Historic Navy Records Destroyed

Washington, D.C.-- Naval Research Laboratory records that "chronicle some of the most significant technical achievements in the 20th century" were inadvertently destroyed at the National Archives. They were "pulped beyond recognition," the Archives staff said. The Archives personnel and the Navy administrators blamed each other.

Fed into the pulper sometime last summer were 4,200 scientific notebooks and 600 boxes of correspondence and technical memos. Among the lost records were the correspondence of American pioneers in high frequency radio, work of the inventors of radar "and war records of the application of these technologies in the campaigns against Nazi Germany and Imperial Japan."

Rocks • Crilly/Creely

I'm looking for descendants, if any, of 5 children who left Ireland for California, place unknown, sometime between 1856, when their mother died, and 1861.

Their father had previously gone to England and not returned and they were being cared for by their grandparents. They are the children of Jack Rocks, and (first name unknown) Crilly/Creely, daughter of William or James Crilly/Creely and his wife Sarah. They are from the townland of Clady More on the Earl of Charlemont's estate in County Armagh near the town of Keady, the civil parish of Kilcooney, RC parish Ballymacnabb.

The youngest child was Ann Rocks, and there was at least one son.

Found in a local antique shop in Summerland, California (still on sale there), a 1859 Currier and Ives Family Registry. I'm hoping to unite any descendant with this family artifact—next best thing to the family bible.

Information recorded on it:

Parents were Daniel Pudedy, b. 10 Dec 1823 (poss. Canton Granbünden Schweiz), wife Maria (Margutti), b. 3 Oct 1832, d. 21 Nov 1913 (poss. Salvi/Grantford?). It appears they were married in 1851 in Madison Co., Illinois.

Children: Carl, b. 1852; Maria, b. 1853; Daniel; Cathrina, b. 1856; Louis, b. 1857—all listed as born in Zuber; twins Emil and Ema, b. 1858 in Silver Creek as were the following: Eva, b. 1860; Louisa, b. 1861; Menga, b. 1862; Carolina, b. 1864; Carolina, b. 1866; Daniel, b. 1869; and three more children, but the ink is faded (It looks like the last one may be Albert, b. 1875).

There is more on this registry sheet—marriages of some of the children and their death dates. There are also more Swiss-German (?) locations, but I was too pressed

for time to decipher the words. I will try to get back to the shop to get the marriages of the children. —Ed.

Stanley

Looking for a ship name?

If the person whose ship name you are looking for became naturalized, then you should be able to find the name of the ship from that person's naturalization papers. (Remember, women became naturalized citizens with their husbands prior to 1923).

If your ancestor was naturalized prior to 1906, you may have to search several places before you find naturalization papers. Before that date, a person could apply to a local, state, or federal district to become naturalized. Contact the local courts, state courts, and federal district courts in the area where your ancestor lived. In some cases the court will still have the records, in others, the records may have been transferred to a local library or archives. Federal District Court Records may have been transferred to the National Archives.

After September 27, 1906, copies of naturalization papers were sent to the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) in Washington, D.C. If your ancestor was naturalized after this date, you can write to INS, 425 Eye Street, NW, Washington, D.C. 20536.

Gems To Be Found In Probate

What do you do when your ancestor did not leave a will, but clearly owned some property? Wills are contained in probate files, but that is not the only thing you will find in a probate file. There are ways to avoid probate today, but the only way to avoid probate 100 years ago was to own no property, either real or personal.

Some of the things I have found most helpful in a probate file have been the Inventories and Final Accountings which are required before the property can be divided among the heirs. These have led me to (1) discover something about the individual and how he may have lived, (2) locate a previous place of residence, and (3) distinguish two individuals of the same name. A few examples follow:

The Individual: What Was He Like?

In trying to extend the lineage backward for my great-great-grandfather, Ralph McFARLING, born probably in the late 1780s, I found first, that he was most likely the son of Obediah McFARLEN of Shenandoah County, Virginia.

