

President's Message

the opportunity to lead such a wonderful organization and appreciative of the support and dedication of our volunteers and members.

To the board, thank you for your expertise, perspectives, and support, and always having the best interest of the Society at heart. It has been a pleasure working with you all. Jim Wilson and Theresa Calvin will leave the board at the end of June. Thank you for your service, it is appreciated.

To our volunteers, donors, and members, thank you for your continued and generous support of the Society.

Father's Day. On June 21st we recognize, reflect on, and celebrate the contribution that fathers and father figures make to the lives of their children. Happy Father's Day!

The State of the Society.

The Society is thriving as it begins its 48th year.

Membership has remains strong at just over 600 members.

The Sahyun Library, the Society's hub for research, classes, and meetings, bustled with 250 visitors each month. More than 100 books were added to the library's collection, bringing the total to 16,475 items. In addition to the ten subscription websites available at the Sahyun's computer lab, the Library's designation as a Family History Library Affiliate provides our patrons access to the Family History Library's millions of digitized records. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Library closed March 15 and we look forward to it reopening as soon as it is deemed safe for our volunteers, members, and the public.

Our corps of over 85 volunteers logs over 11,000 hours running every aspect of the organization. This year 100 members and guests gathered for our biannual Honors Luncheon to recognize Joan Jacobs, Debbie Kaska, Kristin Ingalls, and John Fritsche for their many contributions to the Society.

The Records Preservation team has now scanned and indexed over 206,000 local records of genealogical interest, making the indexed records available on our website.

Communication with our members is key. Tree Tips continued to provide our members with up to date Society news and "Tips for Stay at Home Genealogists" kept our members engaged during the months our library has been closed and social distancing has become the norm. The Ancestors West publication team produced four wonderful editions packed with stories authored by our members. Debbie Kaska retired as Editor with Kristin Ingalls taking

the helm.

The Education Committee offered a full schedule of classes, webinars, and Lunch & Learn plus a month of educational opportunities during Family History Month. Educational field trips were instituted this year, with two bus trips: one to the Los Angeles Public Library and, the second, to the Los Angeles Family Search Library.

We are Zooming! With class and meeting space unavailable, education, general meetings, and committee work went digital. Zoom Lunch & Learn, launched in late March, was a huge success, well attended, and was expanded. Our creative education team has a webinar series, Lunch & Learn, classes, Special Interest Groups and more scheduled for June. June's Annual Meeting will also be held via Zoom. Over 100 members joined the April and May General Meetings via Zoom which included a short business meeting and guest speakers. The Society's committees have not skipped a beat and continue their work online.

The Outreach Committee expanded the Society's reach into the community with the Santa Barbara's Italian Pioneer Exhibit, displayed at the Goleta Library and in the Sahyun's conference room during Family History Month. The second annual student art exhibit "Family Matters" also made its debut. The Committee revitalized the speaker's bureau. Building on the success of the Italian exhibit, the Committee plans future exhibits, adding an online component to reach viewers beyond our community.

Fiscal responsibility is a hallmark of the Society. The FY 2019-2020 budget will end the year within budget. Thanks to our generous donors, the Annual Appeal exceeded its goal of \$17,000. In 2018, the Board began to address property maintenance issues by having a Reserve Study completed. The Study provides a 30-financial plan for property maintenance. This year the Board established a Maintenance Reserve with an initial \$20,000 in funding. There is still much work to be done but we have a plan and the first steps have been taken. The operations reserve (equals one-half of our operating budget) is fully funded. As of April 30, the endowment fund balance was \$532,000.

Remember to join us (via Zoom) June 20 for the Annual Membership meeting and special presentation by Laura Hedgecock, "Telling the Stories of Your Life."

The Society has a successful, rich past and a bright future. Thank you for the opportunity to serve as President.

Recognizing Our Volunteers: Merna McClenathen



This month, SBCGS recognizes and thanks **Merna McClenathen**. Merna is one of our earliest members and has made numerous contributions to the Society over the years. Currently, she hosts the "Genealogy Tips and Discussion" SIG at the monthly meetings and is a mentor for Scotland, the US, and Beginning Genealogy. Thank you, Merna, for sharing a little about yourself and for being a Life Mem-

ber.

It's ironic that genealogy has become such a big part of my life because history was certainly not a favorite subject during my school years in Inglewood, California! However, I have always liked mysteries and read the entire Nancy Drew series of 56 books while in elementary school. My interests were more with the sciences and I majored in nutrition & dietetics at UCSB where I met my husband, Gordon. He had a long career at Dos Pueblos High School teaching and coaching track and cross county teams.

My interest in genealogy started a bit over 40 years ago with the death of several relatives who were 'working on the family tree.' Somehow we inherited their unorganized files, photos, papers and notes. That started questions about who our ancestors were and where they had come from. A visit to the local LDS Church's Family History Center, which at that time was in Goleta, got me off to a good start and provided me with the necessary pedigree and family group charts. Remember, this was all 'B.C.' (before computers), so things were done with paper and pencil!

Through the Family History Center, I learned of the newly organized Santa Barbara County Genealogy Society and I promptly joined about 1982, making me one of the 'Pioneer' members of the Society. About this time I joined Betty Root's Adult Education class where I met Jan Cloud and many other early SBCGS members.

In order to keep track of all the ancestors and relatives I was finding, I decided I needed to become computerized so I purchased my first computer in late 1980's. I then joined a Computer Users Interest Group, the first of what has now become a whole list of Special Interest Groups at the Society.

By this time genealogy had taken over a large part of my life, so I made the decision to take an early retirement from my clinical dietitian position at SB Cottage Hospital. Frankly, my job was starting to interfer with my hobbies mostly genealogy and annual trips to Salt Lake City!

During these nearly 40 years, I have mentored many budding genealogists, served as a librarian, spoken about the numerous aspects of genealogy to local groups and clubs, volunteered at society open houses, and chaired various special interest groups including the RootsIII Software Users Group, the States Interest Group, the Help Wanted Group, and the current Genealogy Help

and Discussion Group.

My husband and I have been married for 62 years and we have 3 children and 4 grandsons. So far, no one is particularly interested in family history a fairly common situation for many of us, it seems!

I play bassoon in the Prime Time Band and have recruited several new genealogists and society members from the band membership. I'm also the Registrar of the local lineage society, 'Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War' and help prospective members research their Civil War ancestors.

The knowledge I have gained through genealogy and the friendships I have made from membership in the SBCGS have been life enriching and I wouldn't trade these years for the world!

Also attach a photo of yourself to go along with your bio. We really want members to get to know each other and this is a perfect way.

Theme: "Family Matters"



Media: Pen and ink, charcoal, paint, markers, color pencils, pastels, mixed media, collage




