numerous group: Scotch-Irish.
- 1786-1787 Shay's rebellion, in Massachusetts.
- 1789 Outbreak of French Revolution. Emigration to the U. S. of aristocrats and royalist sympathizers.
- 1790 - War with Northwest Indians Sept. 1789- Aug. 1795
- 1795
- 1791 Negro revolt in Santo Domingo; Ten to twenty thousand French exiles take refuge in the U. S., principally in towns on the Atlantic seaboard.
- 1791-1794 Whiskey insurrection in Pennsylvania.
- 1793 Wars of the French Revolution; and Girondists and Jacobins threatened by guillotine come to the United States.
- 1798 Unsuccessful Irish rebellion; rebels emigrate to U. S., as do distressed artisans and yeoman farmers and agricultural laborers depressed by bad harvests and low prices. Alien and Sedition Acts give President arbitrary powers to seize and expel resident aliens suspected of engaging in subversive activities. Though never invoked, Acts induce several shiploads of Frenchmen to return to France and Santo Domingo.
- 1798-1800 War with France July 9, 1798 to Sept. 30, 1800.
- 1800
- 1799 Fry's insurrection in Pennsylvania; spring of 1799.
- 1801-5 War with Tripoli, June 10, 1801 to June 4, 1805.
- 1803 Resumption of war between England and France. Disruption of transatlantic trade; emigration from continental Europe practically impossible. British Passenger Act limits numbers to be carried by emigrant ships, effectively checks Irish immigration.
- 1806 Durr conspiracy. Sabine expedition, Louisiana.
- 1807 Naval affair in Chesapeake Bay, July 9 to Aug. 5, 1807. Congress prohibits importing of Negro slaves into the U. S. (Prohibited by Delaware in 1776; Virginia, 1778; Maryland, 1783; South Carolina, 1787; North Carolina, 1794; Georgia, 1798; reopened by South Carolina in 1803).
- 1808 Embargo troubles, Lake Champlain.
- 1811-13 War with Northwest Indians, Nov. 1811 to Oct. 1813.
- 1812-15 War with Great Britain June 18, 1812 to Feb. 17, 1815.
- 1812 Florida or Seminole war, Aug. 15 to Oct. 1812
- 1813 Peoria Indian war, Illinois, Sept 19 - Oct 21, 1813
- 1813-14 Creek Indian war, Alabama, July 27, 1813 to Aug. 9, 1814
- 1814 Treaty of Ghent ends War of 1812. Beginning of first great war of immigration: 5,000,000 immigrants between 1815 & 1860.
- 1817-18 Seminole or Florida war, Nov. 20, 1817 to Oct. 31, 1818.

HISTORICAL AND IMMIGRATION DATES

- 1818 Black Ball Line of sailing packets begins regular Liverpool- New York service; Liverpool becomes main port of departure for Irish and British, as well as considerable numbers of Germans and Norwegians.
- 1819 Yellowstone expedition, July 4 to September, 1819.
- 1823 Campaign against Blackfeet and Arickaree Indians, Upper Missouri River.
- 1825 Great Britain repeals laws prohibiting emigration as ineffective; official endorsement of view that England is over-populated. Arrival in U. S. of first group of Norwegian immigrants in sloop Restaurationen, consisting of freeholders leaving an overpopulated community and shrunken farms. They are followed by cotters, laborers and servants.
- 1827 Winnebago expedition, Wisconsin (no fighting), June to Sept. 1827; also called LaFevre Indian war.
- 1830 Polish revolution. 36 sections of public land in Illinois allotted by Congress to Polish revolutionary refugees.
- 1831 Sac and Fox Indian troubles in Illinois.
- 1832 Black Hawk war, April 26 to Sept. 21, 1832.
- 1832-33 Nullification troubles in So. Carolina, Nov. 1832 to Feb. 1833.
- 1833-1839 Cherokee disturbances and removal.
- 1834 Pawnee expedition, Indian Territory, June to Sept. 1834
- 1835-36 Toledo war, Ohio and Michigan boundary dispute.
- 1835-42 Seminole or Florida war, Nov. 1, 1835 to Aug 14, 1842.
- 1836-37 Creek disturbances in Alabama, May 5, 1836 to Sept 30, 1837.
- 1837 Osage Indian troubles in Missouri.
- 1837 Financial panic. Nativists complain that immigration lowers wage levels, contributes to the decline of the apprenticeship system and generally depresses labor conditions.
- 1838 Heatherly Indian disturbances on Missouri and Iowa line.
- 1838 Mormon disturbances in Missouri.
- 1839-39 New York, Arrostook, and Canada (Patriot war) frontier disturbances (no fighting).
- 1840 Cunard Line founded, with minimal support in 14 states; precursor of nativist, anti-immigrant Know-Nothing party which reached its peak in 1855, when it elected 6 governors, dominated several state legislatures and sent a sizeable delegation to Congress.
- 1846 Crop failures in Germany and Holland. Mortgage foreclosures and forced sales sent tens of thousands of dispossessed to U. S.
- 1846-47 Irish potato famine. Large-scale emigration to the U. S. of all classes of Irish population, not only laborers and cotters, but even substantial farmers.
- 1846-47 Doniplan's expedition from Santa Fe, N.M. to Chihuahua, Mex. Nov. 1846 to Feb. 1847.
- 1846-48 Mexican War, April 24, 1846 to May 30, 1848.
- 1846-48 New Mexico expedition June 30, 1846 to Feb. 13, 1848.
- 1848 Cayuse war, Oregon. Oregon Volunteers.
- 1848 Revolution in Germany. Failure of revolution results in emigration of political refugees to America.
- 1849-61 Navajo troubles, New Mexico. Continuous disturbances with Comanche, Cheyenne, Lipan and Kickapoo Indians in Texas.
- 1849 Discovery of gold at Sutter's Fort, California.
- 1850 Pitt River expedition, California, Apr. 28 to Sept. 13, 1850.
- 1851-52 Yuma expedition, California, Dec. 1851 to Apr. 1852.
- 1851-53 Utah Indian disturbance.

