

# CALIFORNIA BIRTH CERTIFICATES

In the California Genealogical Society Newsletter of April 1989, we are cautioned about requesting birth records from Sacramento. Example: original birth certificate was misplaced, request was made for replacement. The document received was a "certified abstract of birth". It had only the name of the child, date of birth, and date it was filed and issued. No city of birth, nor complete name of mother, no name of father. A call to Sacramento indicated the "certified abstract" is issued automatically unless you ask for a <u>photo-copy of the</u> original certificate.

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



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#### North County News

This guarter we are deviating from the straight and narrow path of genealogy into some interesting history. You could call it a lead-in for the Vandenberg Genealogical Society's Cemetery Listing Project. We will be following, in the main, the life of William Benjamin Foxen and his contributions to California becoming part of the United States.

William Benjamin Foxen, son of James Foxen and Sara Smith Foxen, was born in Norwich, England in 1796. As a young boy he went to sea, serving in both the Royal Navy and later the Merchant Marine, in which branch he became a First Mate.

As early as 1817 he sailed around Cape Horn. After acquiring a ship of his own, he began trading up and the the Pacific Coast and in the Sandwich Islands, known today as the Hawaiian Islands.

In 1820 Foxen was in Santa Barbara. At this time Don Jose de La Guerra, commandante of the Presidio of Santa Barbara, had the misfortune of losing his schooner at what is now the Goleta slough. de La Guerra's men were attempting to salvage the schooner. Foxen told de La Guerra that the ship was repairable. Using indian labor Foxen repaired the ship and entered into a partnership with Don Jose de La Guerra.

While scouting local ranches for cargoes of hides and tallow, Foxen had occasion to visit Rancho San Ysidro in El Montecito owned by Tomas Olivera. While negotiating for hides and tallow with Senor Olivera, Foxen met the latters step-daughter, Eduarda del Carmen Osuna, and fell in Love with her.

In order for Foxen to marry Eduarda Osuna, he had to embrace the catholic faith, and was given conditional baptism at Mission Santa Barbara on 4 August 1830. Don Daniel Hill was his Sponsor. Foxen's baptismal name was Guillermo Domingo.

26 May 1831 William Domingo Foxen and Eduarda del Carmen Osuna were married and veiled according to the roman ritual at the Mission Santa Barbara. Don Daniel Hill along with his wife Dona Rafaela Ortega were the witnesses.

In 1837, Foxen acquired the rights to the Rancho Tinaquaic, a Mexican land grant. Rancho Tinaquaic was a small land grant, just over 8,800 acres. Foxen, Eduarda and their two young children moved to the rancho in late 1837 and occupied their new adobe home. The Foxen adobe was situated a short distance south, in Foxen Canyon, of Tepusquet Road. Foxen was the first white settler in the Sisquoc Valley. Foxen ran cattle, raised horses, and the rancho was known for the soap made there. Here the Foxens lived until 1847. During this period five more children were born to Benjamin and Eduarda. Their family now numbered seven.

In 1946 the United States was making an attempt to claim California from the Mexican government and make it part of the United States.

Don Julian, as Foxen was known, 50 years old at this time learned of an attempt by Mexican forces to ambush Fremont and his men at Gaviota Pass. After much deliberation Foxen decided to warn Fremont of the ambush, and at the same time to volunteer his services in guiding the American forces over the little known San Marcos Pass, which in reality was nothing more than an indian horse trail, and into Santa Barbara from Fremont and his men were camped on behind the town. the Rancho Tinaguaic not far from Foxens adobe. (NOTE: There is some contraversy as to whether the Mexican military in Santa Barbara were in ambush at Gaviota Pass or down south in the area of Los Angeles opposing the main American force. That is not part of this story, so we leave it with this parenthetical note.)

Don Julian led the troops to the summit of San Marcos Pass. He then returned home, leaving his eldest son Guillermo Jose Juan to guide the troops down the other side to Santa Barbara.

On 27 December 1846 Colonel John C. Fremont and his troops entered Santa Barbara and raised the Stars and Stripes. Most of the Spanish population, mainly women, children and the infirm were at mass when the American occupation of Santa Barbara occured. Consequently there was no battle and no blood was shed.

