

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FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome all you new members - we're delighted to have you join us! You'll find the SBGS a dynamic, energetic group. It's definitely the place for genealogical action in Santa Barbara.

The year is off to a great start. Our membership continues to grow, the process of incorporation is moving stoothly, and our participation in the RIM (Records Enventory Microfilming) Project is getting under way.

For those of you who haven't heard about this exciting project, it involves discovering and inventorying records in Fanta Barbara County that are of genealogical interest. When this has been done, a microfilm crew from the Cenealogical Society of Utah will arrive to tilm selected records. Societies throughout the state are cooperating in thus truly grand plan. Think how much more comprehensive the coverage will be with our local Society doing the preliminary inventoryl We were fortunate to have Carlton Swith, former President of our Society and currently President of the California State Genealogical Alliance, present a workshop on the RIM Project in February. He shared with us the procedures and planning that are being stilized by other societies in this endeavor. It will be rewarding to make this contribution to genealogical research. We'll be needing workers to organize, publicize, jocate, collate and computerize. There' a job or you, so please call (965-7423) and let me know how you'd like to help!

Remaining to be resolved is the dilemma of a monthly meeting place and affordable housing for our fine genealogy collection. In December we were notified that our rent at the Goleta Community Center was being quadrupled from \$35 to \$135 per month. An appeal was made to the Center's Board in January and they voted to allow us a graduated increase of: \$65 per mo. Jan.-Mar.; \$100 per mo. Apr-June; and \$135 per πο. beginning July. In addition, we must carry supplementary liability insurance. With this adjustment providing a bit of temporary financial relief (and the insurance proviso negating it), the Board of our Society voted to continue both our meetings and library at the Center through March. Beginning in April, we will move our monthly meeting to another location, possibily on a rotating basis, and if a new location has not been found for our library, that will be continued at the Center until June.

We need some imaginative thinking by all of you about new library space. The time is right to move. We've been crowded for shelf space the last two years, with very limited possibility for expansion. We have a noteworthy collection that continues to grow. And, if we had space that could be used on a more permanent basis, there are numerous ways that we could increase our services to members — i.e. additional library openings, meetings of special

interest groups, mini-workshops, etc. So put on your thinking caps! Do you know of available space in a church, public or private building, or maybe even a converted garage or spare room at someone's home? We can fix up and add shelves if necessary. Please give this careful and creative thought. Your Board has been working very hard, but has not come up with a solution yet. There's a home out there for us! WHERE IS IT???

Spread the word about our Society and bring a friend along to the next meeting. We've got a great thing going -- let's share it!

INCORPORATION

At our February meeting members confirmed a previous concensus that it is prudent and timely for our Society to incorporate. The rationale for incorporation was cogently stated in the February 1986 issue of "The Searcher" by Jean Nepsund, President of the Southern California Genealogical Society.

"One of the most important reasons for incorporating an organization is to limit liability. Incorporation creates a legal entity separate from the individuals that compose it. The corporation is a "legal person" that can negotiate contracts, pay taxes, and incur debts. The structure protects the directors, officers, and members from personal liability for claims brought against the corporation. Lawsuits can reach the assets of the corporation, but not the bank accounts, houses or other property of the persons who manage, work for or are members of the corporation."

The Ventura Society incorporated last year and has kindly shared their knowledge of the procedure with us. A preliminary draft of By-laws and Articles of Incorporation conforming to the California Nonprofit Corporation Code has been completed by committee and forwarded to our Board of Directors for study. When these are in final form, they will be made available to the membership for consideration prior to a formal vote of acceptance. In addition, a new application must be submitted establishing our non-profit status (despite of the fact that we are currently certified as such).

As you can see, there is much time and effort involved in the process. John Rydell, Helen's husband, has graciously agreed to serve as our legal advisor throughout. We are grateful to have his professional guidance.

We'll keep you posted.