Chinese Exclusion Act denies entry to Chinese laborers for a period of 10 years (renewed in 1892; Chinese immigration suspended indefinitely in 1902, many return home). Outbreak of anti-Semitism in Russia; sharp rise in Jewish immigration to U. S.
- 1885 Foran Act prohibits importing of contract labor, but not of skilled labor for new industries, artists, actors, lecturers, domestic servants, individuals in U. S. not to be prevented from assisting immigration of relatives and personal friends.
- 1886 Statue of Liberty dedicated, just when the resistance to unrestricted immigration begins to mount.
- 1890 Superintendent of the Census announces disappearance of the frontier.
- 1891 Congress adds health qualifications to immigration restrictions. Pogroms in Russia. Large Jewish immigration to U. S.
- 1892 Ellis Island replaces Castle Garden as a reception center for immigrants.
- 1893 Economic depression brings a vast accession of strength to anti-Catholic American Protective Association.
- 1894 Immigration Restriction League organized, to be the spearhead of restrictionist movement for next 25 years. Emphasized distinction between 'old' (Northern and Western European) and "new" (Southern and Eastern European) immigrants.
- 1894-96 Massacres of Armenian Christians by Moslems set emigration to U. S. in motion.
- 1897 Literacy test for immigrants vetoed by President Cleveland.
- 1903 Immigration law denies entry, *inter alia*, to anarchists or persons believing in the overthrow by force or violence of the government of the U. S., or any government, or in the assassination of public officials (as a result of assassination of President McKinley by the American-born anarchist Leon Czolgosz).
- 1905 Japanese and Korean Exclusion League formed by organized labor and in fear of threat to living standards of American workingmen.
- 1906 By Act of Congress of June 16, 1906, naturalization of aliens by action of states was abandoned and became under exclusive control of Congress; naturalization a privilege as distinguished from a right.
- 1914-18 With World War I came the end of the period of mass migration to the U. S. In 1917 literacy test for immigrants was finally adopted after being defeated by Congress in 1896, 1898, 1902, 1906, vetoed in 1897 by President Cleveland, in 1913 by President Taft, and in 1915 and 1917 by President Wilson. It was passed by overriding the second veto by President Wilson.

