

A GENEALOGICAL TRIP TO EAST GERMANY July 9 - 13, 1990 by: Maria & Howard Menzel

"You will be going to another country - Viersig yahr, nicht! (40 years, nothing)" was the malice tinged comment of the young female desk clerk at Frankfurt's Ramada Inn as we made arrangements to store some of our luggage at the hotel during our brief venture into what was then still the DDR, or Deutschen Demokratic Republik, commonly called "East Germany" by Americans. We were to return from East Germany with a very clear understanding of what she had meant and with an abiding resentment of Russia for the damage it had done to two generations of East Germans and their country.

The next morning, July 9th, we took a cab to the Hauptbahnhoff in downtown Frankfurt to board an 8 AM train to Erfurt where we had arranged (we thought) to rent a car to drive the 20 kilometers to GOTHA, our destination and where we had reserved (we had been reassured) a room for the next four nights for the purpose of meeting our namesake penpals and doing some research on Howard's father's family. Our visas were not needed because we crossed the border into East Germany eight days after border restrictions had been lifted. Originally we had to obtain them in order to get our hotel reservation.

The border town was EISENACH, famous as the birthplace of Johann Sebastian Bach and site of Martin Luther's refuge when he was sought for trial as a heretic. Living under the protection of the autonomous Duke of Saxony, Luther found time to translate the New Testament into German, thereby laying the foundation for the written German language. The time was 1521 and the room where he worked in Wartburg Castle under the name of Junker Georg is still there with his desk and Bible. An East German train crew replaced the western one at this border crossing and we resumed enjoying the passing countryside from a comfortable compartment. At the several station stops in East Germany, we observed workmen chipping rust from the station platform ironwork and applying fresh coats of dark green paint which was perhaps the first such maintenance in 40 years. We were to see many other such examples of a new awakening and rebirth of spirit throughout our short stay in this land.

We arrived in ERFURT, capitol of the county of the same name, at about 12:30 PM. Crossing the Bahnhofsvorplatz leading to the Erfurter Hotel, we entered the lobby and asked the desk clerk about our car rental only to learn that the rental agency no longer existed. An enterprising young assistant clerk appeared and announced that he had a "colleague" from whom we might be able to rent a car. Several lengthy phone calls later, he advised us that his colleague's car had not yet been returned by the current borrower and could we return later and see if, by then, it had been returned. We walked a few blocks into town, but really saw very little as our minds were on reaching GOTHA. ERFURT, by the way, is one of 15 counties of East Germany which were later to be consolidated

into the five new states of a reunited Germany. Their capitol cities have the same name as the corresponding counties. Returning to the hotel, we learned that the rental car had not yet been returned. We were now anxious to get to our hotel room in nearby GOTHA, so Howard decided to check out cab fares with one of the taxis outside. On learning from one of the drivers that he would take us there for only 18 marks, we decided to go by cab rather than wait for the westbound train. On arriving in GOTHA twenty-five minutes later, the driver demanded the fare of 50 marks displayed on the cab's meter, rather than the negotiated price. He had let us off at the foot of Judenstrasse, at the head of which the Hotel Slovan was located about 100 yards distant, explaining that the street was closed to automobile traffic. As we discussed the fare disagreement, a passerby, overhearing our conversation, stopped and inquired if we were "Menzel from California", or something to that effect. Of all people, it turned out that he was our penpal, Gerhard Menzel, on his way to the hotel for his daily check on our reservation. Despite our travel agent having received verification of the reservation from the central reservation bureau in Berlin, which handled hotel reservations for all of East Germany, apparently the reservation had never been forwarded to GOTHA for they claimed to have no record of it. It was either a case of bureaucratic bungling or, because of the continuing collapse of political structure of the country, the Berlin people ceased operating or had just taken the money and run.

