HISTORY.

A Reminiscence of the Past.

Famous Ground from Which Started The Two Greatest Events in Our City.

Yesterday forenoon as some workmen were engaged in grading the lot on Canon Perdido street, near Santa Parbara, the plow turned up two badly decayed coffins—a woman's and a child's. The coffins were made roughly of a kind of hard tough wood probably brought from the Sandwich Islands as was all of the lumber in those days. On that of the supposed woman's were the initials "M. A. C."; made by driving nails or tacks into the wood. From the length of time elapsed since burial it is hardly possible to state positively whose coffin this is. Doubtless it was one of the Carrillo family's. It is quite possible that this coffin may have been buried a full hundred years as this was the first burying ground in this city. Father Vila on being informed of the fact ordered all work to cease and will have the remains properly exhumed and reburied.

This bit of ground is historic. Events of the greatest moment to this city took place here. This lot was originally a part of the old Presidio and on this particular spot was erected the first Santa Barbara home of the Mission Fathers. It was on this spot that Father Junipero began in Santa Barbara his labors of evangelization, successful probably even beyond his own expectations. From this spot, then, began the work of civilization in this particular part of the State. Wonderful work indeed!

At that time there were presidios in San Diego, Monterey and San Francisco. This particular military post was a square surrounded by a high wall of adobe, the top of which was protected by tiles. The commandant's house (a part even now standing opposite on Santa Barbara street) was in the enclosure. Here, too, was the chapel around and under which were buried such of the converted people who died at that time. The remains found yesterday are probably of that number.

This spot is historic more than any other place in Santa Barbara. It was here that Fremont first raised the American flag in 1846. There was no flagstaff then but Commodore Stockton gave Fremont a studding-sail boom from the frigate Congress then in this port. It was about forty feet long and General Fremont had it raised in the center of the Presidio.

Thus from the point also took place the second greatest event in Santa Barbara's history—the raising of the American flag and the annexation of the city to the United States. The next flagstaff raised in this city was on State street, opposite St. Charles Hotel. In April, 1847, Capt. Henry Carnes, with his own hands, raised the beautiful garrison flag. It was 20 x 40 feet and was the second United States flag in this city.

What's in a Name? New Ruling Allows More Freedom in the Choice of Names Within Marriage

On Thursday (October 28, 1993), the Bundestag lifted the requirement that married couples must have the same surname. According to the new regulation, each partner may keep his or her own name if they do not choose to use either the given name of the husband or wife as a joint family name. Joint double (hyphenated) names will no longer be possible; however, a partner whose name is not used as the joint name can place it before or after the married name, creating a double, but not hyphenated, name.

The fact that the lawmakers would still prefer that married couples use same name is evident in the legislation, which says that couples "should" have the same name, though they are no longer legally required to do so. They now have five years after the date of marriage to decide this important question. Only their two names are eligible; names assumed during previous marriages may not be used. If there is no family name, children may be given either the father's or the mother's name. As well, in a transitional one-year arrangement, partners in already-existing marriages can apply for a name change under the terms of the new law.

Originally, the law stated that a married couple had to live under one name. In 1991, the Federal Constitutional Court in Karlsruhe (Baden-Wurttemberg) ruled that a married couple could assume either his or her name, or they could construct a double name, but if they were unable to reach a consensus, women were obliged to take their husband's name. An interim ruling allowed each partner to keep their given name if they could not reach an agreement. Klaus Kinkel, now the Foreign Minister, at that time the Minister of Justice, first proposed an abolishment of single-name marriage in 1991.

Current Minister of Justice Sabine Leutheusser-Schnarrenberger welcomed the new ruling, saying that it "frees people from an unnecessary obligation. It is another step towards equality before the law." The new legislation came about after considerable wrangling among the parties.

While the Christian Democratic Union and Christian Social Union held fast to the principle of "one couple, one name," the Social Democrats sought a liberal ruling that would include the choice of a double name, which, according to the SPD, allows both the continuance of the tradition of a joint name and equal representation of both partners. Voices from within the Free Democrats opposed double (hyphenated) names, however, because they can grow to unmanageable proportions within a generation or two.



THE PFALZ OR PALATION OR WHAT IS IT?

Palatium, Comes Palatinus, Pfalzyrafschift bei Rhein, Pfalentz, Rurpfalz, Oberpfalz-untere Pfalz, Rheinpfalz, Departement Mon Tonnere, Bayerischer Bheinkreis, Pfalz. By no means the complete list of names covering a period of over 1000 years of history.

