Presidents' Message Arthur Sylvester



It seems as though it is customary and traditional for someone in an organization to review the events of the past year, and then make some prognostications about the coming year. I guess I'm that person for our organization, so here goes.

I don't remember much of the first half of 2022. Maybe because the Covid pandemic

prevented much in-person gathering. My calendar doesn't help. It has a lot of the usual meetings -- Board meetings, committee meetings, the resumption of monthly meetings, almost all by Zoom -- plunked on its pages.

Parenthetically, our Society established its Zoom communication sooner during Covid and maintained it longer than many genealogical societies, thanks to Rosa Avolio and her IT committee and a member's donation of funds to purchase an "owl" that allows meetings to be "hybrid," that is, members at home can see and hear who is speaking at the in-person meetings. Thus "Lunch and Learn" and committee meetings proceeded pretty much as usual and most were well attended. Record scanning continued unabated as did maintenance of financial records and the property.

But still it wasn't the same and some semblance of normalcy returned around about June or July. It was then that planning for Family History month in October with its Open House really got serious. Many planning sessions proceeded that successful event, our first in-person event in many months.

I commented in a previous issue of Tree Tips on the highlight of 2022: the celebration of the Society's Golden Anniversary -- its 50th birthday. By all measures it was so successful not just because of the thorough planning that went into it, but because it brought so many of us together in-person for the first time in nearly three years. One of the central strengths of our Society is the friendships we have developed over the years. Simply put, we missed one another and it was just good to see each other in person again.

Now we have a new year not only with new challenges, but also continuing problems. We have a strong cadre of leaders to guide the Society through those problems this year. I urge you to give those leaders your strongest support. One of the other strengths of our Society is its volunteers. Step forward when called upon or when you see an opportunity where the Society can benefit from your talent and time. If each of us does a little, then we all have the opportunity to make 2023 our finest year.



- 4) Commit to one ancestor at a time. Either research for new information or start an organization strategy to keep all the information at your fingertips. From the website "The Genealogy Guide," I give you a few thoughts:

Reasons to organize your work:

- More efficient use of your time and money to research your family history.
- •Have a clear research plan to know what you want to find next.
- •Find a particular ancestor immediately, so that you can continue to research them.
- •Discover areas of information that are missing from your research.
- You may have received a family archive that you want to sort out and store.
- Can keep a list of resources so you know where to go for more information.
- •Keep a record of your correspondence so you know who to ask for help.
