DNA is an incredible genealogical tool, isn't it? I don't pretend to fully understand the science, but, like many of you, my wife, Nancy, and I have vigorously swabbed the inside of our cheeks and dutifully spit into tubes in order to get some amazing insights into our family heritage. To expand our understanding, we uploaded the original autoso-

mal DNA kits from Ancestry.com to MyHeritage.com, Gedmatch. com, Geneanet, and others. We also took the proprietary 23 and Me, which has led to other some interesting health insights. Unlike Nancy's parents, my parents lived long enough so I could send in their DNA samples and manage their kits. This has been really helpful as it has enabled me to reach back farther in the family tree and generate stronger cousin matches. I just love meeting new cousins from all over the world, some of whom have been turned into excellent research collaborators.

Our latest DNA foray is into mtDNA with FamilyTreeDNA. Nancy and I are equally excited to trace our maternal lines back to "Mitochondrial Eve" around 150,000 years ago in East Africa. I will have my traditional genealogical work cut out for me to name all the maternal ancestors in our respective lines, however! Just kidding. Actually, our more realistic goal is for the test results to help resolve some brick wall questions on Nancy's maternal line in Wales. Fingers crossed!

Both meetings have enriched my understanding of the genetic genealogy and I expect the field will steadily increase over the next decade. Another good month for our library with book donations coming in and also some lovely new purchased books. We have been blessed with some very generous members who have donated Book Angel money to help cover the cost of some of new books.

Let's talk yearbooks. Remember, we are trying to collect and fill our shelves with all Santa Barbara County school yearbooks. We have quite a few already, and more waiting on the "to be cataloged shelf'before we do a complete tally and can put out a list of what is still needed. If you have a Santa Barbara yearbook, please check with us at the library first before donating it to make sure it is a yearbook that we do not already have.

As to yearbooks from other places and states? First, I recommend scanning what you might want out of it. Then, I myself donated my mother's Oakland High School yearbooks and her Mills College yearbooks to the "Oakland History Room" at the Oakland Public Library. They were THRILLED to get them, as they are doing the same as we are – trying to collect all relevant Oakland-Alameda County yearbooks. I sent my father's yearbooks to the historical society in Redding for the same purpose. Again, they were very pleased to get them and they filled a gap they had and also replaced an older and in bad shape yearbook.

The University of Wisconsin did not want my grandfather's early yearbooks (1904 – 1908), as they had their own full collection, but the Allen County History Library was very happy to take them. If you inquire around – there is usually a willing and grateful. recipient.