The Roman Emperor, Caesar Augustus, had a residence in the territory called Roman Palatinate, and his residence was called the Palatium. Emperors and Kings of the middle ages built their palaces here and their governors or overseers received the title of Pfalzgraf (Count Palatine). Romand won Staufen, half-brother of Frederick I, Barbasrossa, became Pfalzgraf in 1156, as a reward for service in war.

This strip of land along the Rhein is not called after the people living there, like Bavaria, nor does it carry the name of a famous castle such, as Murttemberg; it received the name of an office, a title, The Pfalzgraf So, in the history of the Pfalz the story of the Pfalzgrafen and the year 1156 are very important, not merely the small piece of land called the Pfalz on the left bank of the Rhein. Another important date was 925, when King Henry I brought Lotharingia into the East Frankish German Kingdom. The results during the next 700 years were: The middle Rheinland, eastern border of the Roman territory and later of the Kingdom of the Franks, became the "Binnenland und Herzstuck" (Interior and heartland) of the kingdom, its center of gravity until the 14th century.

The Emperors and Kings, Salien as well as Staufer, rather than the counts Palatine were responsible for this focus on the Pfalz. In 1024 Konrad II became the heir of Henry II. Konrad was born in Worms, was Duke of Rheinfranken, Count of Speyer, and his ancestral castle was Stammburg at Limburg and Bad Durkheim. The power of the Salien family was also established on the Rhein. The impulse which made Konrad II's reign one of the most brilliant of the middle ages went out from the Rhein. The idea of empire, however, was cut short; the rulers of the individual territories hung onto autonomy for themselves. Nevertheless, the Land on the Rhein remained bound to the history of the Empire.

In 1214 Frederick II granted the office of Count Palatine to Duke Ludwig I of Bavari. The House of Wittelsbach retained ties to this land on the Rhein for 600 years, far longer than the hundred years that the Pfalz was part of Bavaira.

According to the Treaty of Pavia of 1329, the Count Palatine became the Lord of his own territory, Count Palatine of the Rhein, ruler of Pfalentz. He was no longer merely the appointee of the Emperor or King, The Pfalz ruler should be the eldest son of a branch of the Wittelsbach family of Bavaria. His territory consisted of the lower Pfalz beside the Rhein and the upper Pfalz between Regensburg and Pichtelbegbirge.

Ruprecht I, loyal to the Emperor and therefore remembered to his advantage, was awarded the Privileges of the Golden Bullin 1356: He became Emperor's "Apple Carrier", by vacancy the Empire's administrator as well as first magistrate of the Frankish Rights in the Land . Most important of all, however, he received the Electorship.

The history of this Electorate of the Pfalz is a history of partition and inheritance disputes. For example:

In 1410 Ruprecht II died, the Pfalz with the privileges of the Golden Bull was divided into four parts— Rurpfalz, Oberpfalz, Zweibrucken-Simmern and Mosbach.

In 1448 the Oberpfalz line died out and Mosbach inherited territory and rights;

In 1449, when the Mosbach line died out, Rurpfalz was again in possesion of the entire territory.

Surrounding Murpfalz, and in the midst of it as well, were parcels of independent territory: the Imperial Cities and Bishoprics, 44 principalities in all, until Napoleon changed the map. But Napoleon's measures will be discussed later.

In 1608 Elector Frederick IV of the Palatinate made a treaty with the other Protestant princes, The Protestant Union. The Catholics promptly retaliated by forming the Catholic League. When Fredrick V, with his usual ineptitude, accepted his election as King of Rohemia in 1619, he thrust the Palatinate, by opposing the Babsburgs, into the Thirty Years War. The Pfalz was plundered by hordes, besieged by armies, burned and pillaged.

From that time, for the next 200 years, France was a constant source of oppression. The Pfalz was located on the border of the German Empire, which no longer existed as a real force. In the Peace of Munster of 1648 France became the protectorate for the Alsatian imperial cities. In the next fifty years France sent a constant flow of troops into the Pfalz. There was scarcely a village, no piece of land, without a pall of smoke over it. During the 17th century the citizens of the Pfalz were ready to give up. Their land was ruined, scarcely one stone remained on another, and those that did were black with smoke. Elector Karl Ludwig was being compelled to fight against the Empire when he died in 1680. The slogan of the time was "Devetation Reumion." The "Sun King," Louis XTV, claimed that he should have the dispostion of the inheritance because Liselotte, sister of Rarl Ludwig and wife of a brother of his. In the resulting war the Pfalz was again the wishbone between France and Germany. The military results of the disturbance were expectedly slight; the political consequences were more lasting. It was nothing new, that in the progress of a war this or that locality would go up in flames; what was new was that a district was methodically, over a period of time, reduced to rubble and ashes. According to their own records, the French commanders were aware of the suspicious nature of this offense. Many of them carried out the commands to destroy only under protest. On the German side it was recognized in the 18th century, but the National feeling of the 19th and 20th centuries overlooked the blame. They saw only Frenchmen in the troops of Louis XIV, and identified them with Frenchmen of their own time.

