# Get Started and Organize Big Writing Projects For Success

### Featuring Rhonda Lauritzen



Big projects need an organizational structure and systems to stay on track and avoid becoming overwhelmed. This class shares what I wish someone had taught me when I first began doing historical research and writing books. Learn best practices I've picked up along the way, including the specific files and infrastructure I set up at the start of each project. Finally, we will introduce new AI technologies and automations to make quick work of what used to be tedious...without sacrificing your unique voice. See which tools save time without a ridiculous learning curve.

**Rhonda Lauritzen** is a professional biographer with multiple published books and a regular speaker at conferences. She has an MBA from the University of Utah, served as as CEO of her family's business, and a state college VP. Her writing journey began with her parents' family business saga, and in 2016, she founded Evalogue.Life. Since then, Rhonda has been hired to tell the stories of families, buildings, and cities. Her next two books will be traditionally published this fall: *A Child in Berlin* by Post Hill Press, and *Creative Insecurity: Lean Into the Unknown and Unleash Your Inner Misfit* by Simon & Schuster. She believes that when you tell your story, it changes the ending.

### President's Message by Ted Tazer-Myers



Greetings Members and Friends!

Wasn't Family History Month terrific this year? I was so impressed with all the wonderful events including our Open House, the crucial role we played at the marvelous Faulkner Galleries for Raíces y Sueños: A Glimpse into Santa Barbara's Hispanic Family Heritage, 1850-1950 exhibit, and all the terrific in-person, online, and hybrid class offerings. Well done everyone!

On a personal note, something different happened for me at the end of October. I think it was triggered by a visit Nancy and I paid to my maternal grandfather's grave at St. Joseph's Cemetery in Richmond. I had never been there before. My grandfather's name was Edward James Tazer and his father was Slovenian. Ed Tazer (pronounced Tatzer in the old country) was an "All West Coast" basketball player at St. Mary's College in the late 1920s and I was named after him.

Since Halloween was coming right on the heels of my visit to St. Joseph's, I decided on a whim to look up Slovenian traditions about Halloween. What I found surprised me. It isn't All Hallows' Eve (Halloween) on October 31st that Slovenes celebrate—it is All Saints' Day (aka All Hallows' Day) on November 1st, one of the most important holidays in Slovenia and central Europe. And although it is Roman Catholic in origin, non-believers cherish the holiday as well. In fact, All Saints' Day is a national holiday for remembering the dead.

Slovenes spend the entire week leading up to All Saints' Day tending the graves of their ancestors (and even friends), cleaning, weeding, and decorating the graves with flowers, candles, and mementos (sounds a bit like Día de Los Muertos, doesn't it?). Different descendant families are assigned to graves so that no plot is left untended. On the day itself, a priest blesses the graves in a solemn, tear-stained ceremony with all the attendees dressed in their Sunday best. This event is followed by good food and drink at the homes of relatives. When Nancy and I visited my cousins in Šmarje pri Jelšah in 2022, they told me that just the previous year they traveled around the countryside visiting at least five homes of relatives, some of whom they hadn't seen for years. It took all day and the family was exhausted, but ecstatic, when they finally returned home.

All of this makes me realize, again, that genealogy is not just about researching our dead ancestors—it is about the descendants, too. It is the living who must keep up the traditions, share the old stories, and nurture our kinship bonds. Thank goodness for the work of the Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society in supporting those vital family relationships.

SBCGS is unique in that all of its members are volunteers. It's crucial for organizations like ours to have multiple people who understand how things operate.


Besides conducting workshops and lunch and learns, Rosa Avolio is currently the society's webmaster. She will be leaving that position in December.

### Books at the Sahyun by Chris Klukkert, Book Chair



Our library just got a great new book which you will read more about in the soon-tobe released Ancestors West. The book is titled Abandoning America: Life-stories from Early New England. We all know about the immigrants to early New England that pioneered and settled there, and many of them were our very own early ancestors. However, how about the ones who went BACK to England, discouraged or unhappy here? A fas-

cinating read for sure. In its pages I found a brother – or perhaps he was a cousin, who tried to make it there in the Massachusetts Colony, but for reasons I have yet to have enough time to read about, he returned back to his home English county. I can't wait to get a longer and deeper look inside that book!

We've also received two more new books from the New England Genealogical and Historical Society, and, as always, they do not disappoint. The first is Vol 2 of the *Early Vermont Series Settlers* book which is a true find for those with early Vermont roots. Another NEHGS newly acquired book is the meaty *Freeperson Families in 1790 – Plymouth County, Massachusetts*. In our quest to diversify our collection and round out areas of research, these books deliver all they promise.

This Fall our library staff is also making a foray into the donated book stash to add and catalog some new treasures to our collection, as several of the new titles listed here suggest. They cover a wide range of topics and I love when we get some obscure titles and small areas covered by books that we might not have known existed, if they had not been donated. Thank you out there! This month you see some Calaveras and Siskiyou County (California) titles as well as a really hearty Oak Park (Cook County), Illinois title. I know more books have been added since my short trip to New Mexico, and I will be anxious to see them all when I come into the Sahyun again this week. I hope to see many of you there too – looking for the very book that has some other clue to solve your own family mystery. We look forward to your library visit and we encourage and welcome suggestions for other genealogy books for our collection.

You can pay for the room in advance or on the day you use the room. Groups are encouraged to reserve a room during normal library open hours; however, you can reserve a room when the library is closed as long as a SBGCS member attends and opens and closes the building.

Please note that we no longer use a paper calendar reservation system at the library reception desk. Several volunteers work together to take your reservation and add it to the calendar.

That's all there is to it! We hope to welcome you and your group to the Sahyun soon.

When communicating with a new relative whose interest level in genealogy is not quite known, take it slowly.

They:

• might not be able to reply immediately-give them some time

• might not be quite as interested in the family history as you-believe it or not,

it is possible

- might be put off if you share too many "black sheep" stories immediately-they might think you are only out to share the "family dirt"
- might not want to read five rambling paragraphs in your first email-get to the point
- might not respond if you immediately point out errors in their online tree-don't make them feel like you are proofreading their tree
- might not be interested in sharing details of their personal lifethey may be your fifth cousin, not your "bestie."

Your goal is to establish a line of communication and see if there's a willingness to share/exchange information. Keep that goal in mind.