A *Virginia Index of Wills* showed a Ralph McFARLANE Inventory, 10 January 1754 in King George County not far from Shenandoah - about the right time period to be Obediah's father. A partial listing of his inventory included:

There were no household goods, no livestock, no larder of any kind. Here we have a man whose inventory consisted primarily of what must have been the religious and philosophical classics of his time, not only in English, but also in Greek and Latin. He was an educated man who certainly did not get his education in the backwoods of Virginia. There was a remnant of a tartan. Some fairly good guesses could be made that he was a "man of the cloth," probably educated in Scotland, probably unmarried. A search of King George County and the neighboring counties did turn up an Obediah McFarling who had twenty-eight acres surveyed in 1797 in Stafford County. The latter is quite possibly the same Obediah who later showed up in Shenandoah County—the dates are right. If this Ralph McFARLANE is not Obediah's father, chances are good he is a member of the same family -- perhaps Obediah's uncle. This problem has not yet been resolved.

Previous Place of Residence

Robert FINLEY died sometime before 16 November 1763 in Augusta County, Virginia, for on that date his brother was appointed administrator of his estate. James was clearly not a resident of Augusta County at the time, since a study of earlier records in the county found no James FINLEYS except for an isolated case twenty or so years earlier. Question: Where did James come from?

In James' statement regarding the settlement of the estate was found an expense item that had been allowed for traveling from "Carlisle." This turned out to be Carlisle, Cumberland County, Pennsylvania. Already knowing that at least some of the Augusta County FINLEYS had come from that area reduced the searching time. But if that had not been known, a search of the neighboring states could easily have been made. The reason for James' trip to Carlisle was to sell 500 acres of property in Guilford Township owned by his brother, Robert, to Samuel RIPPEY of Shippensburg.

Tax lists for that area showed that Robert had lived there at least as early as 1753. In addition, Samuel RIPPEY was also a familiar name associated with other FINLEYS in Cumberland (later Franklin) County. While the exact relationship has not yet been determined, the linkage to Cumberland County would not have been made at all if the clue, "Carlile," had not been pursued.

Distinguishing Between Two Persons of the Same Name

In Augusta County, Virginia there were two John FINLEYS who arrived about the same time in the late 1730s. One of them lived on Middle River and the other on South River, about fifteen miles apart. Land records were found, both patents and deeds, for each John FINLEY. One of the John Finleys left a will dated 17 August 1791. Question: Which John Finley was this, the one who lived on Middle River or the one on South River?

The inventory listed two items that helped place him on Middle River. It listed, "one negroe wench named Hannah," and a set of "Cooper tools." The tax list of 1782, which was the subject of an earlier article, identified John FINLEY's slave as Hannah. His position on the tax list differentiated him from the John FINLEY that lived on South River.

Among the court records for Augusta County was the following, recorded in May 1746:

"Robert ARMSTRONG was appointed overseer of a road from Jennings Gap to Daniel McANAIREs [McNAIR] thence to John FINLA's cooper. . ."

Daniel McNAIR lived on Middle River and was a neighbor of that John FINLEY. David McNAIR, son of Daniel, was a witness to the 1791 will written by John FINLEY.

Summary

It pays to look carefully at all the papers in a probate file, especially if your ancestor did not leave a will. The only way for his property to go to his heirs or otherwise be disposed of, was to go through probate. A listing of the inventory of his goods and an accounting for associated expenses were required before his estate, both real and

personal, could be distributed. Many times clues such as the above may be hidden in a one line entry. Be sure to interpret any findings in probate records as they relate to other things known about an individual.

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Book Reviews

Maryland as a Proprietary Province

There was never any question that England wanted this land, or ever any doubt in England's eyes that Spain should never be allowed to claim it. Especially in light of the Pope splitting the world between Spain and Portugal. To assure the status England wanted, the Maryland charter, granted by the King of England, gave the powers of an absolute monarch to the lord proprietor. This made Maryland unique among the colonies.

A tremendously detailed introduction leads to two parts that form the body of the book. Part I discusses territorial and social relations in five chapters: Land and the Land Office, Territorial Revenue, The Activity of the Assembly in Territorial Affairs, The Industrial Development and, The Social Development.