ENGLISH ANCESTORS
Their Migration and Mobility
Sponsor: SBCGS

She has long been a member of three county family history societies in Wngland, as well as the Society of Genealogists in London. She organized a group of historians in Somerset-Dorset who meet regularly to work on transcribing parish registers and monumental inscriptions. In 1977 she was employed in Poole, Dorsetshire, as Archivist to sort, transcribe and index town documents dating back to 1560; has studied paleography (interpreting ancient documents), Old English, and English Legal Latin; and has also researched major genealogical archives in the western United States—Your editor in researching the Bradbury family in England encountered all of these subjects and is aware of the abilities involved in such searchings.

Miss Hills has advised that the March 8 seminar will cover all the main resources for English research from 1600 to 1900, including Civil Registration; Censuses, Wills, Parish Registers, Land and Estate Records, and Civil and Criminal Court Records for England and Wales. IRELAND is not included nor is SCOTLAND other than incidentally. Suggestions will be given regarding the principal record repositories and societies which can be of use in tracing English ancestry from abroad, i. e., from the United States. The seminar will cover patterns of mobility throughout Britain from the 15th century.

STUDY OF AMERICAN RELIGIONS Dr. Gordon Melton, Speaker

January's guest speaker was Dr. Gordon Melton, an ordained Methodist minister. In 1969 he founded the Institute for the Study of American Religions for the purpose of preserving the records, especially of groups too small to save their cwn. 95% of the collection has been published since 1945. Cataloguing may be completed by the end of the year and will be housed in Special Collections on the third floor of the UCSB Library.

Dr. Melton gave some background history of the religious development in america. Although religious reasons were among the primary motivations for coming to the American colonies, by 1790, only 15% of the people chose to be identified with a church. In the 1880's, revivalist times began and the numbers of religions and members grew. Baptists and Methodists predominate all other American churches since one could become a Baptist or a Methodist lay minister by a simple declaration of

being one.

Some references in this field are : Edwin Gaustad's Historical Atlas of Religion in America (at UCSB and SBCC libraries); Abington Press: Yearbook of American Churches which lists 200 of the most prominent religious bodies, the names and locations of their seminaries; and the Encyclopedia of World Methodism which is useful for tracing parishes and church conferences by These conference records will show any monetary contributions made by members of a parish in the Annual Conference Journal. A woman's contribution might be located in the Women's Home Mission Society or Women's Foreign Mission Society Records in the annual reports. The Conference records are found in seminaries or conference archives which hold records of local churches when they no longer contain names of living people. The proper conference records can be located by knowing names, places and dates of members being researched. A local parish in the same area can identify the conference that parish belonged

MCENERNEY PAPERS - SAN FRANCISCO RECORDS. On 18 April, 1906, the fire that ravaged San Francisco also destroyed1,549 books of records kept in the County Recorder's office, more than 1,400 volumes of mortgages, over 225 volumes of mortgage releases, more than 65 volumes of homestead declarations, 95 volumes of notices of liens and many volumes of marriage, maps, pending action notices, and other miscellaneous records. To rectify the situation, the Califormia Legislature approved on 16 June, 1906 "An Act to provide for the Establishment and Quieting of Title to Real Property in ase of the Loss or Destruction of Public Records." The new records and legal documents thus created often dealt with and described the same information contained in the originals and were an obvious benefit to property owners. The collection consists of approximately 50,000 cases, known as judgment rolls, dealing with early California names, dates and places in the City and County of San Francisco. Names and dates are myriad. The records are known as the McEnerney Papers, and are indexed. There are 16 volumes in the San Francisco City Clerk's office labeled "Index of Actions: Early in 1984 a crew from The Genealogical Society of Utah (Mormon Library) commenced microfilming and will circulate through interlibrary loan , Mormon Library System.

PITFALLS IN FAMILY RESEARCH

If someone were to make a boardgame for family researchers, one of the first things he would determine would be what type of obstacles there would be for confusing or delaying, sidetracking and defeating the players. He might call these obstacles "pitfalls". What might they be and where might they be placed?

