"The Mystery of The Marie"

Over 60 years ago, on June 7, 1960, the Marie, a converted WWII Landing craft, set out at sunrise from Santa Barbara Harbor with seven men working on a covert underwater communications experiment for a Raytheon-related project... and was never seen again. Eventually, four victims' bodies were recovered, but three disappeared along with the Marie's lifeboat—the captain, a scientist, and an engineer (Diego "Jim" Terres, Jr).

Only 2 years old when her father disappeared, Teresa Newton-Terres decided to investigate the story and try to resolve the mysteries surrounding Marie's disappearance. Unanswered questions led her into a search for information and the rest of Marie's "family," outlined in her book, The Mystery of the Marie. Ms. Newton-Terres first began her search for the truth while living near Pearl Harbor, when she received her grandmother's scrapbook with news articles about the shipwreck. She approached Raytheon, scoured original sources, and heard first-hand accounts, uncovering an aerospace Cold Case, an untold Cold War mystery, and a WWII story, all of which she will discuss in her presentation.

About the Speaker:

TERESA NEWTON-TERRES, PMP® is recognized as a leader who helps frustrated people navigate their projects as an author, speaker, and project life treasure hunter. Holding a Project Management Professional (PMP®) certification since 2000, her service to projects gained global recognition from the Project Management Institute (PMI®) in 2008 and again in 2016.

As an author, she is known for the aerospace cold case and true story, Mystery of the Marie: My Childhood Tragedy That Surfaced a Cold War Secret. And her essay, "The Shipwreck," won inclusion in the anthology Triumph from Tragedy: Personal Stories of Struggle, Courage, Hope, and Victory, which was published in December 2021.

Ms. Newton-Terres was raised on the West Coast in Santa Barbara, educated in the Midwest, and after ten years working at the University of California at Santa Barbara, she fell in love with an officer and gentleman. With military life, Ms. Newton-Terres became a project professional consultant and trainer and traveled from the UK to HI and 32 states in between serving initiatives. After retirement, they settled near their seven grandchildren in view of the Arkansas River where she remains, although she lost her soldier to natural causes in 2014. Newton-Terres returns yearly to volunteer for the Santa Barbara Old Spanish Days. She is grateful for family and friends as they create paellas, enjoy reading, and savor sunrises and sunsets.

What's Your Story?

Here are some ideas for the Summer issue of Ancestors West

Naming traditions in your family or culture. In this country, we commonly think a child being given a first name, perhaps a middle name, and the family surname shortly after birth. There once was the tradition of naming the first son after his paternal grandfather; the first girl after her maternal grandmother. However, not all countries or cultures or religions follow these traditions. When researching your family, what naming traditions or patterns have you found? Have names helped or hindered your research?



<u>Birthing customs and birth stories</u>. My mom was born at home with a midwife present. All her children were born in hospital. It was not unusual for moms and babies to stay in the hospital for up to two weeks. My grandniece chose to have her children at home using a midwife. What stories have been passed down in your family?

<u>Farming and ranching stories</u>. In 1800, farmers made up 90 percent of the American population.



Colonial farmers were typically able to produce everything they needed for their survival including food, clothing, house furnishings, and farm implements. Today, it is less than 2 percent. Most of us have had farming in our family history. Probably not if your family lived in Greenland or Iceland, however. Were your ancestors farmers when they emigrated, continuing that way of life here? Or like some of mine: factory workers who never became successful farmers. Women's roles on farms can be unusual. Many

worked alongside the men in the fields, assisting harvest or calving and lambing seasons. I am sure we ALL have stories offarming and ranching. Please share them!