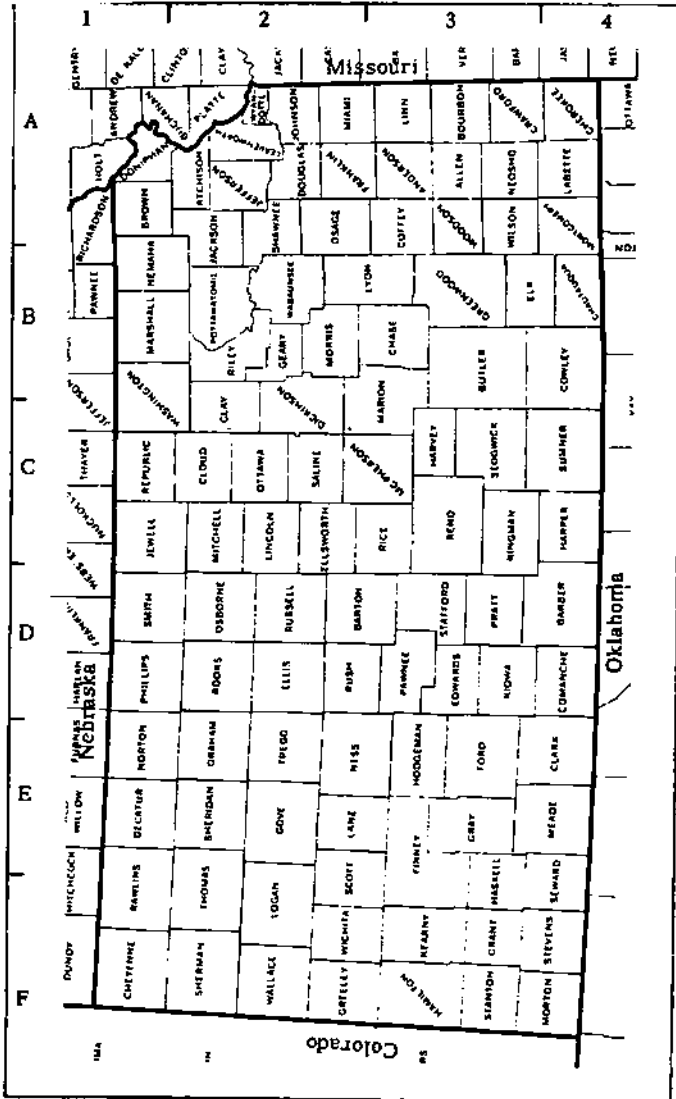

K A N S A S

Kansas was part of the Louisiana Purchase in 1803 and was included in the Missouri Territory until 1821. Fort Leavenworth became the first community in the area in 1827. Kansas became a state in 1861, the 34th. Population was then about 110,000, mostly settlers from Southern states and New Englanders, with some from Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Kentucky. Following the war many Civil War veterans took up homesteads in Kansas. Foreign-born settlers came from Germany, Russia, Sweden, and England. There were also many from Mexico.

The Division of Vital Statistics, State Department of Health, Topeka, KANSAS 66612, has birth and death records from 1911 and marriage records since 1913. The County Clerk in the county of occurrence has some records of birth and death and the Probate Judge of each county has records of marriages in the county before 1913. Probate matters and wills are handled by the Probate Judges.

Noted Kansans include Earl Browder, Walter P. Chrysler, Charles Curtis, Amelia Barhart, Dwight D. Eisenhower, Dorothy Canfield Fisher, Carry Nation, and William Allen White.

O K L A H O M A

After Oklahoma became part of the United States with the Louisiana Purchase in 1803, it was included in the Indiana Territory. In 1812 it was combined with the Missouri Territory, and in 1819 with the Arkansas Territory. For several years most of Oklahoma was included in what was called the Indian Territory. This continued until about 1893 when it was divided into the Indian Territory and the Oklahoma Territory, the latter being thrown open to white settlers. While the territory was still dedicated for use of the Indians, white settlers came in such hordes to secure land that eventually they had to be driven away by U. S. soldiers. The clamor for more land became so vociferous that the government purchased from the Indians a large section adjacent to Logan and Oklahoma Counties. Settlers from Illinois, Iowa and Kansas seemed to favor the western and northwestern parts of the state, while those from Arkansas, Missouri and Texas preferred the southern and eastern sections of the state. In the part of Oklahoma which had been a part of the Indian Territory, there were six "Indian Nations", Cherokee, Creek, Choctaw, Chickasaw, Osage and Seminole. Tribal reservations also existed.

Additional data

Greer County, at the extreme southwestern tip, was organized in 1886 as Greer County, Texas. A court decision and an act of Congress awarded Greer County to Oklahoma in 1896. In 1890 the Territorial Government was established with Guthrie as its capital. In 1906 Congress passed the enabling act. Oklahoma became the 46th state 16 November 1907. The capital was moved from Guthrie to Oklahoma City in 1910. Birth and death records since 1908 are at the Dept. of Health, Division of Vital Statistics, Oklahoma City, OK 73105. Marriage records and all court and land records are under the supervision of the respective County Clerks.

