

About the video from Neal Graffy:

Dahlgren, editor; Doug Hector on animation; and music by David West. Actors in this episode were James Paul Garcia, Luis Moreno, and Salistino San Juan.



Neal Graffy first gave voice to history in 1989 when he premiered a slide show talk on Santa Barbara History.

Encouraged by the response, more talks were developed; and currently there are twenty different topics that have been presented in well over 300 shows. Graffy has appeared on local, state and national radio and TV including Huell Howser's California Gold, KCET TV's Life and Times, and, nationally, on This Old House. He has authored numerous monographs for historical organizations, as well as articles in regional and national publications. His two previous books are Street Names of Santa Barbara and Historic Santa Barbara. Neal serves on the SBCGS Board of Directors.

President's Message

Dear Members,

I hope this finds you and yours in good health and adjusting to life at home. We are all doing our part to keep ourselves and others healthy using creative ways to socialize, keep in touch, and take care of business – at a distance.

The Society fulfills its mission through educational programs, oper-

ation of a genealogical research library, and preservation of local genealogical records, but it is our members and volunteers, their camaraderie, friendship, and social interaction that are the heart of our organization.

Since the current situation has removed the "face to face" interaction that many of our members value, we are working to create ways for members to stay engaged, continue to learn, and to maintain a social connection to the Society and each other. Just because the Library is closed and in-person programs are cancelled, it doesn't mean that Society activities have come to a stand-still. For the time being, we've gone "virtual"!

Board News. Fourteen board members attended the March 19 board meeting via video conference. Surprisingly, it worked very well. The board reviewed the actions the Society has taken to date in response to the COVID-19 and decided to extend the Library closure until May 1. The Society's committee chairs have embraced the challenge to keep connected to our members and continue to conduct the necessary business of the Society.

Video conferencing has become the "go-to" technology. The following is how the Society is functioning in the virtual world:

Communication is key during normal times and especially during times of crisis. Since March 10, when you received our first email letter about the Society's response to the COVID-19 crisis, this week's Tips for Stay at Home Genealogists #4, our goal has been to keep in touch and engaged with our members. Since then about seven email newsletters have been sent to our members with updates and tips. The two-dozen or so members who prefer not to receive email communications, were called by the Membership Committee to let them know of the closure and cancellations.

Education continues virtually. So far, two Lunch & Learn sessions were held and attended by 55 Society members.

On April 18 at 10:30am, we will hold our **first virtual General Meeting**. There will be a short business meeting followed by "*The Story of El Canon Perdido*" a video produced by local historian Neal Graffy. Neal is a popular Society speaker and has been a member since 2013. He serves on the board of directors. Members will receive an invitation and more information closer to the meeting date.

The Library may be closed, however many resources are available on the Society's website, sbgen.org. Check out the Member's Area for available Mentors, speaker handouts, and the webinar archive.

The Seminar Committee is working on rescheduling the April 4 seminar with the speaker and the venue. Members who registered for the seminar have been contacted about options for the registration fees paid.

The Records Preservation Committee has been finishing scans and indexing local historical records. To date, the Committee has scanned and indexed over 203,000 local records and made the indexes available on our website.

The Membership Committee continues its work behind the scenes maintaining the membership database and answering membership questions online. The Mentor Program has switched from face-to-face assistance to other forms of communication such as video conferencing or telephone. To date, at least one mentor-member meeting has occurred via video conferencing.

The Outreach Committee's job is to spread the word about the Society in the community. Just before most public venues closed, the Committee had just finished relocating the Santa Barbara Italian Pioneers Exhibit from the Goleta Library and the Sahyun to the exhibit hall at Rancho La Patera/Stow House. You may visit the exhibit virtually, of course, by going to sbgen.org and the Santa Barbara Italians page.

Nominations Committee. The Committee is identifying potential candidates for board positions and expects an announcement about nominees at the April board meeting.

Finance Committee. The Committee will meet the second week in April and will finalize the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Proposed Budget to present to the board in April or May. At the April meeting, the Committee will review the March financial reports and continue to closely monitor the Society's finances.

Investment Committee. April 6, the Committee will hold its quarterly meeting via video conferencing. They will review the third quarter investment reports for the Endowment Fund and Operations Reserve.

Property Maintenance. The Committee is working through its list of property maintenance and safety and security items.

Please take care of yourself and your family. Check your email and sbgen.org for updates on Society activities.

I look forward to seeing you in person when this health crisis is over. Until then, see you online!

Recognizing Our Volunteers



This month, SBCGS recognizes and thanks **Kathy Stark**, our Society Historian. Having joined in 2008, Kathy is long time member who has watched the society grow and has documented its rich history along the way. Thank you, Kathy, for telling us a little about yourself.

I was born in Minneapolis, MN and came to California just before start-

ing Kindergarten, so I am almost a native Californian. I graduated from Carpinteria High School in 1965 and then attended Santa Barbara City College. My career dealt with Human Resources and the insurance industry. I never knew a lot about my ancestors and my maternal grandfather always said not to look in to the past. That made me very curious about our family. I enrolled in a Genealogy class that was taught by Betty Root at Adult Ed. Two of my neighbors were in the class and they had a head start on me. My mother never talked about my biological father (they divorced when I was 6 and I last saw him around age 10). I really wanted to find out what happened to him. Suggestions that came out of Betty's class helped me locate their marriage license and that gave me the names of my paternal aunt and uncle. A call was placed to my uncle and he told us that my father had died in 1970 in Los Angeles. As my research continued I got his death certificate only to find out that he died in 1970 in Inglewood and my husband and I had lived in Long Beach at that time. No one on his side of the family had any idea where I lived but I did manage to find his half-brother (my uncle) and visited him in Minnesota. Uncle Ray sent me some photos that he said he had kept in his basement for years. They are some of my treasures! I recently went to Ireland to see if I could find any more information on my Irish ancestors on my mother's side but did not have any luck. I did get to visit two of the villages where they were from and walk the streets of Cork City. I have found a wealth of information on my husband's German ancestors and we have visited his cousins in Germany.

I became the historian for the society at the request of Bob Bason. With some help from Gloria Clements we managed to put together the scrapbooks that are located in the library. I have a file basket in the office at the library and always check to see if anyone has left me articles, pictures, etc. to put in our scrapbooks. I do a lot of photo scrapbooking at home and have approximately 80 albums including some great old photos from my side of the family and my husband's side of the family. I also love doing crafts of various

types. I have written a couple of articles for Ancestors West and the only volunteer work I do right now is at the society's library where you can find me the 4th Thursday of each month.

research and collaboration made instant communication around the world possible today.

I discovered this interesting photo while browsing some Internet related articles – via the web, of course. The NeXT workstation shown in the photo was used by Sir Tim Berners-Lee while working at CERN in 1991 and became the world's first web server. Berners-Lee is credited with inventing the World Wide Web. Besides the diagram, of particular interest to me is the open book, which is part of the display. It is an encyclopedia of household advice titled Enquire Within upon Everything, first published in 1856 in London. According to a 2017 Forbes article, the book was part of Berners-Lee's family collection and he named his precursor of the World Wide Web network, "ENQUIRE," after the book. So we could be saying. "I found this on ENQUIRE" – but I like "the web" better. His book, *Weaving the Web*, written in 1999 must be fascinating – I'll add that to my list.
