## **Presidents' Message**

One of the lengthiest discussions in the November Board meeting centered around the difficulty in finding volunteers for various committees, for vacancies on the Board of Directors, for impending officer vacancies, including the offices of President and President-Elect, and especially for librarians.

Since its founding nearly 50 years ago, the Society has prided itself on the fact that it is a volunteer society. We have always had a critical mass of members that finding volunteers was not a major problem. Talented, able, and interested people usually came to the fore. Oh, now and then Jan Cloud had to twist an arm or two. It was impossible to say no to Jan.

The world and our Society are experiencing challenging times, given how COVID-19 has imposed

a new normal on us, especially given the demographic of the Society. The justifiable COVID-19 fears and necessary safety protocols have especially impacted the operations of our Sahyun Library by limiting its opening hours because of the lack of volunteer librarians, in spite of the anti- COVID-19 measures library director Kathie Morgan has put in place. These include two amazing air cleaners that are capable of straining 99% of dust, bugs, and viruses from the entire interior of the library, so that we may breathe in confidence and comfort.

Hollering at, pleading, inviting, waiting, and hoping for volunteers to come forward just isn't working right now. So watch for and expect your presidents pro tem, Art and Bob, to begin arm twisting as an alternative to trying to having the Society membership come up with \$80,000 or more annually to pay the salary of an executive director, and another \$100,000 for a secretary and treasurer. Giving up and resorting to paid executives has put more than one nonprofit organization deeply in the red and out of business. That should not and must not happen to our Society.

None of the vacancies is more pressing than another, and in fact every committee needs additional members. It's true some of the current officers may be amenable to reup, but right now a partial list would include: Society President and President-Elect to replace Art Sylvester and Bob Bason, respectively; Vice President of Programs to replace Elizabeth O'Neal; Director of Sahyun Library to replace Kathie Morgan; Chair of the IT committee to replace Rosa Avolio; three currently vacant positions and three impending vacancies on the Board of Directors; and a bunch of volunteer librarians.

We're going to need a lot of help in 2022 to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Society. So once again, friends, please answer one of the various calls for volunteer help to support your society with your time and talent before a committee chair, officer, or president pro tem rings your telephone or twists your arm.

I close this last President's letter of the year with best wishes to all for a safe and happy holiday season. Let's look forward to times when all of us can get together in person once again without masks to trade genealogy stories, tips, and recollections.