Gerhard Menzel was one of three "Menzels" we had corresponded with using a telephone directory address list obtained from the GERMAN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY OF AMERICA. Although not related, Gerhard having come from Silesia which is now in Poland, we were destined to become so fond of Gerhard and his wife, Sieglinde, that we "adopted" them as relatives. The crooked cabbie was paid his demands and the three of us walked up the hill to the Hotel Slovan where, though unable to find a room reservation for us, a vacant room was located on the second of three floors. Our room overlooked the Judenstrasse and we were to soon learn that at about 6 o'clock daily a very noisy street sweeping machine made its presence felt. Though fairly clean and with a private bath, the bed mattresses were lumpy and the quilt covers unclean, the latter situation was rectified by a judicious complaint to the chambermaid. Later that afternoon we were to have coffee with Gerhard, his wife and Hans Gunter Menzel, another of our correspondents and who had offered to provide us with an interpreter in the form of a colleague of his who taught Russian and English at Reyherschule II, a local secondary school. On meeting Gerhard's wife, Sieglinde, she presented Maria with a gorgeous bouquet of roses from her garden and these brightened up our somber room during our stay.

The following morning we met Gerhard and Sieglinde in the lobby with our interpreter, Regine Franke, the charming young school teacher who so generously donated her time throughout our stay in GOTHA. The five of us piled into Gerhard's tiny, three-cylinder "Wartburg" diesel automobile which he had to keep accelerating to prevent stalling.

It had been manufactured in nearby EISENACH. Our destination was the nearby St. Augustine Lutheran Church and the office of Superintendent Eckhardt Hoffmann with whom an appointment had been arranged. Howard's paternal great grandparents had been married in this church, a former Augustinian monastery, on 6 February 1842 and his grandfather was baptised here on 26 May 1840. As Pastor Hoffmann supervised the Lutheran churches in the area, protocol dictated that we secure his cooperation in furthering our genealogical research. Gerhard had indicated it would be futile to approach the local civil authorities. Pastor Hoffmann, a man of about 50 years old, was very busy at this time due to the anticipated revitalization of churches made possible by the collapse of communism. Maria remembered him as becoming receptive to our request after learning that Howard had been a public official in California, where Superintendent Hoffmann had spent a sabbatical some years earlier. We were to learn that he had played a local contributing roll in the demise of the DDR and was well respected in the community. Supt. Hoffmann gave us permission to contact Frau Biedermann, a part time staffer and researcher of the church, to see if she would be interested in doing some research for us. This would have to be arranged by correspondence as she was currently away on vacation. This was accomplished in January 1991 when she wrote us offering to undertake a research effort at the rate of 6 DM (Deutsch Marks) per hour. We replied telling her the rate was satisfactory and that we had set aside 120 DM for the initial 20 hours of research. The matter of further research could be explored later when she might have a better idea of how much more it might cost.

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With our letter of acceptance we included an advance payment of 40 DM and an additional 20 DM to be given to Supt. Hoffmann for his discretionary fund with our best wishes.

Arrangements were also made with Supt. Hoffmann to have one of his associates, Pastor Scriba, meet us later in the day at the nearby village of MOLSCHLEBEN at St. Peter and Paul's church where grandmother Louise Roth Menzel was born and baptised. We met at the rectory, then walked to an adjacent house where Pastor Scriba knocked on the door and obtained a huge church key from the church custodian. On our approach to the church we noted that the grounds had been neglected much as we were to find the church had been - both inside and outside.

Pastor Scriba had been given the assignment to get St. Peter and Paul's up and running in six months. Despite its years of obvious neglect, the 500 year old church is still beautiful. Pastor Scriba proudly opened up a large hand carved triptych behind the altar. Carved in 1518, it depicted biblical scenes and was hinged so it could be closed when church services were not being held. Of interest, just off the altar, was an entry door above which there was a bust painting of two male figures who were obviously royalty. This we learned was the door through which the emperor, king or duke entered the church.

Upon returning to the rectory, Pastor Scriba disappeared for a moment to a side room to bring back the "Kirchenbuch" record of births for the years 1850 to 1865. On page 147, at entry number 11, the birth record of Anna Louise Therese Roth, Howard's paternal grandmother was entered. It was indeed a very thrilling experience to be looking at a 133 year old record and worth the approximately 7000 miles we had travelled to see it. And, of course, it gave us more surnames to research! Although we had been shown the record of uncle Otto Menzel's birth in the church book record of births earlier in GOTHA at St. Augustine's church, the discovery at MOLSCHLEBEN was the highlight of our trip. This little village, it appeared, had not changed for hundreds of years and still retains its old world charm. It was like being transported back to the Middle Ages.