Part II discusses government in eight chapters: The Executive, The Legislature, The Administration of Justice, Military Affairs, Finance, Local Government, Religion, The Church and the Clergy, and Relations with the Home Government.

Tobacco was a prominent crop which had a role in the Maryland that held slaves and harbored convicts from England. There were definite social class differences. The land system was feudal at the start, but progressed to self government. This book, originally a doctoral thesis, defines the singular history of Maryland. It makes sense of its multifaceted population and its struggle for liberty.

This is a reprint from 1901. The table of contents is quite complete. The book contains an appendix, a bibliography, and an every-name index. It is not illustrated.

Monongalia County is in northern West Virginia on the border with Pennsylvania. Before the Civil War, it was part of Virginia and included parts of its present neighboring counties. In the court cases reported here, the basis of the case is briefly presented and the names of all the witnesses, etc. are given with the surnames in capital letters.

In some cases, particularly those involving slander, the brief details make interesting reading. Many of the cases involve the collection of debt, which reveal such interesting trivia as the cost of a cask of Madeira wine (\$72) or the cost of "lodging on clean sheets" (\$0.08). To aid the genealogist there is a surname index of over 2000 names and there are helpful definitions of legal terms.

Before the Revolutionary War, the British prohibited white settlers from entering the western wilderness. Those that had illegally settled in this area had no land records, grants or surveys. Therefore, much of the legal action reported in this book relates to

the problems of land ownership. Not only is this book a source for genealogical research, but it is a historical record of the life and times on the American frontier.

The information on John Freeman and his extended family corrects many errors that appeared in earlier publications of the Freeman family. This would be of interest to those descendants of Freeman who may be relying on the Freeman Genealogy (1835).

The Mayflower Descendant is a quarterly magazine of genealogy and history related to the Mayflower pilgrims. Originally published by the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, the material covered includes everything of interest to researchers studying the Mayflower passengers—the first few generations of their progeny, and the others who settled in the many towns they established in southeastern Massachusetts. The volumes in this series contain extensive transcripts of original records, as well as, genealogies and related historical articles. To date, there have been several hundred volumes published and bound into book form annually.

There is a detailed name and place general index beginning from the first publication. This index and numerous volumes are located at the Santa Barbara Genealogical Society Library. These publications also contain information regarding many New England families who are not direct descendants of the Pilgrims and are frequently overlooked as a general research tool for New England. If you have any New England ancestor, you may find them listed in the General Index for the Mayflower Descendant.

British Origins of American Colonists, 1629-1775

By William Dollarhide. 1997. Paper, 59 pp., \$12.95. AGLL, Inc., P.O. Box 329, Bountiful, UT 84011-0329.

Four groups of immigrants from Great Britain are clearly identified giving time periods of arrival, areas of origins, and locations for settlement. Each section describes the people within the group, the counties in Britain where the majority resided, some of their customs, when they left, and the areas in America that they settled.

The Puritans from East Anglia moved in 1629-1640. From 1641-1675 the West Country Cavaliers moved into the Chesapeake area. Quakers from the North Midland left for the Delaware Valley in 1675-1725. The last group coming from 1717-1775 left the British and Scottish border counties and parts of Northern Ireland to the back country and new frontiers of the new world.

Nine outline maps indicate the locations in Britain and America. The information can be very helpful in discovering where certain groups of immigrants came from and understanding political and other reasons for their moves. Twelve pages of sources for genealogical research in Great Britain include a wide selection of books and other sources. A good index completes this very useful book.

Military pension records can provide information

The first US Military Pension Law was passed in 1792. It provided aid to disabled veterans who had served in the Revolutionary War. Later pensions were extended to anyone who had served. In 1818, a veteran had to prove actual need; in 1820, a veteran had to prove need and submit a schedule of his estate, perhaps a copy of a deed showing that he had disposed of all his property. All veterans were granted pensions after 1828.