In the The War of the Spanish Succession the Palatinate was again used as troop staging ground, for friend and foe alike. Damage was done by both. And then, as a hundred years previously, the right of Confession was disputed. Article IV of the Peace of Rijswik (1697) stated that the territories occupied by France, which had become Catholic, must remain Catholic. A Catholic Elector, Johann Wilhelm, secured the clause. After much argument the result was that, in villages which had two churches, one should be Catholic and the other protestant. If there was only one church, the choir belonged to the Catholics and the Protestants got the nave. Some of these joint churches are still in existence.

In Dusseldorf the flamboyant Jan Wilhelm (Palatine Elector 1690-1716) had to give way before the popular, corpulent Karl Fhillipp (Kurfurst 1716-1742). Karl Theodor was the Culture minister of the Palatinate history. He went to Munich in 1777. Bavaria and the Palatinate, separated since 1329, againe had a common ruler. The Palatines saw little of him.

What did Napoleon, the French Revolutionaries, and the "Sun King" have in common ? Interest in the Rhein. Secretly he worked through Prussia (1795) and Austria (1798) and then in 1801 he made his acquistion official. The part of the Palatinate on the right of the Rhein, the Hishopric of Speyer and the Kurpfalz were joined to Baden; the portion on the left became the French Department Mont Tonnerre; the southern part was added to Bas-Rein. Were the Palatines happy to become French? The fees were heavy, compulsory military service was long and hard. One had to give his all, must do what was required; for which the Palatines felt no enthusiasm. But why? "Equality and Liberty" were worth something, but what could they do with "Fraternity"? Napoleon's new laws were put into effect. The Palatinate, without doing anything, became a progressive state, not expected of a kingdom on the right of the Rhein.

This compulsory progress left the Palatinate under Bavarian rule. Through the land shuffling in 1816, Bavaria again received the Pfalz, while it had to give up Saziburg as well as Inn and Hausruckviertl to the Austrians. It was now called Bavarian Rheinkreis. In 1838 Ludwig I changed the name to Pfalz. And that is the Pfalz of today (less 440 square kilometers of Saarland set up by the Treaty of Versaille.) A borderland that rebelled in 1832 and again in 1848/1849, that from the first World War to 1930 was a French possession, and in 1945 was restored its identity.

IGI - 1993 COMPUTER EDITION A COMMENTARY BY JANICE CLOUD

In late November 1993, a new edition of the I(nternational) G(enealogical) I(ndex) was installed on the Family Search computer system at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. (CD versions should be reaching local Family History Centers soon.) The computer edition represents an increase of some 14 to 16 million names over the microfiche edition which was updated in 1992. In total, this 1993 IGI is said to contain over 200 million names from more than 90 countries.

There are some major differences between this edition and the 1988 CD edition, as well as substantial differences between this new computer version and the fiche edition that was produced in 1992.

For those of you not familiar with this important genealogical finding-aid, the IGI is comprised of names (arranged alphabetically & chronologically by geographic area) extracted from vital records of births, christenings or marriages, as well as "patron-submitted" entries.

On to the changes. The CD version now is divided into three different "searches." Marriages are no longer interfiled with christenings, but must be searched under a separate "marriage" category. A search by "parents" is also available on the CD version (as it was earlier) but is not possible on the fiche version. As before, one can search by the exact "name" or by similar sounding names. However, the new "phonetic" groupings contain many changes.

If one does not now specify "Cloud" as the exact spelling of the surname on the CD version, it now comes grouped and intermingled with: Cloud, Cloude, Clout, Cloute, McCloud, Mac Cloud, Cloet, Cloete, Cloed, Kloete, Clowdus, Clowdes, Cloutz and Clouts.

