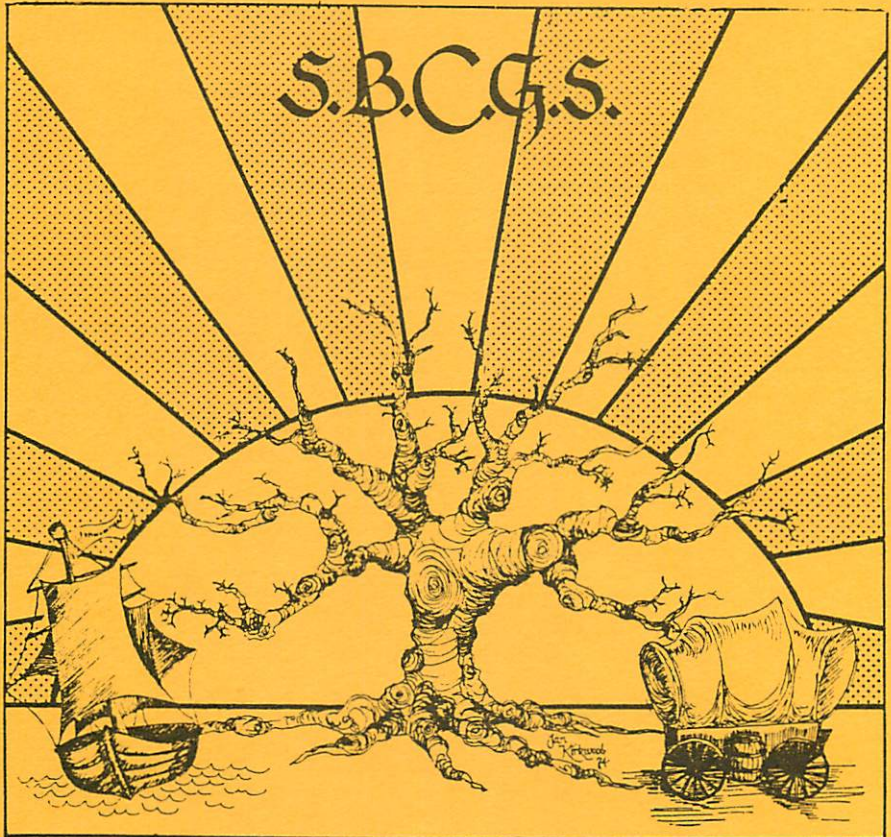

FROM THE PRESIDENT

We finished our fifteenth year with about 300 member and at our present rate of growth we may top 400 by the end of 1988. Isn't that great? We must be doing something right. Right? I think this growth results from a strong interest in family history in our community plus a very good program of genealogical education and services offered by our Society. The growth we are experiencing is wonderful, but it does bring problems with it.

We have known this for a long time, but month by month the problems become more acute. We are too big now to think small, yet too small to think really big. We are getting to the point where we must make a change in our library space and location. In this community, with its excessive rents, we need a real angel with a lot of money and a sympathetic heart. Or, we need more help from the public sector. I think there is a better chance of getting help from the public sector than of finding an angel. Don't you agree?

We need to let the county supervisors, the city council members, the city administrators and other administrators learn that we exist and that we are entitled to their attention as much as any other group. I feel that since we are offering an important life-enhancing capability to anyone who may be interested, the community should respond, via its officials, cooperatively.

However, we need to have a better idea of where we want to be and how we are going to get there. We need to develop a strategy. We need to identify who can help us privately or publicly and how to approach them. We need to know how other societies interface with public libraries. When I talked with him, Mr. Thomas, the Santa Barbara City Administrator, was very interested in learning about precedent in public library/private library relationships in other communities. Therefore, I am establishing a committee to assist in defining a strategy and helping to execute that plan. If you can help, please volunteer. Let's put this part of our requirements behind us.

I want to thank all the volunteers whose efforts make our society the exciting organization that it is. Without your help we would have to pack up our tent and go home. The S.B C.G.S. needs you and can't exist without you. But, we need more. We need a person to do publicity and some public relations work. It is a great opportunity for someone. Don't wait to be asked! Call me. We need people to help build some shelving for more books. Can you saw a straight line? Call me.

Being a volunteer is so rewarding. The feeling of being needed is such a heady wine. Why not take a sip or two?

This story about the meeting of her Greatgrandparents [Earl Reuben Fuller, b. 21 June 1861, d. 11 September 1949, m. 25 March 1887, Adella Alcesta Scott b. 7 September 1869, d. 14 June 1942] submitted by Carol Fuller Kosai.

Dad's Story on how he met Della
Told by Earl Reuben Fuller to his daughter, Anne Verne

I was baggage man out of Ionia on the P.M. when word came that a new road was being opened up near Tawas and they wanted an engineer and fireman. A friend and I went up and got the jobs although we'd never done that kind of work before. We ran between Tawas and Big Rapids, took in Rodney, Chippewa Lake and Mecosta. I was lucky, about a year later I moved to Rodney and found that the head sawyer, Jack Olsey, who I had known in Big Rapids, was running the Rodney Hotel. He didn't charge me a cent.

