

The Board appointed Marie Sue Parsons Interim President through January 2021. What does the President do? The President serves as the Society's chief executive officer and spokesperson, presides over the monthly board and general membership meetings, serves as an ex-officio member of all committees, and, with the board, establishes committees and appoints committee chairs. The current term ends June 30, 2023.

What are the qualifications for President?

- SBCGS member for at least 1 year
- Familiar with the field of genealogy and family history (being an expert, not required)
- Strong interpersonal, managerial, and leadership skills
- A good working knowledge of the Society is desired

What is the time commitment? On average, about 20 hours per month.

Membership Corner by Molly Gleason



Holiday Greetings everyone!

I hope you are staying safe and healthy. Isn't it nice to be able to do most, if not all, of our holiday shopping from the comfort of home? I'm sure you must be inundated with catalogs by now. The image on the left is the cover of the first Sears, Roebuck and Co. expanded catalog (also called the "Consumer's Guide"), which was published in 1894. The Sears catalog however was by no means the first commercially

produced mail order catalog. Aldus Manutius, a Venetian bookseller, is credited with the first mail order catalog, which he published in 1498 to sell his "pocketbooks." Then there was Ben Franklin who in 1744 published the first British American catalog, "A Catalogue of Choice and Valuable Books, Consisting of Near 600 Volumes, in most Faculties and Science." The cover included the guarantee that "Those persons that live remote, by sending their Orders and Money to said B. Franklin, may depend on the same Justice as if present."

These catalogs were followed by several others including Tiffany & Company's "Blue Book" in 1845; the Pryce-Jones Royal Welsh Warehouse catalog, selling local Welsh flannel, in 1861 (Queen Victoria was a regular customer); the Montgomery Ward & Company catalog in 1872; the Hammacher Schlemmer catalog, the "Illustrated Catalogue and Price List of A.Hammacher&Co.," selling tools and hardware, in 1881; and - at last - the R.W. Sears Watch Co. catalog in 1888 which was expanded to the Consumer's Guide in 1894 and claimed to be the "Greatest Supply House on Earth," carrying most everything. And the rest is history....

By the way, you might want to add August 18th to your calendar. It is National Mail Order Catalog Day, to coincide with the day in 1872 that the first Montgomery Ward catalog was produced.

Biography of Nathan Dylan Goodwin





Dear Members,

I am writing to wish you a season of good health and gratitude. One of the things that I continue to be grateful for is this amazing society. I plan to put this group at the top of my annual donation list, and I hope that you too will consider making the Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society one of your giving priorities. We have set a goal again this year of raising \$17,000 to support our many activities on your behalf.

Your society has not skipped a beat during this pandemic. Look at all that we've accomplished in 2020:

- *We began holding monthly meetings by zoom, expanding our ability to hear from distant speakers.
- *We arranged with Ancestry for free access from home for our members during the Lockdown.
- *We added Genealogy Bank to remote services available to members.
- *The Education Committee held our bi-annual Seminar successfully on zoom.
- *We held Lunch and Learn Zoom Sessions with as many as 59 people attending.
- *We held many additional zoom classes each week during Family History Month.
- *We began sending Free Tips for Stay at Home Genealogists.
- *The JewishGen Interest Group with the Outreach Committee created a virtual Jewish Heritage exhibit.
- *Outreach also continued our annual children's art exhibit and made it virtual this year.
- *The Preservation Committee has scanned to-date over 206,000 documents that are available for research.
- *A well-attended presentation of genealogy was made to Residents of Encina Royale (prior to lockdown).
- *The landscape committee hired a new gardening firm to maintain the landscaping at the Sahyun library.
- *Volunteers continue to assist with gardening, repairs, etc.
- *The board created a new split budget to separate the operation of our society from the maintenance of the library facility itself.
- *We created a new Property Committee to manage the property grounds and the structures.
- *The board also created a new Technology Committee.
- *The property committee installed a new roof on the redwood building, resurfaced the parking lot, and painted the Victorian house.
- *The Ancestors West Committee continued creating wonderful quarterly issues.
- *We restructured the organizational chart of the Board of Directors and created new job descriptions.
- *Your board selected Property Committee and Tech Committee chairs. Whew, that was a lot!

Finally, I hope that you are keeping a journal for your descendents, describing the year of the 2020 Pandemic...
