Please join us on Saturday, February 18, 2023, for a presentation by Rhonda Lauritzen.

Life stories that contain adversity can heal and inspire if you write with empathy and context. But what should you do if there does not appear to be a happy ending? Learn ways to frame these stories to satisfy readers—without going out of bounds. Another delicate area involves situations around trauma, tragedy, or abuse. Should these stories be included or left out? This class will prepare you with important mindsets and

thoughtful considerations for times when family stories might open wounds or upset others.

Rhonda Lauritzen is a professional biographer with multiple published books and a passion for teaching. She believes that when you tell your story, it changes the ending. She specializes in oral history and historical projects. Before she founded **Evalogue.Life** she served as a college VP and was also a corporate CEO.

A SWOT analysis is a frame work to identify and analyze an organization's Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats.

The primary goal of a SWOT analysis is to increase awareness of the factors that go into making an organization's decisions or establishing an organization's long term strategy. SWOT analyses are used by businesses to assess initiatives, products, or projects. To do this, SWOT analyzes the internal and external environment and the factors that can impact the viability of a decision.

SWOT analyses are also used by nonprofit organizations and, to a lesser degree, by individuals for personal assessment. It should be an interesting exercise for the entire Board.

The Story of Our New Website by Milt Hess

As you're undoubtedly aware by now, the Society has a new website. This is the story of how the new site came to be, the rationale for its design, and how we will manage it going forward.

Our previous website

Our previous website had been in place for over 10 years, and it looked it. But it worked well, for committee chairs as well as members, and it was easy to keep up to date. A company called EasyNetSites hosted and maintained the software.

One day in December 2020 we learned that EasyNetSites was in legal trouble and would cease operation on July 1, 2021. Because of the software design, it wasn't possible to simply move our website to another hosting company. We had to develop a new site from scratch. Since EasyNetSites hosted over 100 sites like ours, there was a lot of discussion about a replacement system that we could share. Options were discussed, but we concluded that we would have to proceed on our own.

In the spring of 2021, we learned that another website company was purchasing EasyNetSites and would continue operations seamlessly. Whew, what a relief!

But the work we had done made us realize that we needed a new website anyway. We no longer wanted to be locked into the proprietary architecture of EasyNetSites, and we wanted a site with a modern look and feel.

Toward a new website

While considering our options, we became aware of a database system developed by OurRoots, which would provide vastly enhanced access to the Society's Local Records Database. During our discussions with OurRoots, we learned that they planned to create a complete framework for a genealogical society's website. Each society could tailor it, but the software foundation would be common. We worked with OurRoots on a proof of concept to ensure that the recommended components would meet our needs.

With confidence in the proof of concept, we proceeded to request proposals for the development of our new website. Based on their proposal, cost, and our interview, we selected GreenixMedia as our development firm. We then contracted with Julia McHugh, a local public relations consultant, to prepare the content for the site. Julia had done this for other clients and brought a clear vision to the project.

In the latter part of 2021 and early 2022, the website team – Dorothy Oksner, Robin McCarthy, Rosa Avolio, Milt Hess, and Julia – worked together with GreenixMedia to create the new website. We went live on July 26, 2022.

As is typical with new software, we identified some errors

(I dislike the term 'bugs') and some things we wanted to add. GreenixMedia and Robin collaborated to fix the errors, and Robin implemented some of the enhancements.

Robin provided training to the Society members who would add information on a regular basis – events calendar, announcements, Tree Tips, webinar archive, and class handouts. (At the end of the Events Calendar and Zoom Attendance training both Elizabeth O'Neal and Dorothy Oksner said, "Wow! That's a lot.")

Trouble in paradise



Not everything was satisfactory, however, especially with regard to membership management. We had adopted a system called PaidMembershipsPro, and Kate Lima and the Membership Team found that it didn't meet their needs in several important ways. Although highly rated in surveys, PaidMembershipsPro is oriented to organizations that monetize their members – encourage them to spend more money on the site. That's not us. Also, Robin found the software difficult to work with from a technical perspective. It was decided that we should replace it if a better system is available.

Ted Myers, the Society's President-Elect, formed a steering committee to address and resolve the issues. It consists of all the stakeholders, and under Ted's leadership it has been successful. A search by Mary Hall identified another membership management system, MembershipWorks, that promised better reporting for the Membership Team as well as a friendlier user interface for members. Rosa Avolio took the lead to install it on our test website and tailor it for our Society. The results were favorable, and we decided to replace PaidMembershipsPro with MembershipWorks.

Looking to the future

The website team has long recognized that we will need consulting services to take over the long-term maintenance and support of the website. We contracted with a MembershipWorks consultant to complete the transition to our live site, which occurred on January 16, 2023. Going forward, we will put a contract in place for website maintenance and support. With the new software, you'll find it easier to manage your membership account. You can change your membership level, renew ahead of time, request a coach, and go paperless with Ancestors West – all on the same page. For the Membership Team, the system provides detailed information about the composition of the membership and about recent and upcoming renewals.

We hope that you enjoy using the website and will explore its features – especially the enhanced cemetery records and Local Records Database in Start Your Search, Outreach exhibits in In the Community, and helpful information in Visit the Sahyun Library.