The most significant and disorienting change, however, is a new grouping of given names on the computer. (A release by LDS acknowledges that this operation is not yet refined--an understatement, in my opinion.) Abbreviated spellings as well as two-part names are now interfiled in chronological order. Therefore, one will now find: William b. 1635, Wm. b 1637, William b. 1641, William Allen b. 1643, Willm b. 1645, William b. 1651 in sequence. Catherine, Katheine and Kathie are all retrieved under any spelling of Catherine. Ann, Anne, Anna, Ann Elizabeth, and Mrs. Anne are all interfiled chronologically without regard to spelling. (The English portion of the IGI dumps Hannah in with Ann, but the U.S. section does not yet contain this subtlety.) Then, a beginning has been made on the interfiling of nicknames or diminutives with the main spelling of the name. Therefore, Betty, Betsy, Eliz., Elizabeth Allen and Elizabetha are all interfiled chronologically under Elizabeth. Betsy is no longer found under "B"! (Bessie and Bessey retain a separate listing in the U.S. section, but are grouped with Elizabeth in the English section. Lizzie, however, gets her own entry under "L".) For some reason (possibly programmer error), Barthena follows Bernard. (And, in the English section, don't look for Helen under "H" any more, it is now interfiled with Ellen under Eleanor while the U.S. version gives each of these names separate entries.)

I had heard originally that in combining Lottie under Charlotte the programmers outdid themselves. This variation caused the masculine name of "Lot" to be

grouped with Charlotte! However, they must have caught that one, because in the Cloud listings, Lot is preceded by Lurena and followed by Lewis. (You're on your own to explain that one!) The release says that Bill, Billy and Willie are not yet retrieved with William. A further note says that "names previously brought together may not be brought together now." Cross your fingers. One has to see this version to believe it.

A new wrinkle in the marriage search is that one supposedly can now search not only for Isaac Cloud married to Sarah, but can also type in Sarah Cloud (using her married name) who married an Isaac to locate the marriage record. This type of search is referred to as a "filter." Other filters can limit the search to certain states, dates, spelling, etc. An interesting note says, "Each time you add an additional filter, the search will take longer and may not retrieve all the possible entries in the time period allotted by the computer." It doesn't appear that being fleet of finger will solve this problem. Therefore, user beware!

Don't throw away your old copies. Some 3 to 5 million names that were in the 1988 IGI are not in the 1992 and later editions. The reason given is that all those entries from the church's extraction program that had been added to the file with the term "cleared" but had never yet been actually sent to an LDS temple were withdrawn from this file and placed in another file. The names withdrawn should eventually be added back to the index when LDS ordinance work is completed.

So, for fun and adventure try the new IGI. It's better than a crossword puzzle!

Her name is Barbara Romero, and she is the grandaughter of my father's sister, Minnie Baker. That makes her and her sister, Pat Prinslow of Oxnard, my cousins once removed.

We are also researching the name Hinton, my father's maternal side, so we exchanged the family material we already had and are sharing any new facts we receive. The bonanza for me is that I knew very little about my grandmother, Maria Hinton Mounts, only that her father was a circuit rider preacher. Now I have more information on her than on the Mounts side. I knew most of my Mounts aunts, uncles and cousins personally as they either lived in California or came to visit.

This lucky day makes my research so much easier, and it is so good to have young minds to work with.

SEARCHING FOR HOMESTEAD PAPERS

- Secure the legal description of the land, which includes the township, section, range, and legal subdivision from the Recorder of the county in which the land is located.
- Send this description to the Bureau of Land Management office 2. for the state in question, requesting a copy of the Patent. There is a charge for the copy of the Patent. Refer to the addresses below.
- 3. After receiving a copy of the Patent, you can obtain the Homestead papers by writing to the National Archives and Records Service, 8th and Pennsylvania Avenue, NW, Washington, DC 20408. Include the name of the person filing the Patent, and the land office of issuance. When the record is found at the Archives, they will bill you. Upon receipt of your payment, the Archives will send the papers. These papers often include valuable information, such as: a copy of a naturalization record, occupation, address, names of witnesses to the homestead proofs, and other interesting information.

Estray Animals of Vergennes Township, Jackson County, Illinois, 1849-1869 and assorted documents. By Karen F. Grubb. 1993. Paper 8 1/2 x 11, 53 pp. \$13.00. Order from author, P.O. Box 89, DeKalb, Il 60115.

This name indexed compilation is a record book of stray animals, which gives the oath of the finder and, sometimes, his place of residence. The preface includes a brief history and description of earmarkings used to identify animals. Also included are membership lists of the Vigilante Society of Vergennes and Wolf Scalp Bounty Hunters from the late 1860s, two estate bills, records of the compiler, from 1853 and 1880, listing many old family names of the county, as well as, a few miscellaneous letters and poems.