One pitfall would be "name correlation", and it would be placed early in the game and would occur frequently, because it is the most tempting and greatest hazard in family research.

Name correlation uses the assumption that repetition of a certain name in the same location or set of documents indicates that all of the references belong to the same person. For example, one studying documents of Travis County, Texas from 1870 to 1920, would see many references to John W. Cloud. Often there are references to Rebeccaa, wife of John W. Cloud. If one were to fall into the pitfall lurking under these reference, he would assume that they all refer to the same John W. Cloud.

Careful study of documents, plus other sources such as newspapers and family documents on file in the Travis County Historical Collection at the local library in Austin, however, reveal tht there were actually two John W. Clouds (both with wives named Rebecca) living in Travis County during the years mentioned. The two John W. Clouds belong to different family lines and were not at all related.

Name correlation is tempting, especially when one wants desperately to make connections and find ancestors within a particular location or time. In the family research game, falling into this pitfall would mean forfeiting the game.

The second serious pitfall, for which penalty would be inability to finish the game, would be "failure to consult primary sources". Primary sources are such things as original records such as are found in courthouses: wills, deeds, court records, etc. This area of research presents a problem for many researchers who live in areas far from the county of interest. Many primary records have indeed been copied and published in book form. Unfortunately, once primary sources are copied and printed, they cease to be "primary sources" and become "secondary sources". Only the original, document, viewed either itself or on microfilm, is a primary source.

Logic explains this requirement, since people copying materials are subject to errors in transferring text from original document to notebook, then from notebook to typewritten page. Often the typewritten page is then set for printing by a typeseter, who is also subject to error. Many of the numerous books on Kentucky records contain

errors in copying that are revealed by a careful comparison between the original document and the printed version.

Failure to consult primary sources often forms a "double pitfall" with name correlation. It can sidetrack a player forever and send him and anyone using his data down a path away from successful game completion. Unfortunately, a player on this path may not realize that he will never reach the actual goal of truly knowing where his family line belongs. Or if he does discover that he has been sidetracked, he may lose the game because it takes him too much time to get back on the right path.

On the game board, there is a pitfall that would occur close to that of errors in printed sources from primary documents. This would be called "assuming that something printed in a book is correct" and represents absolutely accurate data that can be taken as true without question.

There is a book on the Cloud Family which says that William T. Cloud, who was born 1841 in Kentucky and died 1917 in Oklahoma, "had no issue". Imagine the scene that resulted when my husband's father read this statement about his own grandfather, whom he had known well! He had great difficulty understanding how this could be said about a man who had so many living great-grandchildren!

In the game of family research, one must always remember that the printed word is only as good as the source from which it came. Information should never be taken as 100% accurate until proven by careful research by the person who is interested in the data.

Fourth on the game board would be the pitfall of a player's "getting angry" when someone disagrees with conclusions that he holds. Such an obstacle, for obvious reasons, wuld mean that the game would be completed alone and without the help of others or the fun of sharing. In family research, one is a vacuum. The game is only enjoyable if data and findings can be shared with those who belong to the line being researched.

In one family that I know, one person became angry because data she had purchased was proven erroneous by the long and careful research done by another member. The two family members no longer speak to one another and their situation causes great anguish and embarrassment for the rest of the family. No one in the family is intersted in family research now, and the subject of ancestors is taboo at family gatherings.

"Feeling shame" about the actions of one's ancestors could delay or permanently suspend the family research game. History can't be changed, nor do the deeds or misdeeds of people from the past reflect in any way upon the behavior of present family members. Our forebears were people, with all of the human faults, failings, emotions and desires of those alive today. Finding closet sketetons or personal quirks is part of the fun of family history and adds spice and humanity to the game.

