SBCGS General Meeting Saturday, October 15, 2022, 9:30 - 12 Noon Featuring Craig Roberts Scott "The History of Genealogy"



The speaker for the October 15th meeting is Craig Scott. The title of his presentation is *The History of Genealogy*. Genealogy is as old as history. In antiquarian times it provided the basis for claims for monarchs to their thrones. It was not the activity of the common person. In the 1890s, it provided a basis for claims for membership in lineage societies, such as the Mayflower Descendants and the

Daughters of the American Revolution, among others. In the 1970s, interest increased with the television series Roots. In the 1990s, it became more accessible to the occasional user. The explosion of the Web and the existence of both free and subscription services led to an explosion of interest in the hobby and the profession.

Craig Roberts Scott, *MA*, *CG*, *FUGA is the President and CEO of Heritage Books, Inc., a genealogical publishing firm with over 9,500 titles in print. A professional genealogical and historical researcher for more than thirty-five years, he specializes in records of the National Archives, especially those that relate to the military. He has coordinated the Military tracks at IGHR, SLIG, and GRIP in years past. He is a former Treasurer and Director of the Association of Professional Genealogists. He has been a faculty member or coordinator of research tracks in the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research, Samford University and the Salt Lake Institute of Genealogy, and the Genealogical Institute of Pittsburgh. He is currently the Coordinator of the SLIG Consultation Track, helping students solve their brick wall problems.*

Presidents' Message Arthur Sylvester

In the last few weeks, I have met with, and witnessed the enormous time and energy, the committee chairs, themselves volunteers, devote to the business and welfare of the Society.

Yes, these are very talented people, and they do some marvelous things for the Society, but they cannot do it all alone year after year. They need help now and then, and they need fresh recruits to step up and repopulate their committees which were decimated during the COVID-19 hiatus.

The library always needs volunteer librarians. Can you cut and paste? Outreach needs your help in preparing the displays for Family History Month and the 50th Anniversary. Are you a baker and organizer? We shall go hungry unless you can help with refreshments once a month. Do you play the stock market? Do you like gardening and landscaping? Want to get to know more people in the Society?

We have a lot of things going on during the remainder of this year, and we need your "little," just as Ed Storr used to say, "if each of us does a little, we all do a lot."

The City of Santa Barbara wants to widen the sidewalk from 8 to 10 feet and add a bike path along Castillo Street in front of our library for ADA compliancy. The City's current plan is to take a nip out of our property by removing our retaining wall, our fence, and our bougainvillea to gain the necessary width.

The City will hold a public on-line meeting from 5:30-7pm on October 6 and a public on-site meeting on Saturday, October 8, from 10am-noon. You must register for the October 6 meeting; the gathering place for the October 8 meeting is at the Castillo-Haley Streets intersection.

The necessary planning will occur in 2023, followed by application for State and Federal funds in 2024-2025, and the project will commence construction in 2026. Construction is a long way off, but in the meantime, I urge you to attend the public meetings to show support for our side of the matter. Except for the people across the street, we are the only entity materially affected by the widening.

Immediate Volunteer Opportunities

The Information Technology Team has immediate opportunities for volunteers in three areas of our support for the Society:

1. Set up the equipment for hybrid meetings at the library and at the church for our monthly meetings. This requires people who are knowledgeable about connecting to WiFi and familiar with Zoom. Responsibilities include downloading files from our cloud server at Box.com and setting up the Owl 360 for conferencing with remote attendees, for which we'll provide training.

We are seeking two volunteers. One of these volunteers will need to be onsite at the church each month. They may also be asked to pick up the equipment from the library and bring it to the church.

2. Serve as Assistant Webmaster on our new website to help with ongoing regular updates and occasional modifications. Previous experience working with websites is required. WordPress experience is a big plus. You'll assist with uploading content to the Book Angels page, adding events to the calendar, posting Ancestors West and Tree Tips issues, and modifying text on web pages.

3. Records Preservation needs an Excel expert to assist with reformatting data to upload to our new online database. This requires familiarity with Excel functions for transforming dates, executing Excel macros, and HTML.

Have You Seen Our New Online Database?

Our volunteers have digitized and indexed more than 200,000 primary-source records and indexes which are being added to the Society's searchable online database. Birth, death, burial, marriage, naturalization, court, tax, and land records, among others, will be coming soon. Collections not yet digitized will be added in the future, including some historic marriage, death, burial, and local cemetery indexes. Record images, when available, can be purchased. Members receive a discounted price when logged into the website.

Here's one for starters:

Search for periodical articles using the free version of PERSI (Periodical Source Index) at the Allen County Public Library Genealogy Center <u>https://www.genealogycenter.info/persi</u>/ PERSI is an index to "more than 3 million citations to readily-available periodical sources." If you have ever written an article for Ancestors West, you will likely find it indexed in PERSI. Once you find an article of interest, ask a library volunteer to help you search our catalog for the periodical. We may very well have it, and if we don't, we can guide you to a library that does.

October is Family History Month! We look forward to seeing you in the library.

All About Our "New In The Library" Shelf by Chris Klukkert



There's a fun new addition to the New In The Library bookcase. Library Director, Laurie Hannah, has started a **"Staff Picks" shelf**, with some of the books already within our library holdings that librarians or patrons have found particularly helpful, insightful or essential to their genealogy research. I think you are going to want to see what books have been pulled for display.

Also on our **New in The Library** shelf, we have a two-volume set of Revolutionary War books that you might NOT want to find your relative in. They are *Military Desertions During the American Revolution*. I have to say I did find one of my Revolutionary War family members in there, but gratefully, he was commanding the regiment that was missing the deserted soldier. Whew! It was a quick heart skip until I confirmed that from the index to the page. Here is a more complete description of this great resource.

"Soldiers deserted from all theaters of the Revolution, although roughly as many deserted during the first two years of the war as in the period after June 1777, as the Patriot army became more professionalized. When soldiers ran away, a designated officer placed an advertisement in the local newspaper describing the deserter in considerable detail and offering a reward for his capture. Those advertisements comprise the basis for Mr.Boyle's new two-volume series, which is nothing less than a complete transcription of all the desertion notices found in 38 newspapers published from Massachusetts to North Carolina from 1775 to 1783. Each notice describes the individual by physical features, his place of birth or last residence, occupation, company served in, date missing, and other characteristics. The index at the back of each volume lists every full name given in the notices, or roughly 7,500 names in all. "

Betsy Green has written an in-depth book about silent movies filmed on the fabled estates of Montecito, California. She carefully documents the more than 60 movies produced here, beginning in 1911 and ending in 1928.

The chapter for each movie contains a lively synopsis, behind-the-scenes info, and photos from the movie and the million-dollar mansions. These photos are fascinating look into the

world of glamor and riches over 100 years ago. A great gift for any movie lover!

Stephan R, Frenkel, the guest speaker at our September monthly meeting, spent over five years researching and weaving together the life of his paternal grandmother, Clara. She was born and raised in the time known as La Belle Epoque in Europe. This beautiful world was shattered for Clara and her family and she fled her homeland in 1939, safely arriving in the United States. It is curious that one of the few things she took with her was her album of autographed photos of the il-



lustrious figures of that time - actors, singers, politicians, authors.