SANTA BARBARA PRESIDIO CEMETERY BURIALS

The Presidio Register found at the Santa Barbara Mission Archives contains records of 77 burials between 1796 and 1824. The burying ground was located outside the presidio walls near the Chapel. After 1824 burials took place in a cemetery located in the foothills. Spelling of names conforms to those found in the original records. Date denotes burial date.

NOTE: Where "parvulo(a)" was written, it denoted an infant or child up to and including nine years of age. On this list "s/o" or "d/o" will be used to denote "son of" or "daughter of". Where "muger" was written, "w/o" will be used to denote "woman of" or "wife of". A Presidio soldier will be denoted by "(PS)". "h/o" denotes "husband of".

SANTA BARBARA STREETS

- CANON PERDIDO (Kan-yon' Per-dee'-do) Spanish for "lost cannon". So named because of the following incident: Early in the spring of 1848, the American brig, Elizabeth, was wrecked on the coast of Santa Barbara. Among the property saved was a twelve-pound brass cannon, which remained upon the beach long after the remaining property had been removed. Early in the month of May, it disappeared. Apparently it had been stolen by native Californians; at least that representation was made to Governor Mason, who levied a tax of \$500.00 upon the city for its return. The cannon could not be found and the tax was paid only to be refused by the Mexican authorities. Subsequently, a storm exposed the cannon and the memory of this incident was preserved by naming the street that ran past the theater, Canon Perdido--the lost cannon. Unfortunately, the cannon was sold to a junk dealer and removed to San Francisco.
- DE LA GUERRA (Del'-la-Gair'-rah) (g as in game) Was named in honor of Don Pablo de la Guerra, the most prominent grandee during the late Spanish and early AMerican period.

HUNSICKER-ELLISON FAMILY REUNION

An extraordinary 45th consecutive annual Hunsicker-Ellison reunion was held in Red Cloud, Nebraska in August 1990. The group honored the ancestors and descendants of Robert Liggett Hunsiker and his wife Laura Jane Ellison Hunsicker, long residents of Red Cloud. The reunion was extraordinary for it joined the Hunsicker and Ellison families that had been separated for a combined total of 361 years and a distance of 11,000 miles.

Travelling 9,000 miles to the United States for the first time, to attend the reunion were Mrs. Karolina Hunsicker Neumuller of Wolfersheim, Germany and Margot (Mrs. Horst) Witte of Assweiler, Germany. They were accompanied overland by James Burcham of Chicago, a Hunsicker descendant, who was a needed German translator.

Hans Barthell Hunsicker and Hans Thomas Hunsicker were two brothers who lived in the village of Wolfersheim. In 1754, Hans Thomas Hunsicker left his homeland for America on the ship Phoenix and arrived in Philadelphia on 1 October 1754. He brought with him his wife, Anna Gertrauda Brengel Hunsicker, and their eight children.

At the reunion, Karolina tearfully expressed in her native language how pleased she was to be here. She said that it was inconceivable to her how the Hunsickers had come there in the way they did 236 years ago, and through time, had moved this far west, and now they were meeting together. She personally expressed greetings to all the reunion from the Hunsicker kinfolk in Wulfersheim and its neighboring villages, and she extended an invitation for all to visit Wolfersheim, a small village of 500 inhabitants, southwest of Zweibrucken.

Family members came from seven states, and messages were received from others in five more states.

Homer Clifton Parrett, age 87, and his family came 2,000 miles to the reunion from Newburg, Oregon. His grandmother, Martha Ellison Parrett, left Atchison, Kansas to go on The Oregon Trail in 1865 with her parent's family. Now for the first time, 125 years later, the Oregonians traveled back to meet their kinfolk.

Orville Parrett presented his gift of the 1868 Ellison family bible with all of the births and deaths of Ellison family members dating from 1816.

The Hunsicker-Ellison Family Register Supplement, printed in August 1990, was available at the reunion, and a copy was donated to the Webster County Historical Society and Museum at Red Cloud, Nebraska 68970.

In 1991, the reunion will be held in Red Cloud, Nebraska on 18 August.