One excerpt from the estray records shows: "one bay mare, 15 hands high, 4 years old past, has the appearance of being burnt for the bighead, her right hip knocked down has the appearance of being shot in it and has not got well yet ... appraised at forty dollars" — August 25, 1860. From the 1853 sale bill of an estate, a rocking chair sold for \$1.25, a red cow and yearling for \$19.25 and a cider mill and press for \$5.00.

The index lists about 170 names.

Ancestors of Sir Frances Bryan (d. 1550). By T.A. Fuller. 1993 Paperbound, 134 pp. Order from Heritage Books, 1540 E. Pointer Ridge Place, Bowie, MD 20716. Phone (301) 390 - 7709.

This compilation, some of it from 4th hand sources, is limited to the 12 generations before 1550. It is logically arranged. It uses Personal Ancestral File (PAF) computer generated charts and lists, including a 22 page "Pedigree Chart" amd a 9 page "Index of Names". There are easily understood explanatory illustrations of the charts and lists, as well as, clear explanations of the abbreviations used throughout the book. Has a nice clean format.

Though its contents may be user friendly, the book's binding is not! This reviewer managed to separate the wrap-around cover from the book's backbone during a mere one time skim reading of it.

Sir Frances Bryan was descended from Edward III, and thus from preceding kings and queens of England, France and other countries, from William I the Conqueror, and from Charlemagne. And, if the compiled information is correct, he was descended from at least eleven Sureties for the Magna Carta. The eight page list of references is impressive: The Magna Carta, by Wurts, Ancestral Roots of Sixty Colonists Who Came to New England between 1623 and 1650 by Weis, The Complete Peerage by G. E. Cockayne, William the Conqueror by Hilaire Belloc. and the list is not limited to books mentioned in the subject manuscript but is a broader listing of materials which the author thinks may prove valuable to researchers.

This attractively bound book with teal blue cover and gold lettering contains, in addition to the title and author, a complete listing on the spine of the main surnames covered within. Three ancestry charts of Emily Jane Angell are included on the inside front cover and repeated on the inside of the back cover.

The genealogy is presented in the Record format used by the NEHGS and is arranged by alphabetized surname chapters which are: Adams, Angell, Ashton, Barnes, Beard, Beckwith, Boyes, Briant, Burns, Cargill, Cochran, Gregg, Hempstead, Hogg, Inman, Johnson, Lee, Mowry, Olney, Smith, Strickland, Waller, Way, Williams, Wolterton and Young. Some forty photographs, chiefly of gravestones and property maps, are to be found throughout the book and add to its visual interest. The author, Dean Crawford Smith, and editor, Melinde Lutz Sanborn, were recipients of the Donald Lines Jacobus Award from the American Society of Genealogists.

This is an extremely thorough work which is well documented with primary sources and it should be useful to those searching the surnames it covers. It is of interest to note that the author, Dean Crawford Smith, and his wife are members of our Society and the editor, Melinde Lutz Sanborn, is a relative of Lillian Mann Fish, one of our longtime past members. This book is a companion to Mr. Smith's book on his Ordway line which can be found in the Society library.

Are you looking for family in Delaware and Maryland? Make sure you look at this book - because it can unlock some clues for you. Separated first by state, this book contains over 800 titles concerning families from Maryland and Delaware (many of these families had ties to other states as well). You have the choice to find your surname in the index at the back of the book, or to go through the alphabetically listed surname list under each state chapter. When you find the surname that you are interested in, there will be listed any books or family histories that have that surname, as well as publishing information and date. Allied family names which are included in the book or family history titles can be found in the cross-index. As a bonus, at the end of each state chapter are the names and addresses of over 100 local genealogical and historical societies from that state. For a future edition, it would be nice to see a state map with the counties marked on it for reference. However, this is a fine and useful bibliography for all researchers.


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


SANTA BARBARA COUNTY

One of California's 27 original counties. While the county was actually created in 1850, the history of the area dates back to 1542. In that year Juan Cabrillo discovered the Santa Barbara Channel and later, according to legend, crossed to San Miguel Island where he died and was buried. A second Spanish explorer, Sebastian Vizcaino, entered the channel on the Feast Day of Saint Barbara in 1602, and named the area accordingly. Fr. Fermin Francisco de Lasuen founded the Santa Barbara mission in 1786. Santa Barbara Royal Presidio, established April 21, 1782, by Fr. Junipero Serra, was the last of four royal presidios in Alta California - San Diego, Monterey, San Francisco, and Santa Barbara. Santa Barbara had all three Spanish forms - Presidio representing the military, Pueblo, the civil, and Mission, the religious. In 1873, Ventura County was established from the southern portion of the original Santa Barbara area.