I met a fellow by the name of Fred Scott here. He was logging. One night he and I were sitting in front of the hotel when a girl in a pink dress appeared across the street. I said to Fred. "There's a girl that suits me." I don't think he told me then who she was, but it turned out to be his niece, Della Scott.

She was working at Pierce's boarding house. I heard she sang in the choir so I commenced to go to church. She quit Pierce's and came down to the hotel to work for \$1.50 a week, and sent her money home. I told her "damned if I would," so she quit and went home. Guess I only wrote her two letters and she never answered them. The old folks got them and never let her know. I thought she'd found someone else.

But one day I got a letter from Dad, written to me by Della's Aunt Dora in Holton. She said Dellie was sick and if I wanted her come and get her. Dad said, "Go take her away from the old fool." I was broke, but I didn't have to pay any railway fare, so I lit out for Holton, and her Uncle Fred went along.

Fred went out to the farm and got her, told her there was to be a party at Dora's. So he brought her down to town and the next morning we were married by the Justice of Peace and an hour later we were on the train for Dad Wickham's farm at Grand Ledge. Dellie didn't even go back home to pack her clothes. We stayed all night at Big Rapids. I made an excuse and left the room and when I came back she had borrowed a nightdress from the chambermaid.

The next night we arrived at the farm in Grand Ledge. Dad was pretty well tickled, he liked Dellie awfully well. We lived on the farm four years, til Father Wickham died. Then I ran the farm two years, until mother sold it. Then in 1890 I started out to look for a job and Dell went home to her folks to wait for me.

I found a job in Saginaw, got a new house and furniture and wired Dellie to come. I sent two or three

A Terrifying Experience

The winter after we came back from Nebraska we lived in Holton. There was lots of snow and we youngsters used to slide down hill on the main road running through town. The hill was quite steep and we would start in front of the old Rand and Jennings store and slide down across the creek. As the bridge was very narrow we were quite a nuisance to traffic.

One night my brother Frank and the other boys had the bright idea of getting a front bob from some sleighs belonging to some man living near by. Ten or fifteen of us piled on and away we went, pell-mell. It was fun while it lasted, but all at once the boy who was holding the tongue of the bob lost control and the bob headed for the side of the bridge. The boys threw themselves off the bob, but held on and were dragged in the snow until they finally stopped it just as it was about to go over the side of the bridge. I don't know just how high that bridge was, 20 feet perhaps, and the water was plenty deep. We had all we wanted of riding down hill on a big bob.

That Spring we moved to Evenwood on Truckey Valley, as it was called, where my father took a mill boarding house to run. There were two shingle mills, one owned by George Badeaux and the other by Burr's Blythe and Bowen. There were two boarding houses for he Burr's Blythe and Bowen mill. We kept the one for Mr. Bowen and a Mrs. MacGuire kept the Burrs and Blythe. Most of the men who worked in the Badeaux mill lived in little log shanties and Mrs. Badeaux took care of the few extras. The Badeaux mill was much larger and there were lots of shanty houses, most of them made of logs, but some made of boards with shingles all over the outside. In our boarding house the dining room was our living room. There were two bed rooms on one side, the kitchen on the other, and the men's room was on the back. Up stairs over the whole house was the dormitory with double rows of bunks built all around the one big room. There were always from 25 to 35 men there. In the dining room there were two long tables clear across the room. My father had a big circle saw hanging in a tree just outside of the kitchen door and we pounded on that when meals were ready.

It was a lively little shanty town and two or three evenings a week there would be a dance in someone's little house. The men would carry most of the furniture and sometimes the stove out of doors. For music there was one accordion and one banjo among the men. Some man would shake bones. My brother Bert played the violin and sometimes when they wanted a real big dance the would get him to play and they would use dormitory in our house. This room was big enough to

dance three sets at a time. They would make seats out of a long board set on shingle blocks along the sides and maybe the musicians would be up on an upper bunk.

The women would all bring cake and sandwiches and there was always coffee. Everyone had a good time. They would pass a hat to take a collection to pay the musicians. Old Billy Blythe, a big fat Frenchman and one of the big men at the mill, always came. I don't think I ever saw him dressed up. He always wore mackinaws - a wool outfit of shirt and tight trousers, much like the ski suits of today. Red or Green wool socks came up to his knees showing about his heavy rubbers. Sometimes his suit would be blue, always with big red flannel patches on the seat and knee. And usually he topped it all off with a stocking cap. And could he dance! We girls were in our glory when we were dancing with old Billy Blythe. I don't think he was so very old either, it was just the way he got himself up. He finally married a very nice girl school teacher and had two sons and lived on a farm up near Twin Lakes.

