The Santa Barbara County Genealogical Society invites you to its free monthly meeting on Saturday, September 20, featuring professional genealogist Diane Hendriks who will present "Scanty Family History."

Scanty family history? Unknown parents or other relatives? Learn how to document and follow every single clue to build your family tree, with case studies!

Diane Henriks, also known as the Descendant Detective and founder of Know Who Wears the Genes in Your Family, is a passionate and seasoned Los Angeles County-based professional genealogist,

investigator, speaker, and author who specializes in descendancy and brick wall research, along with living people search and unknown parentage cases. Diane has worked closely with private investigators to find living people, while also assisting in background investigations, in both civil and criminal cases. She is a proud member of the Association of Professional Genealogists, the Genealogical Speakers Guild, the Southern California Genealogical Society, and the Utah Genealogical Association and varied special interest groups. What started out as a small hobby has since become a great obsession, and she now helps others discover and preserve who they are and where they come from!

Database News

Over 9500 Welch-Ryce Mortuary records were recently added to our local records database. This brings the total number of entries in our database to more than 204,000. New Library Sign-in Procedure

Beginning in September, the library will transition from paper sign-in sheets to a new digital system. A laptop sign-in screen on the front desk counter will replace the current paper process at the front desk and in the office. This new system connects to a spreadsheet that will help us gather improved data on library usage patterns.

For this program to be successful, EVERYONE entering the library must use the laptop to sign in, regardless of member status or purpose. This includes board and committee members attending a meeting, visitors on a guided tour, or non-society meeting attendees. Library staff will be on hand to assist you.

You might wonder how this month connects to your own heritage, especially if your roots trace back to Europe. But you'd be surprised where your family history can lead you—I certainly was!

While researching my own background, I discovered that my biological father had spent three years working at a copper mine in Peru. During that time, he became fluent in Spanish and even picked up some regional dialects. Thanks to this language expertise, he was recruited by Naval Intelligence during World War II and stationed in Cuba. His role? To monitor foreign submarines, ships, and supply shipments. That's just what he was allowed to write about—who knows what else he might have been doing

behind the scenes!

As I dug deeper into this history, I found myself wanting to trace connections to people in Peru and Cuba—my own little group of "FANS," you might say. Thanks to the excellent speakers and webinars hosted by SBCGS, I learned how to approach this research and where to go for the best results.

In my role as a volunteer librarian, I've also had the pleasure of helping many patrons explore their Mexican and South American roots. Our past speakers (and some exciting upcoming ones!) have offered invaluable tips on how to research in various countries and regions. Their insights have not only guided my own journey, but also helped me recommend useful additions to our library's collection.

One of the things I've learned is that every speaker—regardless of the nationality or region they focus on—shares a gem of research wisdom that can benefit anyone exploring their family history.

Memorial Garden Progress By Fred Marsh and Mary Jacob


Visible progress toward the construction of our much-anticipated Memorial Garden is now evident as you walk into or leave the Sahyun Library. Thanks to the efforts of generous donors and many volunteers, demolition of the greenhouse and a portion of the redwood building was completed in August. There is now a clear and level space for construction of a beautiful patio and memorial area surrounded by gardens and trees.


Memorial Patio and Garden Plan

Our design contractors are now preparing the final design documents to submit to the city for a construction permit to build the new patio and garden. We plan to submit the permit application in October and hope to have city approval to begin construction in early 2026. However, recent estimates indicate that approximately \$100,000 in additional donations will be needed to fully complete the construction.

- Strong Foundation of Support: Strengthen the Society's financial position by increasing its endowment, growing annual and planned giving by donors, expanding fundraising capacity, and optimizing the use of the property to support its mission and enhance its presence in the community.


Kathryn Field, Membership Chair


Society Member Orientation Saturday, September 13, 10:00 am








San Diego Genealogical Society Launches California Pioneer Certificate Program

The San Diego Genealogical Society presents the California Pioneer Certificate Program honoring early pioneers who helped shape the state of California. The program is designed to assist those researching their California roots and issue formal acknowledgment of their ancestors to the development of California.

On the SDGS website, the California Pioneer Honor Wall was created to highlight the contribution early pioneers made to the development of California. Here, entry portals provide organized access to a searchable database containing more than 400,000 eligible California pioneers, along with biographical, genealogical, and historical information. The database consolidates pertinent records to aid research and is continually updated as new information becomes available. Additional genealogical and historical resources and finding aids are also provided. Each brick in the Honor Wall contains eligible pioneers' names and includes photos, biographies, and events.

Those interested in recognizing their descendance from early California pioneers are encouraged to complete an application. Supporting documentation submitted must show their ancestor was associated with one or more of the four following California historical events:

- California's Admission of Statehood (1850)
- The Gold Rush (1848-1860)
- The San Francisco earthquake (1906)
- California Mission period (before 1850)

Upon verification of submitted documentation, applicants will be issued a Certificate of Authenticity and Lineage Chart showing the pioneer's relationship to the applicant.

Membership to the San Diego Genealogy Society is <u>not</u> required to participate in this certificate program. The application and instructions are available in the Member Resources section of the SBCGS website.
