

Past Presidents

THE HOME OF ISAAC J. SPARKS

Isaac J. Sparks of Maine, was an advenurous American and a member of the EWING YOUNG trapping party, who came overland to California in 1832. Sparks settled in Santa Barbara and became a prominent merchant, conducting business in an adobe store located at the northwest corner of State and Canon Perdido streets. His one story adobe residence was located to the rear of the premises. He was the first man who held the appointment of postmaster in Santa Barbara and is remembered as a sea otter hunter, soldier and ranchero. Captain Sparks later built a two-story brick home near the northwest corner of State and Montecito streets, which was a show place for many years with its rare trees and shrubs. Later it was the Park Hotel.

BALLOU BIBLE

For thirty years, Bess Zahniser lived in a rental on Fig Avenue owned by Alma Thompson. Shortly before her death on 5 April 1994, she presented her family bible to the Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society. Numerous pages have been filled with notations of births, deaths and marriages and loose pages containing assorted mementoes have been inserted.

In June 1988, we included an accounting of the historical information contained in this bible (Vol 14, No 2). No comments or queries were received following publication of this issue. We have recently learned that Ms. Zahniser's ancestors were located in Orange and Ulster Counties in New York. with the hope that members of the genealogical societies of those counties may know of descendants of this family that we publish again a portion of the data therein.

 - "Lydia Ballou wife of E. S. Ballou dide November the 10 1861 in the 56 year and six month and 16 days old. Gerard Mish Branch Co.
 - "Emon S. Ballou, Sr. died Oct 27th 1879 aged 81 yrs 4 months and one day. Elbridge Oceana Co. Mich."

Also included are several handwritten pages of notations, a prayer card for John B. Westbrook, who died March 9, 1930, age 57 years, and a picture of Emon S. Ballou.

HOOSIER ROOTS

How did the name Hoosier come to be applied to the people of Indiana? Some fourteen explanations of the origin of the term have been offered. In "The Hoosiers," Meredith Nelson discussed most of them.

The earliest record of the use of the word is thought to be John Finley's poem, "The Hoosier's Nest," printed in the Indianapolis Journal, January 1, 1830. It was argued that the word must have been well known at that time or Finley would not have used it with no trace of doubt that it would be understood. Such authorities as Governor Wright and the Indiana historian, O. H. Smith, were convinced that Hoosier is a corruption of the pioneer greeting, "Who's Here?" Sulgrove, another writer of Indiana history, alluded to the explanation that the word is a development from husher, a term given in pioneer times to a good fighter who was able to hush his adversaries, and was applied to "greenies from the New Purchase" who went down to the Ohio river to work, and fought laborers from Kentucky.

Some report that it is a mispronunciation of hussar popularized by a Polish colonel who lectured through the state in the early days. It presumes that young Indiana men were captivated by the hussars as pictured by the lecturer, and took the name and pronunciation upon themselves. Hoosier was a family name heard along the river, and another explanation is that the fondness of Indiana people for cookies made by a Louisville baker named Hoosier gained them the distinction of being called "Hoosier's customers," and finally, Hoosiers.

In the Carolinas, Virginia, Kentucky and Missouri, a rough country man is called a hoosier without reference to Indiana, and it is thought by some that the name can be traced to a time earlier than the opening of the Northwest Territory.

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MILK SICKNESS

Among the many obscure diseases, it is doubtful if one has been more shrouded in mystery than was Milk Sickness. The disease was unknown in Europe or any other continent. It occurred only in North America.

White Snakeroot is a shade living plant found throughout Indiana. It is commonly seen growing on road sides and in damp open areas or on the shaded north side of ridges. The plant is also found in most parts of the western half of Ohio and the wooded parts of Illinois. These three states probably had the wooded parts of the weed and probably do so today. By definition, mild sickness is poisoning by milk from cows that definition, mild sickness is poisoning by settlers in the Mdiwest came into contact with the sickness.

In the fall of 1818, Nancy Lincoln, Abraham Lincoln's mother, died as milk sickness struck the Little Pigeon Creek settlement. The illness was most common in dry years when cows wandered from poor pastures to the woods in search of food. In wandered from poor pastures to the woods in search of food. In man, the symptoms are loss of appetite, listlessness, weakness, vague pains, muscle stiffness, vomiting, abdominal discomfort, vague pains, muscle stiffness, vomiting, abdominal discomfort, severe constipation, bad breath, and finally coma. Recovery is slow and may never be complete. But more often an attack is slow and so it was for Nancy Hanks Lincoln. She died 5 October 1818.