The 1836 Widow's Act provided that the widow of a Revolutionary War veteran could claim his pension. The widow had to prove relationship and establish that they had been married before the war ended. After 1854 widows were eligible for a pension regardless of the date of the marriage. Many widows who were eligible did not apply.

The Remarried Widow's index is arranged alphabetically by the name of the remarried widow. Part I covers 1861 and before. Part II covers the period from the Civil War to World War I. Information given includes the name of the remarried widow, name of the veteran, the unit in which he served and his file or certificate number.

A pension claimed on behalf of a minor child included proof of the child's age and birth date.

In the first ten months of operation, this site has had over 40,000 visitors. It provides general information on Native American genealogy, lectures from the NASIG, information for beginning research in Native American tribal nations information, current pow wow information, links to Indian census roles and indices, links to other Native American genealogy websites, and many other items of interest to Native Americans and Native American researchers.

An extensive number of links are available. The index of link addresses alone is 39 pages long. It has become a very important online research tool. This website is maintained by genealogist Barbara Benge (GFS BB).

• Have you found a nuncupative will?

Made by word of mouth only - a nuncupative will was one that was neither written nor signed nor sealed by the deceased.

You might read about a "cotter" - the tenant of a cottage, with or without a small piece of land. A cotter's land was probably insufficient to support him, so he would also work on the land of others.

Your records may sometimes include the phrase, "mock of the church" which meant the breaking of a betrothal of the calling of the banns.

A child who was referred to as "merrybegot" was an illegitimate child.

A "scavenger" meant the official responsible for keeping the streets clean. He had "rakers" who worked for him who went around doing the actual work of clearing the night-soil and rubbish put out by householders.

A "heling" was a bed coverlet mentioned in probate inventories.

If your ancestors had "pannage" they had the right to feed pigs in the woods of a manor.

"Messuage" meant a dwelling house with the ground around it and any buildings.

A pricket was stolen from a parochyn when he was hamsokened just before he died of putrid fever can be translated to: A candlestick stolen from a parishioner when he was assaulted in his own house just before he died from typhus or smallpox.

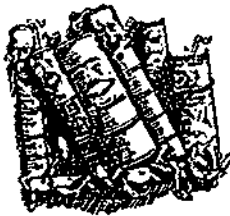

Ship Listings

If your immigrant ancestor came into New York between 1847 and 1897 and is not included in series such as Germans to America, the search for the correct list can be frustrating. The arrival lists themselves are intact, but they have not yet been indexed for this period. In a recent column, Myra Gornley reviewed ways to get around this large gap.

The Morton Allan Directory, which covers the years 1890-1930, gives the dates of arrival for various ships according to year and shipping line. National Archives microfilm series M 1066 is another listing of ships entering New York from foreign ports, covering the years 1789-1919.

If you do not know the name of the ship or the shipping line, but do know the approximate year of arrival from the 1900 - 1920 census returns, you can still narrow the focus. It will help if you know the port(s) your ancestor might have sailed from. If you do not know this, eliminate all ships sailing from ports that you do know your ancestor would not have used. Still, the search will entail a tedious checking through several rolls of film. Naturalization records, if you can find them, may include the date and port of arrival.

If you are hunting for passenger lists, do check the chart on pages 48-59 of *Guide to Genealogical Research in the National Archives* to get a better picture of what exists to help you.

