

Getting Ready for the 1950 Census: Searching with and without a Name Index

Speaker: Stephen Morse Saturday, February 19, 2022

When the 1950 census is released in April 2022, it will not have a name index. So finding people in the census will involve searching by location instead. Even when a name index becomes available, there will still be many reasons

for doing locational searches.



The census is organized by Enumeration Districts (EDs), so the location needs to be converted to an ED before the census can be accessed. The One-Step website contains numerous tools for obtaining EDs. This talk will present the various tools and show circumstances in which each can be used.

Speaker's Bio:

Stephen Morse is the creator of the One-Step Website for which he has received both the Lifetime Achievement Award and the Outstanding Contribution Award from the International Associa-

tion of Jewish Genealogical Societies, Award of Merit from the National Genealogical Society, first-ever Excellence Award from the Association of Professional Genealogists, and two awards that he cannot pronounce from Polish genealogical societies.

In his other life Morse is a computer professional with a doctorate degree in electrical engineering. He has held various research, development, and teaching positions, authored numerous technical papers, written four textbooks, and holds four patents. He is best known as the architect of the Intel 8086 (the granddaddy of today's Pentium processor), which sparked the PC revolution more than 40 years ago.



New Books by Chris Klukkert



For anyone looking for their American Revolutionary War patriot in the Midwest region once known as the Spanish Illinois (today's Missouri and surrounding areas west of the Mississippi River), we just got in a great new book, *The Militiamen of St. Louis & Ste. Genevieve 1770 – 1793*. In the American colonies, local militiamen formed the core of every town's defense, and this Spanish province in the Louisiana Territory was no exception. The Spanish government provided the soldiers to maintain the colony's military force. Only a few of those yearly rosters have survived to this day. This book publishes for the first time ever, all of these listsmore than seventy rosters and review lists that contain the names of roughly one thousand militiamen who served in St. Louis and Ste. Geneviève between 1779 and 1783.