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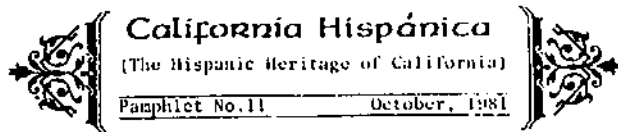

HOW TO FIND THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN TWO COUSINS: You must begin with the name of a person who is a grandparent or some degree of great-grandparent of both cousins. Place the name of this ancestor in Space No. 1 at the upper left-hand corner of the chart. Along the top, in Spaces 2, 3, etc., place the names of the persons in each succeeding generation through whom one cousin is directly descended, ending with the space in which the cousin's name will be written. Then, in the Spaces 2, 3, etc., down along the left of the chart do the same for the descendants leading to the other cousin's name-space. The degree of cousinship will be shown in the space that is directly downward from the first cousin's name at the top and directly across to the right from the second cousin's name at the left.

CHICKASAW TIMES PAST Vol. 1, No. 1, April, May, June, 1982
 West Chickasaw Historical and Genealogical Society, P. O. Box 42, Houston, MS 38851, evidences an awareness of the need to supply and distribute items often difficult to locate. This first issue includes a short of Houston and the County; a list of the first 36 households and families from the 1850 census; drawings of the Houston Carnegie Library, established in 1909 and the first Carnegie library in Mississippi, and the Judge Bates' house, Houston's only antebellum home, now under restoration by the Joe East family and on completion to be open periodically to the public; extracts from notebooks of Franklin Marion Criddle (Frances in 1850 census) born Alabama 31 Oct 1840 d. 9 Feb 1882 Chickasaw County; old letters, Bible records, a sketch of the 1836 original survey of Houston; lists of cemetery markers or inscriptions in several old cemeteries; history of the First Baptist Church, Houston; Chickasaw County Land Records; a list of 10 land patents granted during the presidency of Martin Van Buren in 1838; list of Confederate soldiers from Chickasaw County records at the Court House; and 6 pages of listings in the County Index Book of Marriage Records, covering entries from 1865 to 1896, under Grooms' Names commencing with letters A and B, but not in either alphabetical or dating sequence, and many identified by initials only.

 A monthly newsletter published by Malinda E. E. Newhard, P. O. Box 86, Harlan Indiana 46743 \$9.00 per year (\$9.36 Ind.) Purpose: to inform on genealogical issues, events, societies and publications of concern to and of interest to Indiana area genealogists, 4 special issues per year. This special issue was motivated by the annual conference of the National Genealogical Society held in Indianapolis. Contains an updated list of 37 genealogical societies in Indiana, noting addresses, dues, publications, etc.; a list of newspaper genealogy columns, both current and defunct; professional researchers and genealogy speakers. The editor, publisher, also offers other items, including A Guide to Genealogical Records in Indiana, Revised 2d ed. \$12.00 postpaid (Ind. add 4% sales tax); Name Changes granted by the Indiana General Assembly prior to 1852 and Divorces Granted by the General Assembly of Indian prior to 1852 and a number of volumes of Cemetery Inscriptions and Veterans' Burial Records.

QUARTER SESSIONS RECORDS FOR FAMILY HISTORIANS: A Select List, Compiled by J.S.W. Gibson, Harts Cottage, Church Hanborough, Oxford OX7 2AB; Federation of Family History Societies, 96 Beaumont St., Milehouse, Plymouth PL2 3AQ, £1.00 + 75p. airmail overseas. 32 pp. and back cover, covering counties in England and Wales. The Records of Quarter Sessions are the oldest and main collections of public records belonging to the historic counties of England and Wales. Their existence led to the creation of county record offices, which have a dual role of diocesan record offices, with holdings of parish and probate records. The listings vary, but generally show the existence of printed Guides or other finding aids, the nature of the records, with years covered and gaps noted, which may include sacrament certificates, oaths of allegiance, removal orders, bastardy examinations and depositions, recognizances, indictments and presentments. In some there are registers of badgers (itinerant hawkers), drovers and tradesmen, gamekeepers, printers, victuallers, alshouse-keepers, slaughter houses for example. There are also Poll books, Land Tax records; Military lists; registers of Papists' estates; lists of jurors and freeholders; Protestant Dissenters and places of worship. The extent and location of Borough records also are included.
