



The Orphan Train Movement: History, Genealogy, Legacy

From 1854 to 1929, over two hundred thousand children were transported from New York to the Midwest and beyond as part of the orphan train movement. Michael Brophy explores the origins and intentions of the orphan train movement as part of the larger immigrant experience. He describes how children were “placed out,” shares stories of orphan train riders, and provides tips on researching ancestry of orphan train children.



Michael Brophy is a nationally known professional genealogical researcher, heir search specialist, and lecturer from the Boston area. He has served as a Board Member on the Massachusetts Genealogical Council and the New England Association of Professional Genealogists. Mike was featured on *Who Do You Think You Are?* and conducted research for Ancestry.com, book authors, and hundreds of private clients.

Tech Tips Milt Hess, IT Chair

The company that hosts the Society’s website and email server and supports our website software is EasyNetSites (ENS), located in Tampa, Florida. ENS has notified its clients that it will cease operation on 30 June 2021. We have used this company’s software and services for our website for about ten years, and most of our membership, education, outreach, library, and research activities depend on the website.

About 200 genealogical and historical societies are currently using ENS, so it is possible that a computer technology firm may acquire ENS and continue to support its client base. Because we can’t assume that this will happen, the Tech Team is taking advantage of this opportunity to do some much-needed work on our digital infrastructure.

There are several ways to approach this project, including using a commercially available solution and developing a custom website using a modern toolset such as WordPress. The Tech Team is meeting with committee chairs to get their input on the functions and features to be included in the new website. If you have suggestions, please do let us know. Once we have defined the requirements, we will be able to evaluate alternative approaches, select one, and move forward with implementation.

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Volunteer Corner Featuring Robin McCarthy

This month, SBCGS recognizes and thanks Robin McCarthy. Robin needs no introduction. Most every member of our society who has ever attended a class, field trip or virtual event knows her. Robin joined the society in 2012 and has contributed in so many ways. In addition to class instructor and Zoom Co-

ordinator, Robin has served on several committees including Records Preservation, Education, and Technology. Thank you, Robin and thank you for sharing your most interesting bio!

“My family relocated to Goleta from my birthplace in Great Falls, Montana, shortly after my 10th birthday. I have lived within a one-mile radius of the Fairview Shopping Center ever since. I attended Fairview School, now the Jack Kramer Administration office for Goleta Union School District, Goleta Valley Junior High and Dos Pueblos High School. Throughout those years I was an active member in Camp Fire Girls, doing several speaking engagements and an interview on KEYT with then weatherman Gene Forsell.

During my high school years I took organ lessons from Louise McDermott, whose husband was one of the owners of the McDermott-Crockett Mortuary. After high school I attended SBCC and UCSB majoring in math but later switching to computer science. I also worked weekends at a local costume rental shop.

My first “real” job was working in the Proof and Accounting departments of Santa Barbara National Bank (later becoming Santa Barbara Bank & Trust). After a brief stint working at Sambo’s corporate office in Carpinteria, I began working in the Payroll department at Applied Magnetics. It was there where I was able to fulfill my high school dream of becoming a computer programmer, after being the night shift computer operator for three years. During this time I also worked part-time in the Data Processing departments of St. Francis Hospital and Jostens school ring company (later to become the home of my future employer, QAD) and had my own part-time business setting up computer accounting systems for small businesses.

I left Applied Magnetics after 15 years to work for QAD, a local company near Summerland that produces enterprise resource planning software for manufacturing companies. During my 18 years as a software engineer there, I was privileged to travel to their offices in Belgium, Ireland and Shanghai to train other software engineers.

When I retired from QAD in 2012 I decided to investigate genealogy, having heard from one of my mother’s cousins that she was a fifth cousin of John Glenn, the astronaut and Ohio senator. I had no idea how he would have determined this information because I knew nothing about genealogy research. So, I enrolled in an Adult Ed genealogy class taught by Louise Matz. I was amazed at the amount of old records that have been kept and digitized. By the end of the term, it was Family History Month so I joined our society to take advantage of those class offerings.

It wasn’t long afterward that Connie Burns tapped me to be a volunteer librarian. Before COVID, I was working two shifts a month as a librarian. When Rosa Avolio learned of my passion with Excel, she enlisted my help with Records Preservation. I have been working with Dorothy Oksner and a host of other volunteers ever since on Records Preservation. I create spreadsheet templates for transcribing the images Dorothy obtains for obituaries, mortuaries, cemeteries, court

Brickwall Sleuthing

(This class is appropriate for those with some experience in genealogical research.)

What's the next step in your research? Have you moved beyond the beginning stages of researching your family history but are frustrated by major stumbling blocks? **Brickwall Sleuthing** might be helpful.

Brickwall Sleuthing is an interactive class, and the expectation is that each participant will present a brickwall case study of his/her own. The class will then discuss records, historical context and events, cluster genealogy, and other topics that might help find a solution to the brickwall.

Genealogical case studies explore a research problem and how it has been solved. A **brickwall case study** does the same thing but the solution to the problem hasn't been revealed yet. The problem can be as simple as an explanation of a discovery, or the analysis of a record; more complex problems might involve a search for parents of an ancestor or locating records pertaining to the problem.

If you are interested in participating in this class, please be prepared to contribute to the discussions on our various brickwall cases, and please plan on making at a presentation on your brickwall.

- 1. Present the Problem.** Open your case study by creating a picture of the problem — the who, what, where, and why of the problem you are trying to solve.
- 2. Show the research** you already conducted and the records you located.
- 3. Describe any of your research plan/s.**
- 4. Identify limitations** if there are any.
- 5. Show the new research** you conducted and the records you located. Add full source citations.
- 6. Reveal the Results.** Did you solve your genealogical research problem? State it!