While milk sickness usually develops when man or animal eats the plant, the sickness can also occur if one eats heavily of the flesh of an animal the has died of severe Whit Snakeroot poisoning.

Within the present century persons have suffered and died from milk sickness in parts of Indiana, Ohio and Illinois. It is written that more than half of the deaths that occurred early in the 19th century in Dubois County, Indiana were caused by milk sickness.

In the library of the Surgeon General in Washington, D.C. are some 200 articles pertaining to milk sickness, many of them in medical journals. Until the present century few people, including physicians knew much of the sickness.

Milk Sickness is more prevelant in late summer (the plants are then in full bloom, growing to a height of 18 to 48 inches) and



early fall, but some cases have also occurred in the winter and early summer.

In time, as more woodlands were cleared, cattle had adequate pasture even in dry weather. As a result, the incidence of the disease tappered off. Today, the mixing of milk from several cows at the dairy further reduces the chance of milksickness.

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ANOTHER LOOK AT OUR HEROES


SAMUEL ADAMS (1722-1803): After squandering an inheritance, ruining his father's brewery business and failing as a tax collector, this Adams, undoubtedly the most fiery, was a great rabble-rouser. Always a step ahead of arrest or debtor's prison, he was the most radical of the patriots and the chief architect of the Boston Tea Party. He was a signer of the Declaration and faded from the national scene after the War. He left public fame to his younger cousin, John Adams.

NATHAN HALE (1755-1776): A Connecticut school teacher, Hale saw no action in Washington's Army until he volunteered to spy on the British. He was recognized by a Tory relative and turned in. When he was arrested by the British, he was in civilian clothing and carrying maps showing British troop positions. After confessing he was hanged, becoming an early Martyr to the rebel cause. His famous last words have never been documented and are probably Revolutionary myth.

PAUL REVERE (1735-1818): Despite his immortal ride to Lexington, he war record was tarnished. He was not commissioned by Congress and served out the war in a militia unit. In one of his few actions, he was ordered to lead troops against the British at Penobscot, but, instead, marched his men back to Boston when American ships failed to engage the British. He was relieved of his command and accused of cowardice, but acquitted by a court in 1782.

This helpful volume, in addition to the deceased's name and date of death, provides the following information: where the reported place of birth is different from the local county, the place of birth is stated; where possible the cause of death is given; parenthetical entries following parents' names indicate the reported place of the parents' birth; parenthetical entries following the informant's name indicate place of residence.

Consider the entry for Elizabeth Gray who died in 1917. Her birthdate is given as 12 Nov. 1845 and her parents listed as Mark Montieth and Jane Page. This 20th century death record provides important family data for a period prior to 1850 that may be difficult or impossible to discover from other extant sources.

An every-name index further enhances this volume. Try it. You may discover more kin than you ever knew of in Sullivan County.

The entries in this book are basically a listing of all Boston taxpayers for the year 1821. "The list includes the names of every one of the more than nine thousand taxpayers; the eight thousand different property owners; several thousand tenants by name and many more by reference; and an accounting of all ten thousand poll taxes. Valuations of both real estate and personal estates together with tenant/landlord relationships give an intimate view of the economic and social organization of the town."

Ten interesting examples in the Introduction illustrate just how much information can be reconstructed about individuals and business firms using the eleven columns of data reproduced here. The every-name index contains some 20,000 entries and facilitates the locating of additional names within entries.

Non-property-owning city-dwellers often prove elusive to family historians. This volume helps overcome that stumbling block.

Seneca County, Ohio is situated a few miles south of the western end of Lake Erie and was an area through which many people passed on their way West. These 2 volumes have omitted the first 184 pages of the original edition which covered the "History of the Northwest Territory" and the "History of the State of Ohio". However, the remaining 1019 pages give a wealth of Information. The first part covers the archeology of the county, the Indian population, the pioneers with their societies and early government, the military history with rolls of the soldiers in the Civil War and many other historical facts in quite great detail. A second part gives records of each township with detailed information on businesses, churches, schools, cemeteries and officers of the towns. The third section, which is the entire second volume, is filled with biographies of the pioneers and leading citizens, often with portraits.

This is a valuable source book for anyone whose ancestors lived in this region or who might have passed through it on their way West. At the time that the books originally were published people were living who knew the early settlers or were their immediate descendants.. It is well indexed and illustrated.

A comprehensive listing of printed genealogies and family histories in major library collections across the U.S. Most of the works covered can be found at the Library of Congress, the National Genealogical Society Library (NGS) or in the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) Library. Also included is a listing of books from more than 15 historical association and public libraries from Massachusetts to California, including the Allen County Public Library at Fort Wayne, Indiana and the San Francisco Public Library. Each listing is followed by the initials of the Library or libraries where the genealogy or family history is located. Many of the books deal with multiple families, some with non-Carolina roots.