Although not a genealogist, "Pres" was a member and long-time supporter of our Society. We include excerpts of obituaries from the "Santa Barbara News-Press", the "Los Angeles Times" and the "New York Times".

Preston Cloud, an internationally recognized scientist whose research ranged from the evolution of life on Earth to the study of moon rocks, has died at his Santa Barbara home at age 78. His research took him around the world in search of primitive life forms. His work explored the conditions under which life arose on Earth, and the relationship between emerging life forms and the developing atmosphere.

He coined the term "biogeologist" to describe his specialty. His interests ranged beyond traditional geology into biology, chemistry, and the cosmos, which he melded into a 50-year, multifaceted study of the history of the Earth.

Last October, Andrew Knoll of Harvard University, writing in a volume of the American Journal of Science dedicated to Cloud, said Cloud's "influence on 20th-Century geology and paleontology is incalculable...[His] enduring contribution has been to establish the very way in which we think about early evolution."

During his career, Professor Cloud wrote more than 200 academic papers. He was concerned about the environment and the pressures of population on the Earth, subjects on which he frequently lectured. The most recent of Cloud's books was <u>Oasis in Space: Earth History From</u> the Beginning, published in 1987. A Times reviewer found it "a monumental work of synthesis of the natural history of the Earth."

Cloud was a Research Geologist with the U.S. Geological Survey as well as serving on the faculties of HarvardUniversity, the University of Minnesota, UCLA and UCSB. A research laboratory at the Santa Barbara campus was name for him in 1980.

He was a member of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the Polish Academy of Science. The holder of numerous awards and medals, Cloud was a recipient in 1976 of geology's most prestigious honor, the Penrose Medal of the Geological Society of America.

He was born 26 September in West Upton, Massachusetts, and traced his ancestry to William Cloud who was given land by colonialist William Penn in 1683.

Q: Is there a formula to determine the year of birth from census records?

A: Yes, the date a person was born can be determined through census records within a range of two years. An example in using the 1790 census and search through the 1830, the information can be analyzed.

1790 census	under age 16	- b	1774 to	1790 (16	yr.	time span)
1800	age 16 - 25					time span)
1810	age 26 - 45	- b	1765 to	1784 (19	yr.	time span)
1820	age 45 or over	– b	1775 or	before	-	, ,
1830	age 50 - 60	- b	1770 to	1780 (10	yr.	time span)

From the 1790 census, he could not have been born before 1774. From the 1830 census, he could not have been born after 1780; therefore, the possible birth years for the ancestor is between 1774 and 1780.

To narrow the search, if the census shows a child born 1799, this means he was likely married about 1798. We do not know how old he was when married, but the usual standard in research is four generations to a hundred years. This might indicate he was about 25 years old, but also figure he could have married age the age of 20.

Example: If a man married about 1798, deduct 25 (his age) and the year 1773 comes up. Using his age at 20 years, this indicates he was born 1778. From this information, it appears he could not have been born before 1774 (from 1790 census), nor was he born after 1775 (1820 census).

From this information a new set of possible birth years are determined -1774 to 1775. The time span has been narrowed to two years. It is much easier to search a two year time span of vital records than a 16 year span of time.

BOY SCOUTS 'REDISCOVER' CEMETERY FROM REVOLUTIONARY ERA

A 13-year-old Boy Scout uncovered a forgotten cemetery obscured by trees and brush in the small Maine village of Wayne. James Pickle and members of Boy Scout Troop 650 have removed dense puckerbrush from the wooded graveyard, which holds the remains of at least one Revolutionary War veteran. A wooden sign identifying "Revolutionary Wayne Cemetery" has been erected at the entrance of the path leading to the cemetery.

A check of the Maine State Archives revealed that Isaac Billington a name on one of the headstones - served in the Revolutionary Navy. Billington was born 1758 in Middleborough, Massachusetts, and died in Wayne in 1829. He is buried beside his wife, Rebeccah. The Maine Society of Sons of the American Revolution will dedicate a marker at Billington's grave site. Isaac Billington was a descendant of John Billington, the Mayflower passenger who was hung for murder in 1630.