Because of Foxens aid to Fremont, he was considered a traitor by his neighbors in the Sisquoc Valley who were loyal to the Mexican government. The adobe home of the Foxens was burned and sacked on three separate occasions. Finally, fearing for their lives, Don Julian, Eduarda, and their seven children were forced to leave Rancho Tinacuaic. They found refuge at the missions of Santa Ines and La Purisima. For a time they also lived with Don Daniel Hill on the La Patera Rancho, near what is now Goleta. During this long period of exile four more children were born.

After seven years the tempers of Don Julian's neighbors had cooled. They agreed that he had acted "for the good of the country" and Don Julian and Eduarda were able to return to the Rancho Tinagluaic. Their family now numbered ten. Their last child was born after their return to the Rancho.

Don Julian returned to his life as a rancher. He again raised cattle and was known for his horses.

In the 1860's Foxen was instrumental in helping to lay out the stage route over San Marcos Pass. Don Julian had the honor of driving the first stage over the route he knew so well. And it was his horses that pulled that first stage plus the others that were to follow. Foxen's adobe became a stage coach stop.

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William Benjamin Foxen died 19 February 1874. For a time he was buried on a hillside across from his adobe home. When the Chapel of San Ramon was completed and dedicated, Don Julian's remains were taken from this temporary grave and reintered in the chapel graveyard. Eduarda del Carmen Osuna de Foxen died 6 September 1894 and lies in an unmarked grave, at her request, beside Don Julian.

Fremont, who made no mention of Foxen or the Baviota Pass incident in his famous autobiography, achieved enduring fame.

But what of the obscure patriot who sleeps under a marble column at the head of Foxen Cayon overlooking the Sisquoc highway to Santa Maria? Few persons realize that the sovereignty of California, and indeed the future course of world history, hinged on the soul searching decision which Benjamin Foxen made more than 143 years ago "for the good of the Country."

Today the descedants of Frederick and Ramona Foxen Wickenden continue to live in the valley. Ramona was the daughter of Don Julian.

#### SOLDIERS PRESENT AT THE FOUNDING OF SANTA BARBARA PRESIDIO

Soldiers present at the founding of the Presidio in 1782, not including the Indian auxiliaries, were known as "soldados de cuera", because of the leather jackets they wore. Many of their descendants became well known residents of Santa Barbara. There were eight officers and 36 men present.

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If your ancestors lived in Georgia during the Civil War, they may be listed on the SALT BOOKS at the Georgia State Archives on Microfilm 73/4. Families are listed by county, who were supplied the scarce commodity of salt. Salt could be used in lieu of money for barter. The state intervened in the distribution of salt in order to assure equal access to all.

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#### SANTA BARBARA MAYORS

Santa Barbara was incorporated April 9, 1850. At that time it was governed by a Mexican common council, or "ayuntamiento". California became the list state several months later that same year.

About 1870 the city government was "anglicized". This was the period in which English was spoken more than Spanish, as the language of public record. Only two of the mayors, who served before 1870, could speak English.

Joaquin De la Guerra was the elected "alcalde", or mayor, when Santa Barbara officially became American in April, 1850.

An infallible cure for the ague and fever. The writer of this has no motive but to serve those who may be afflicted with that dreadful disorder, the Ague and Fever; and having experienced the good effects of the means he recommends, is very desirous it should be tried by all whose situation requires it. Just before going to bed, let the patient take off his or her clothes and stand under a sieve suspended by a line; let a person pour into the sieve a pail filled with water just drawn from a well. The shock will be considerable. Let the person wipe him or herself dry, and go into bed. The effects will be pleasing. It has never failed curing in the family of the writer of this after three times bathing, often with only once.



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#### SANIA BARBARA COUNTY

One of California's 27 original counties. While the county was actually created in 1850, the history of the area dates back to 1542. In that year Juan Cabrillo discovered the Santa Barbara Channel and later, according to legend crossed to San Miguel Island, where he died and was buried. A second Spanish explorer, Sebastian Vizcaino, entered the channel on the Feast Day of Saint Barbara in 1602 and named the area accordingly. Fr. Junipero Serra founded the Santa Barbara mission in 1786. Santa Barbara Royal Presidio, established April 21, 1782, was the last of four royal presidios in Alta California - San Diego, Monterey, San Francisco and Santa Barbara. Santa Barbara had all three Spanish forms-Presidio representing the military; Pueblo, civil and Mission, religious.

In 1873 Ventura County was established from the southern portion of the original Santa Barbara area.

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