Over 1400 surnames of families who have some connection to the Carolinas are referenced in the cross-reference of family names given in titles and accompanying descriptive statements recorded in the bibliography. In addition to a separate bibliography of titles on microfilm at the Library of Congress, there is a supplemental Carolina family history and genealogical sources that can be found at the Library of Congress.

The Friendly Virginians: America's First Quakers. By Jay Worrall, Jr. 1994. Hardcover, 590 pp. \$29.95 + \$3.50 shipping. Iberian Publishing Co., 1-800-394-8634, 548 Cedar Creek Drive, Athens, GA 30605-3408.

Quakers first arrived in Virginia about 1655, some 27 years before the establishment of Quaker settlements in Pennsylvania (1682). From this period to the present, Mr. Worrall traces the progress of the faith through the Virginia Monthly Meetings. The account is rich with anecdote and detail which hold the reader's interest. Consider one Thomas Harris, a respectable married farmer of Cedar Creek Meeting. At age 32 in 1792, Thomas felt that he had received divine inspiration to stroll about "stark naked" on the public streets. Despite whippings, jail terms and a stint in the Hospital for Lunaticks in Williamsburg, Thomas continued the practice till his death at age 72.

Effects of pacifism and struggles over slavery are detailed as they applied to the Virginia Meetings. Schisms and changes in philosophy are outlined. But though views of some issues had changed, the 1988 edition of Faith and Practice, the distillation of the Quaker faith, begins with the admonition of Quaker elders gathered at Balby, Yorkshire in 1656:

Dearly beloved Friends, these things we do not lay upon you as a rule or form to walk by, but that all, with the measure of light which is pure and holy, may be guided; and so in the Light walking and abiding, these things may be fulfilled in the Spirit, not from the letter, for the letter killeth while the Spirit giveth life.

OUTLINE OF HESSIAN HISTORY

Although they were all part of the Holy Roman Empire of the German nation, the individual states had very diverse histories. Sometimes they were allied in conflict with neighboring countries and then again allied with foreign neighboring states against a German power. At one time there were 378 independent sovereign states, some of them no larger than free cities. It took Napoleon to reduce the number, and two world wars to eliminate the divisions.

Hesse, starting out as one state, was divided into four, consolidated into two, which became part of a united country. Boundaries were often changed; it must have been very confusing for the citizens.

LIBRARY RESEARCH

Genealogical libraries hold a wealth of information for the researcher. With shelves of books, card catalogs, microfilm readers and possibly computerized indexes, one may be intimidated in an unfamiliar library. Here are several tips to make the best use of your library visit.

Write, or phone ahead to inquire about the location, hours of operation, holiday closures, access to collection (open vs. closed stacks), photocopy fees, availability of change machines, and special collections. Most libraries will mail a library brochure to answer most of your questions. Be sure to include a SASE (self-addressed, stamped envelope).

Do your homework ahead of time. Organize materials needed to research. Plan to keep a log of what was searched and date of search. Later, you may need to look again for additional information.

Once at the library, ask for a tour of the facilities. Having an overview of the library's collections will save precious time in locating materials.

Plan enough time for adequate research and photocopying. Don't expect to find a family history already in print, just waiting for you on the shelf.

Be sure and take enough coins for the photocopy/microfilm printer machines. If not convenient to carry heavy rolls of coins in your luggage, a local bank will exchange paper money for coins.

Remember to have enough space in your luggage to take home all the photocopies found in your search.





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SANTA BARBARA COUNTY

One of California's 27 original counties. While the county was actually created in 1850, the history of the area dates back to 1542. In that year Juan Cabrillo discovered the Santa Barbara Channel and later, according to legend, crossed to San Miguel Island where he died and was buried. A second Spanish explorer, Sebastian Vizcaino, entered the channel on the Feast Day of Saint Barbara in 1602, and named the area accordingly. Fr. Fermin Francisco de Lasuen founded the Santa Barbara mission in 1786. Santa Barbara Royal Presidio, established April 21, 1782, by Fr. Junipero Serra, was the last of four royal presidios in Alta California - San Diego, Monterey, San Francisco, and Santa Barbara. Santa Barbara had all three Spanish forms - Presidio representing the military, Pueblo, the civil, and Mission, the religious. In 1873, Ventura County was established from the southern portion of the original Santa Barbara area.

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