The Scouts worked on the clearing project for almost a month and for James Pickle, part of the reward will be achieving the status of Eagle Scout, as well as a Bronze Good Citizenship award from the Maine Society of Sons of the American Revolution.

Subtitled: An Introduction to Family History, the booklet has a concise explanation of where to begin and carries on through Note Keeping, Vital Records, Census Records, Research on Location, Maps, Land Records, Probate Records, Court Records, Cemetery Records, Church Records, Newspapers, Periodicals and Compiled Sources, and Military Records. The author also discusses sources for finding immigrant ancestors, records of slaves, the origin of names, help in deciphering handwriting and solving problems. This is a very helpful booklet for new and not so new searchers and at a bargain price.

ELLIS ISLAND: Gateway to America by Lorreto Dennis Szucs, Softbound \$.95, $5\frac{1}{2}$ " x $8\frac{1}{2}$ ", illustrations, 32 pages. Ancestry, Inc.

The author begins her booklet with a brief discussion of immigration to America from the beginning of the country and the earliest laws (1819) and subsequent ones. With the flood of immigrants in the late 19th century, there was need for a facility in which the entrants"could be screened, protected, and filtered slowly into their new culture". Choice of Ellis Island with a condensed history, brief discussions of "Why They Came" and the process for acceptance or rejection, The New Americans and the need for preserving their past leads to "How To" suggestions which can be amplified by the material in DISCOVERING YOUR HERITAGE.



In the center is an order blank for searches wanted with cost indicated. Also included are pink pages on which to record the searches that have been made. The remaining of the 40 page booklet beginning with reference number A 001 to A 170, contain a description of the materials available for search with the cost of each search indicated. It appears that this would be a satisfactory method of getting data from English records.

Unlike our secret ballot, the Poll Books recorded in a given county the names of candidates for whom our predecessors voted, giving a record of the residence and freehold of electors. In some cases, only the name and parish was given, whereas in others there might be occupatiosn and qualifications as well as for whom they voted. Some counties are more complete than others. The general sources and county sources are listed. There are several pages of explanation in the Introduction.

EXAMPLES OF 17th CENTURY HANDWRITING

The following examples of alphabetical letters found in 17th Century English writing were collected by The Society of Genealogists, London, England. This may be an aid in deciphering parish registers, manuscripts, and other documents.

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ODDS AND ENDS

THE CENSUS TAKER

I'm done with my five weeks as a census taker. I couldn't believe how many couples were living together without being married. I'm not a prude either. Most of the couples had a hard time deciding whether they were "roommates" or "unmarried persons". We were supposed to ask for phone numbers in case we forgot to ask a question. They would gladly tell you who they were and their ages, but many refused to give their phone numbers. Make sense out of that! We had to visit a home three times. If you couldn't find them at home, you would ask the neighbors for the people's names. I did that for one family, but the neighbors on both sides didn't know, although the family had lived there for five years. I checked the suburban directories - they weren't listed there either.

If I went to all that trouble to find their names, what happened in the old census? The census taker used to make only one visit, and if your ancestor wasn't at home, their name would have been left off. And you probably wondered what happened to your great grandfather in the 1860 census--now you know! From W.PA Gen.Soc., March 1991

Request for replacement of a headstone should be made in writing by a family member or other responsible person. The request should state the condition of the headstone and the request mailed to: Director, Monument Service (42)



SANTA BARBARA COUNTY

One of California's 27 original counties. While the county was actually created in 1850, the history of the area dates back to 1542. In that year Juan Cabrillo discovered the Santa Barbara Channel and later, according to legend, crossed to San Miguel Island where he died and was buried. A second Spanish explorer, Sebastian Vizcaino, entered the channel on the Feast Day of Saint Barbara in 1602, and named the area accordingly. Fr. Fermin Francisco de Lasuen founded the Santa Barbara mission in 1786. Santa Barbara Royal Presidio, established April 21, 1782, by Fr. Junipero Serra, was the last of four royal presidios in Alta California - San Diego, Monterey, San Francisco, and Santa Barbara. Santa Barbara had all three Spanish forms - Presidio representing the military, Pueblo, the civil, and Mission, the religious. In 1873, Ventura County was established from the southern portion of the original Santa Barbara area.