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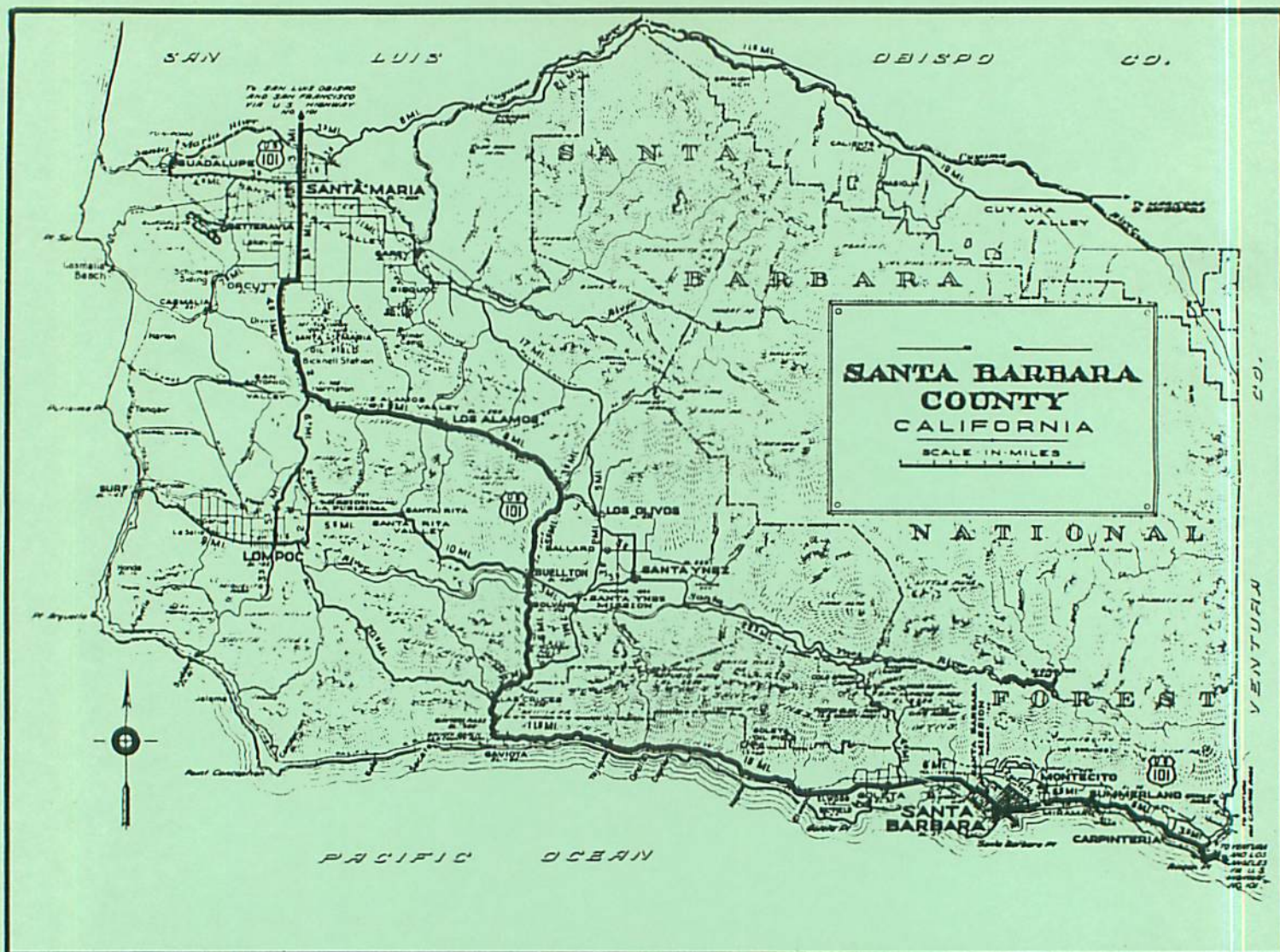

Santa Barbara County

One of California's 27 original counties. While the county was actually created in 1850, the written history of the area dates back to 1542. In that year Juan Cabrillo discovered the Santa Barbara Channel and later, according to legend, crossed to San Miguel Island where he died and was buried. A second Spanish explorer, Sebastian Vizcaino, entered the channel on the Feast Day of Saint Barbara in 1602, and named the area accordingly. Fr. Fermin Francisco de Lasuen founded the Santa Barbara mission in 1786. Santa Barbara Royal Presidio, established April 21, 1782, by Fr. Junipero Serra, was the last of four royal presidios in Alta California: Santa Barbara, San Diego, Monterey, and San Francisco. Santa Barbara had all three Spanish forms of administration - Presidio representing the military, Pueblo the civil, and Mission the religious. In 1873, Ventura County was established from the southern portion of the original Santa Barbara area.

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