They were always moving it seems to me. From Evenwood we went back to Holton, then to North Muskegon, and from there out to the last farm north and west of Holton. I worked in the boarding house in Holton for quite a long time. My brother Bert and my uncle Fred Scott went to Rodney to work in shingle mills and got me to go there to work.

I worked three places there, the last one the hotel where I met my fate. This was in 1886. The next March we were married. From then on life was lively for me.

With his help she was able to trace her line back.

Mike was born in Cincinnati OH. He was graduated from UCSB in 1972 with high honors and a degree in Anthropology. Michael has been researching his family genealogy for over ten years. As an Accounting Systems Analyst for the County of Santa Barbara, he works with computers every day. Mike is an avid historian and has worked on projects in the Old Mission archives and La Purisima State Historic Park. He currently serves as a member of the board of directors for the Santa Barbara Trust for Historic Preservation.

Paula FOSS HARDWICK was born in Hull, England. She came to the United States as an infant of eighteen months. Paula graduated from San Francisco State College in 1966 with a degree in Psychology. Paula is currently a Social Worker for the County of Santa Barbara. Her first interest in genealogy began as a teen-ager in Northern California. Her great Aunt, Ella, fueled that interest with many stories of her Norwegian ancestors. During a recent trip to the LDS genealogical library in Salt Lake City, Paula was able to trace her Norwegian ancestry back fifteen generations. Paula is a thorough researcher and continues work on American, English, Welsh, and of course Norwegian lines of her family.

TERMS WITH CHANGED MEANINGS

- COUSINS Might be relatives of any type, especially nephews. Sometimes used in referring to friends.
- JUNIOR, JR. Not necessarily a son bearing the same name as his father. In earlier days was used to indicate a younger man, where two of the same name were living in a given community. 3rd, 4th, 5th etc. would be used for even younger persons. NSDAR limits its use to designation of sons of the same name whose fathers also are entitled to recognition as Revolutionary ancestors.
- MOTHER-IN-LAW In Colonial times, step-mothers thus referred to.
- BROTHER Often used in referring to brother-in-law.
- SON Often used in referring to son-in-law.
- DAUGHTER Often used in referring to daughter-in-law.
- MISTER Used only for man of wealth or education.
- MISTRESS Not necessarily a married woman. A term of respect for any mature woman.
- GENTLEMAN Might be used to describe a retired man of wealth or education.
- HOUSEKEEPER Once meant property owner and could be used for a male or female.
- DOMESTIC Once meant the housewife and not necessarily a servant.
- INMATE As used in the Pennsylvania Archives refers to a man living in the home of another person. Not necessarily a person in an institution.
- FREEMAN As used in Pennsylvania Archives meant a young man not yet married.

That article discussed the meaning of FREEMEN, the period of its existence and a list of those admitted in 1677 by the General Court of Massachusetts, sitting at Boston, listing about 50 names from Boston, Braintree, Concord, Dorchester, Dedham, Charlestown, Newbury, Salem, Reading, Hingham, Medfield, Springfield and Weymouth. The practice continued in New England from 1630, when the First General Court was held, until "the dissolution of the government, it being repealed, in appearance only, after the restoration of King Charles, the Second." 109 were admitted at the first Court. From 1630 to 1648, 1809 freeman were recorded. The wording, in 1634, is given in ANCESTORS WEST.

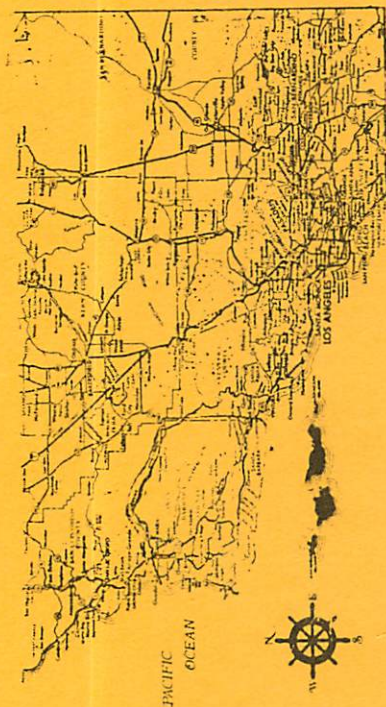

SANTA BARBARA COUNTY

One of California's 27 original counties. While the county was actually created in 1850, the history of the area dates back to 1542. In that year Juan Cabrillo discovered the Santa Barbara Channel and to San Miguel Island, where he died and was buried. A second Spanish explorer, Sebastian Vizcaino, entered the channel on the Feast Day of Saint Barbara in 1602 and named the area accordingly. Fr. Junipero Serra founded the Santa Barbara mission in 1786. Santa Barbara Royal Presidio, established April 21, 1782, was the last of four royal presidios in Alta California - San Diego, Monterey, San Francisco and Santa Barbara. Santa Barbara had all three Spanish forms: Presidio representing the military, Pueblo, civil and Mission, religious.

In 1873 Ventura County was established from the southern portion of the original Santa Barbara area.
