That would allow Nancy to carry three passports: U.S., Canada (where she was born), and the U.K., as well as purchase property in all three countries (as if we could afford it ;-)) Oh, to dream! Anyway, I look forward to hearing your stories, too, during the next few weeks before our bright, sunny memories fade as warm summer days transition to the crisp light of autumn.

All About Our Books at the Sahyun by Chris Klukkert



I have just returned from a genealogy research trip to Iowa that was on my bucket list for ten years. It was wonderful and informative, and I especially enjoyed showing my Sweden-born husband that part of the Midwest. However, I was sad that the “essence” of the beautiful tree-lined avenue and much of the downtown of my Ordway family hometown of Marshalltown, Iowa was in periods of rebuilding or torn away. Marshalltown had first been hit with a tornado that went right through Main Street in July of 1918, followed by a derecho (land hurricane) in August of 2020 that did further damage. The derecho that swept through Iowa on August 10 and 11, 2020 produced winds in excess of 135 mph. The winds destroyed buildings, flattened corn and soybean fields, and blew trees to the ground. The event also transformed the gorgeous tree-filled town cemetery which was badly damaged and shorn of much of its delicious shade and beauty. Sadly, three of the homes previously lived in by my relatives had been torn down after irreparable damage.

However, Marshalltown has a gorgeous new public library and a wonderful historical society with a research room. My family gravestones were still standing and in good shape. There were two family homes upright and lived in. I got photos of it all, as well as relevant paperwork and records from the local Assessors office. I arranged a tour of several historic homes and a one-room school that a relative had taught in. The historians had laid out several folders for me relating to my family’s businesses there. They were prepared for ME, because I had done my homework BEFORE my trip. We have two wonderful books in the Sahyun on the counties

I was visiting and even one on Marshalltown itself in our very own library. I was able to gather the information I needed here in Santa Barbara, before heading to Iowa and having to research those things there. That is what our book collection is there to do for all of us. If you don’t find books about your geographic area or State, or county - - please let us know and see if we can find something for you.

Memorial Garden to Honor the Legacies of Past Leaders

Genealogy is about family – both living as well as past. Since its humble beginnings in 1972, the Society has helped thousands of people reconnect with their extended and ancestral families through our Sahyun library, classes, webinars, field trips and expert research assistance. We have grown from the initial 27 members to over 500 and from cramped leased quarters to ownership of a 1.5-acre campus which includes our first-class Sahyun Genealogy Research Library, rented accessory buildings, and gardens.

In 2011, after a successful \$1.5 million capital campaign, the Society celebrated the expansion of the Sahyun Library and parking lot to better serve its members and the community.

As an all-volunteer organization, many remarkable individuals have been crucial to the Society's success in helping people discover, document, and share their family histories. These leaders established a solid foundation and a vision for the Society to grow and succeed.

We couldn't have done it without such leaders like Arthur Gibbs Sylvester, two-time SBCGS President and project manager for the 2011 library expansion. Art passed away this year followed by Cari Thomas and Debbie Kaska, tireless volunteers who, as past board members, educators, library volunteers, and mentors advanced the Society's mission. Over the Society's history other leaders who have passed away left their indelible mark on the Society.

It is time to memorialize Art, Cari, Debbie, and past leaders' legacies. To do that, we need your help! We are launching a Memorial Garden Campaign with a goal of raising \$100,000. The funds will be used to create an inviting garden space for the overflow outdoor gatherings that the Society has been experiencing. The Memorial Garden will feature permeable paver pathways, strategically situated seating, shade trees and native plantings, all consistent with the overall architectural and landscape plan of the developed property.

In order to provide better access to the unused space behind the "Redwood" building, part of the overall landscape plan is to remove the decrepit Glass Building along with the southeast portion of the Redwood building. These moves will create a better flow from the library entrance courtyard to accommodate the larger gatherings we have been experiencing such as Family History Month and cultural and social events. When not in use for events, the garden will also be a wonderful space for library patrons to take a break from their research, eat lunch, socialize, etc. The Memorial Garden will link the library courtyard and the Sage Garden, on the library's south side. The general vision for the Memorial Garden is illustrated below (courtesy of members Gary and Cheryl Jensen).

Please look for a Memorial Garden Campaign letter in your mail in the coming weeks. A donation to the Memorial Garden memorializes the legacy of those very remarkable members and the fruit of their efforts that we enjoy every day in researching our family histories.

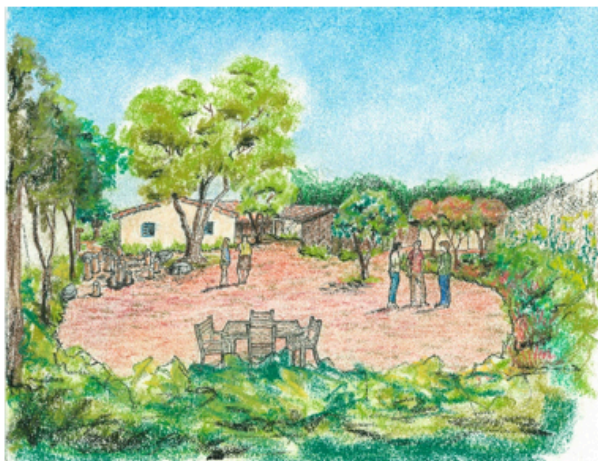
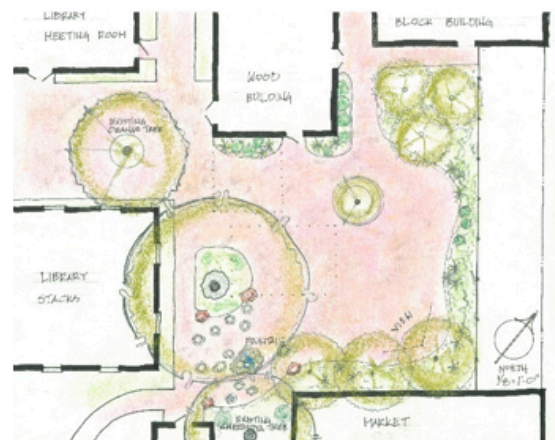

Gena Philibert-Ortega is an author, researcher, and instructor specializing in the use of social history and material culture to tell the story of historical women’s lives. She holds two Master’s degrees: Interdisciplinary Studies (Psychology and Women’s Studies) and Religion. As an author, Gena has published two books, *Cemeteries of the Eastern Sierra* (Arcadia Publishing) and *From the Family Kitchen* (F+W Media), and hundreds of articles in print magazines and online publications. Her writings can also be found on her two blogs, *Gena’s Genealogy* and *Food.Family.Ephemera*, as well as the GenealogyBank and Legacy Family Tree Webinars blogs. A highly sought-after instructor, Gena has taught material culture and social history at the Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburgh and the Salt Lake Institute of Genealogy and is a frequent presenter throughout the United States and Canada. Gena has conducted research for PBS, HGTV, and the Travel Channel and has collaborated on research for the Genealogical Institute of America. Gena’s current research projects focus on American cemeteries, cookbooks, signature quilts, and 20th-century women’s lives.