One of my greatest treasures is a picture of William T. Cloud and several of his brothers. All of the gentlemen appear very dignified in their Sunday best. Willie, as he was called within the family, is seated with a proud smile on his face. It is a lovely piture, and one that causes pride when viewed. However, when one looks closely he sees that Willie, all gussied up for the picture, failed to button the middle button of his vest! This small foible adds tremendous depth to the mental picture I have assembled of William Tasewell Cloud from all the research and documents and family stories. It is the thing that makes him my favorite among all the dead ancestors.

Desire to elevate one's ancestors to positions of prominence, thereby creating an opportunity for the player to "bask in reflected glory" is a common pitfall in family research. This particular pitfall is especially dangerous when playing in the category of Military Service or Finances. One family describes every bygone member as "prosperous or prominent"!

"Placing too much/too little reliance on stories handed down" in family traditions - two obstacles that delay the game by sending the researcher in the wrong directions - are related to the pitfalls of shame and pride. Traditions are important, for they can provide clues to guide research. But as family stories are told and as people's memories reach back progressively farther into time, details about family lines get blurred. Events and activities of Great-Grandmother's family become confused with those of Great-Great-Grandfather's, and errors are born.

Our family had a tradition that one ancestor had been a county sheriff. When we finally were able to view the original courthouse documents, we found that he had never been approinted or elected to this office at all, but that his father-in-law had! On the other hand, if we had dismissed the tradition completely as not being true, we would have missed the goal of actual discovery. There is often a grain of truth behind tradition or family legend.

The "Family Research" or "Genealogy Game" is a time-consuming, highly complex and confusing, frustrating and rewarding, worthwile, marvelous pasttime - when played correctly. Can you think of other pitfalls that the designer of this game might place in the path of his players? And how many of the pitfalls mentioned above have delayed or distracted you in your search for information about your family? Hopefully, the next time you play the family history game, you will play with more precision. But for progeny's sake - in spite of the pitfalls - KEEP PLAYING!

(The editor regrets that is was necessary to condense Mrs. Cloud's clever article a bit because of space limitations.)

FOLKLORE CAN MAKE FAMILY'S HISTORY EASIER UNDERSTOOD from ANCESTORS UNLIMITED, Southwest Nebraska Gen. Soc. Vol. 9,#6, 1985, reprinted from the CHURCH NEWS, the newsletter of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Sainta., the second in a series of articles with tips on genealogy and family history.

Studying family folklore can help people understand what kind of family they have, said Lynne Jorgensen, an LDS reference consultant. "You have to be ready at all times to collect family folklare," she continued. "Any family gathering may provide an opportunity. We should think of ourselves as fieldworkers."

Sister Jorgensen suggested that "fieldworkers" be alert for information on the following topics:

- The family surname its origin, meaning and any changes.
- Traditional first names, middle names, and nicknames and how they came into being.
- Stories passed down about parent, grandparents, more distant ancestors - their childhood, adolescence, schooling, marriage, work, religion, political activity, recreation.
- 4. Notorious or infamous characters in family's past.
- 5. How your ancestors met and married. Are there family stories of lost loves, jilted brides, unusual courtships, arranged marriages, elopements?
- 6. How historical events affected your family.
- 7. How a great fortune was lost or made. Are such incidents laughed about or deeply regretted?
- 8. Expressions used in the family. Did they come from specific incidents? Are there stories which explain their origin?
- How holidays are celebrated innovations, most important holidays, holidays unique to the family.
- Family reunions how often held, when, where, who organizes, who is invited, who comes, what happens; traditional customs, foods, activities.
- 11. Recipes preserved from past generations. Where did they originate? How were they passed down? Are they still used today?
- Other persons incorporated into the family their participation, :titles: they were given.
- 13. Family cemetery. Who is buried near whom? Who makes burial place decisions? Are there grave markers, and what is inscribed on them?
- Heirlooms or other objects of sentimental value their origin, care, and method of passing from one generation to next.

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
