

"Dyo and Fukui Journeys: Immigrant Ancestors' Stories of Courage, Resilience and of Patriots Imprisoned" Saturday, July 19, 2025, 10:30 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.



The Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society invites you to its free monthly meeting on **Saturday, July 19**, featuring family historian Tommy Dyo who will present "Dyo and Fukui Journeys: Immigrant Ancestors' Stories of Courage, Resilience and of Patriots Imprisoned."

The journeys of Tommy Dyo's immigrant ancestors are sagas of epic risks, incredible successes, profound setbacks, and the unyielding spirit of Japanese American immigrants.

Tommy Dyo, a Yonsei (fourth-generation Japanese immigrant descendant), is deeply committed to preserving Japanese American history, and his passion is rooted in his family's experiences. For his presentation, Tommy will share his family stories and historical research about both sets of grandparents and their immigration and Japanese incarceration experience. On his maternal side, his earliest immigrant maternal ancestor arrived in Maui, HI, from Hiroshima, Japan, in 1885. His paternal grandfather immigrated from Sendai, Japan, to Chihuahua, Mexico, in 1906, He was hired by the US government as a "scout" during the Mexican Border War, raised his family in El Paso, TX and rose to wealth as a silver miner but later lost his fortune through political events. he settled his family in Carpinteria, CA before being forcibly removed during WWII.

Tommy's family history is profoundly marked by World War II. Under Executive Order 9066, his maternal family was forcibly removed from Los Angeles and incarcerated at the Santa Anita Assembly Center and Heart Mountain Relocation Center. His paternal family was sent

from Carpinteria to the Tulare Assembly Center and then to the Gila River Relocation Center. His paternal grandfather endured further transfers to Lordsburg and Santa Fe before the family was finally reunited at the Crystal City Internment Camp in Texas.

About our speaker: Tommy Dyo has dedicated himself to Christian ministry since 1988. In 2006, he joined Cru (formerly Campus Crusade for Christ), serving as the National Executive Director for Epic Movement until July 2015, when he shifted his focus to developing strategic partnerships and networking. He also consults for various organizations. Tommy grew up in Pasadena, CA and lives in Long Beach, CA with his wife Melissa, and they have two adult children, Noah and Mika.

About the Event:

Doors open at 9:30 a.m. for refreshments and informal discussions with the Special Interest Groups, covering a variety of topics from getting started in genealogy to writing family histories. A short business meeting begins at 10:30 a.m., followed by Tommy's presentation at 11:00 a.m which is in person at the church and broadcast on Zoom.. The event is free and open to the public.

Ted's Message

So, we designed a Vice-President of Operations position, which Karen quickly agreed to fill after I offered her a "lucrative package" she couldn't refuse!

Now, after two and a half years, the Society has achieved so many milestones that I hesitate to list them for fear of leaving some out and offending someone. Instead, I'll leave that task in the capable hands of Mary Jacob and our team and committee leads, who will summarize these accomplishments in the upcoming 2024-2025 Year-in-Review.

In the meantime, Karen and I have stepped off the stage, and providentially, two experienced and enthusiastic leaders, Marie Sue Parsons and Kate Lima, have stepped into our respective roles. Marie Sue has served as your President before and is eager to devote her considerable talents to advancing our mission in the coming year. Kate's enthusiasm and problem-solving skills, honed during her time as Membership Director, have well prepared her to serve as Vice-President of Operations.

Finally, dear friends, it has been an honor and a privilege to serve you these past three years. I have made many new and dear friends and plan to stay involved in one way or another. Please give your full support to Marie Sue and Kate as they lead us forward, tackling the future while honoring our past.

Speaking of shoes to fill, there is no way that I can fill Ted's! However, with Kate as V P. and the very capable hands of all other committee members, board members, and other offi-



Memorial Garden & Patio – Project Update Mary Jacob, Development Chair

Exciting changes are coming to the Sahyun Library grounds this August! As you may recall, the Memorial Garden and Patio project was launched in May 2023 with two main goals: to honor the legacy of past Society leaders and to create a functional outdoor space for events that will enhance the flow between the library's interior and exterior.

The Memorial Garden and Patio will be located on the east side of the property, directly opposite the library's main entrance. This multi-year initiative includes several phases, each with multiple steps.

We're pleased to report that the Society has successfully raised \$110,000 to fund Phase One. This phase includes the development of a professional landscape design, securing the necessary permits from the city and county, and the demolition of both the glass house and the adjacent storage room in the redwood building.

Demolition is scheduled for August. Once completed, the area will be leveled and left to reseed naturally. Informational signage about the Memorial Garden and Patio project will be placed on-site to share the vision with visitors. The cleared space will offer a more expansive view of the grounds and help everyone imagine the transformation to come.

We will keep members informed about demolition dates and any library closure (if needed) via email and notices posted at the library







San Diego Genealogical Society Launches California Pioneer Certificate Program

The San Diego Genealogical Society presents the California Pioneer Certificate Program honoring early pioneers who helped shape the state of California. The program is designed to assist those researching their California roots and issue formal acknowledgment of their ancestors to the development of California.

On the SDGS website, the California Pioneer Honor Wall was created to highlight the contribution early pioneers made to the development of California. Here, entry portals provide organized access to a searchable database containing more than 400,000 eligible California pioneers, along with biographical, genealogical, and historical information. The database consolidates pertinent records to aid research and is continually updated as new information becomes available. Additional genealogical and historical resources and finding aids are also provided. Each brick in the Honor Wall contains eligible pioneers' names and includes photos, biographies, and events.

Those interested in recognizing their descendance from early California pioneers are encouraged to complete an application. Supporting documentation submitted must show their ancestor was associated with one or more of the four following California historical events:

- California's Admission of Statehood (1850)
- The Gold Rush (1848-1860)
- The San Francisco earthquake (1906)
- California Mission period (before 1850)

Upon verification of submitted documentation, applicants will be issued a Certificate of Authenticity and Lineage Chart showing the pioneer's relationship to the applicant.

Membership to the San Diego Genealogy Society is <u>not</u> required to participate in this certificate program. The application and instructions are available in the Member Resources section of the SBCGS website.
